Overview

For 31 years, the Annual **Miami Breast Cancer Conference®** has been bringing together a multidisciplinary faculty of internationally recognized experts in breast cancer, including surgeons, medical and radiation oncologists, and translational researchers, to foster an integrated team approach to the management of patients with breast cancer. The theme of this conference continues to be “Hear it on Friday, use it on Monday” with an emphasis on state-of-the-art treatments, cutting-edge data, emerging techniques, and their applications in the clinic.

The diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer is a rapidly changing field, and it is crucial for clinicians to keep up with evolving standards and emerging data in order to provide the best care for their patients. Moreover, the complex nature of breast cancer necessitates an integrated, multidisciplinary team approach, which requires familiarity with the latest advances across specialties.

General sessions will focus on topics of interest to all clinicians who see patients with breast cancer, including practical management challenges and controversies in surgical, medical, and radiation oncology, with 2 separate tracks in the afternoons designed specifically for surgical and medical oncologists. Also, this year we are adding more case-based discussions, with additional opportunities to discuss the implications of new data for everyday patient management, to further increase the value of this conference to your practice.

Target Audience
