Giving Students and Residents Constructive Feedback: IMPROVE Your Feedback Style

The Medical Model of Precepting is becoming increasingly prevalent throughout Health-System Pharmacy. One of the key elements of precepting, regardless of whether the learner is an IPPE student or a PGY-2 Resident, is being able to deliver effective feedback. Feedback is an essential teaching tool that learners of any level expect and rely on in order to provide them guidance towards achieving the curricular goals of the rotation. This presentation will outline the IMPROVE method for delivering feedback and outline elements of effective communication. A1: Acute Overdoses/Toxicology Review

Nathan D. Mah, PharmD

An acute overdose is one of the leading causes of emergency department visits and hospital admissions in the United States. Exposures to poisons, which include medications, chemicals, biotoxins in plants or foods, and toxic gases, can occur accidentally or intentionally. This course will introduce the basic principles on how to approach an overdose patient and recognize specific clinical signs and symptoms that will help guide medical management. Utilizing real life examples and historical information, areas covered will include: general principles, appropriate antidote therapy to common medication overdoses, introduction to new therapies, and understanding the pharmacist's role in an acute overdose.

ACPE DETAILS | Learning Objectives: Demonstrate the ability to evaluate an acute overdose patient. Explain the toxic mechanism of action of various medication overdoses. Recommend proper pharmaceutical management for various types of acute ingestions. Reporting Bias and Drugs: Do You Know What You Don't Know?

Erick H. Turner, MD

When a doctor asks you a question about a drug, and you want to make sure you're giving the very best answer, what do you do? After checking the product labeling, you do a literature search, right? That's natural, because we have all been taught that peer-reviewed journals are the ultimate source of authoritative information. Unfortunately, peer-reviewed journal articles come into existence through a process containing fundamental flaws. One major limitation is that data from clinical trials can be published selectively. Sometimes—much more often than is commonly appreciated—drug trials produce results that could be "bad news" if they were to become public. Such trials may never see the light of day in publication. Alternatively, the trial might be published, but thanks to a process of "statistical alchemy", a result can be presented that is more "publishable". But are we "stuck" with this situation? Fortunately, no. One solution is to use FDA Drug Approval Packages to be sure that we are not looking at "sanitized" clinical trial data. In this talk, we will examine how they have been used to uncover and correct for reporting bias with antidepressants and antipsychotics. We will also ask, how widespread is this problem? Does this affect other fields of medicine, or just psychiatry? And is this just a problem with trials sponsored by pharmaceutical companies?

Implementing High Dose Opioid Limits in a Medicaid Population

Clinicians are faced with the challenge of balancing the managing pain (the fifth vital sign) with the epidemiological reality that the misuse of prescriptions has become, in the words of the Center for Disease Control, an "epidemic." The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) reported in 2013 that Oregon had the highest rate of the non-medical use of prescription opioid analgesics for 2010-2011. The Oregon Fee For Service program has responded to these realities with an evidence-based prior authorization policy for the use of high doses of opioid analgesics for the treatment of non-malignant pain. This presentation will start with a brief review of the epidemiological data and survey current state law and resources. Then the current evidence for the treatment of chronic, non-malignant pain will be reviewed and the Fee For Service prior authorization policy will be discussed. The presentation will conclude with the findings of a retrospective cohort study on the impact of the prior authorization policy on pharmacy and health care service utilization.
