

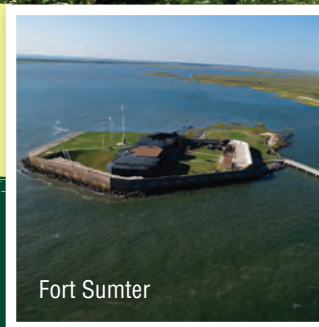

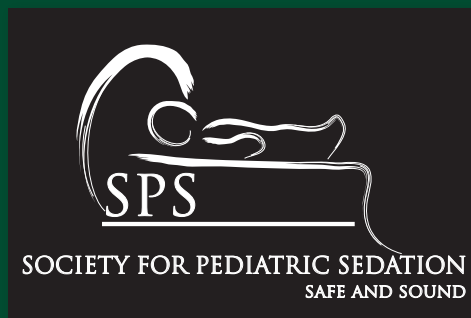

Message from the 2014 Conference Program Co-Chairs

We hope you will join us in Charleston, South Carolina for the Society for Pediatric Sedation 2014 Conference. We have an outstanding program this year that reflects the SPS mission of promoting safe, high quality care, innovative research and quality professional education. Our inspirational theme for this year's conference is "Great Expectations: Forging a Culture of Safety and Quality in Sedation Practice". The conference will showcase this "culture" to our multidisciplinary audience through a focus on innovative technologies, quality assessments and evidence based advances in the practice of pediatric sedation.

As in past years, the SPS Sedation Provider Course® is held on the day prior to the annual conference (May 18th, 2014). This excellent all day course promises to be a great success again this year.

Starting with the welcome reception, the 2014 Conference is filled with networking opportunities and outstanding learning experiences for all attendees. This year we are thrilled that the SPS Conference has a few "firsts".

- 1) The findings of the first multidisciplinary consensus conference on defining quality in pediatric sedation were published last year in the Journal for Healthcare Quality. SPS leaders and authors of this outstanding article will highlight these findings to the audience during the Awards Luncheon on Tuesday.
- 2) On Monday morning, a creative "teleconference" live from the American Telemedicine Association Annual Meeting in Baltimore will demonstrate to the audience many exciting possibilities for telemedicine use in pediatric sedation.
- 3) For the first time, the conference is extended to two and a half days and features free time on Tuesday afternoon for attendees to explore and enjoy historic Charleston. Named the #1 U.S. City for Tourism the third year in a row by Conde Nast, Charleston is rich in southern culture, culinary delights and spring beauty. But for the interested and highly motivated among us, there are SPS committee meetings that afternoon, an optional ultrasound-guided vascular access workshop, and an optional tour of MUSC Simulation Center and Children's Hospital.
- 4) Time is carved out of the program on Monday for advance practice nurses to meet as a group during lunch.

Scientific Program Information

Target Audience

Procedural sedation increasingly impacts many aspects of pediatric medical care and sedation providers include professionals from a broadening range of disciplines. This educational activity is intended for any health care provider interested in or who provides pediatric procedural sedation including physicians (any subspecialty), dentists, nurses, advanced practice nurses, nurse anesthetists and other health professionals.

Statement of Need

Significant variability exists between the medical care models currently employed in the delivery of pediatric sedation. However, based on responses from prior sedation conferences, themes/questions posed to/on sedation discussion forums, and current published literature, sedation providers continue to desire greater understanding of the elements of optimal sedation delivery systems, how those elements relate to their own individual organizational structures, and how these elements can be incorporated into provider training and practices. These venues have also identified a need for a better understanding of the sedation needs of sub-populations of pediatric patients with unique needs as well as the overall processes involved in the pre-sedation assessment, patient selection, intra-sedation and post-sedation care.

Purpose

Participants will develop an understanding of optimal care delivery models in pediatric sedation, in terms of their organizational structure, business practices, provider credentialing, patient selection and medical practices. This knowledge will allow sedation providers to evaluate and adjust their practice models and/or individual clinical practices within which they currently function, or are in the process of building. Participants will also obtain a better understanding of practical issues in delivering optimal sedation care, including selection of sedation agents, pre-, intra- and post-sedation care, quality improvement, and sedation education processes, all of which will enhance participants subsequent clinical sedation practices. The additional skills and evidence-based knowledge participants will gain on both the levels of systems design and of individual practice will contribute to improved, quality patient care.

Overall Conference Objectives

Upon completion of this SPS conference, participants will be able to:

1. Critique the recently proposed pediatric sedation quality metrics using the Institute of Medicine's six aims of quality;
2. Recognize the potential impacts of pharmacogenomics, obesity, age, and unique patient physiology on an individual's response to sedative and narcotic medications;
3. Apply knowledge of a child's developmental needs in the planning and delivery of child and adolescent sedation;
4. Justify the use of a "mastery-based" or other simulation sedation training courses in sedation credentialing of clinicians
5. Appraise the safety of sedation and anesthesia in dentistry;
6. Integrate information gleaned from pediatric sedation case-based discussions into one's own institutional practices to enhance patient care;
7. Apply hands-on experience from airway workshops to improve performance in managing pediatric airways; and
8. Propose a definition of a 'pediatric sedationist'.

SPS Sedation Provider Course® - Limited to 24 participants

Registration accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Target Audience

The target audience for the SPS Sedation Provider Course® includes health care providers who have clinical experience in the area of pediatric sedation and who desire to enhance their knowledge and clinical competency in the field. This group includes physicians, dentists, nurses and advance-practice nurses involved in the field of pediatric sedation.

Statement of Need

This course is designed to meet the needs of the sedation provider seeking both practical (simulation) training and didactic content focused on patient selection, patient safety, pharmacology and the management of common adverse events. As significant adverse events are rare, this "hands-on" model of training is especially pertinent.

Purpose

Participants will gain clinical skills and a deeper understanding regarding issues related to the assessment of sedation patients, development of a sedation plan, recognition and management of both common and life-threatening adverse events in sedation practice and sedation pharmacology. This course is designed to provide practitioners with the knowledge, competencies and skills that promote safe and effective high-quality procedural sedation to children. **As part of our efforts to advance the course and provide students with more simulation experience and small group sessions during the actual course, the five main course lectures that were previously given as live components will now be offered online only. These lectures are an integral part of the course, and viewing them is required by all participants before the day of the course. Note: the main course lectures will be delivered in abbreviated form during the actual course.**

Objectives

The goal of the provider course is to provide practitioners with the knowledge, competencies and tools to promote high quality procedural sedation to children. Upon successful completion of this course, the registrant should be able to:

1. Perform a pre-sedation risk assessment;
2. Describe the effects of sedation on airway control and respiratory drive;
3. Explain the principles of and interpret the information from pulse oximetry and capnography;
4. Define, diagnose and treat adverse airway and cardiopulmonary events during sedation;
5. Demonstrate knowledge of the pharmacology and uses of common sedative drugs;
6. Demonstrate hands-on critical competencies related to sedated pediatric patients including all aspects of airway management, ventilation, resource management, and appropriate use of resuscitative measures; and
7. Develop a systematic and rational approach to pediatric sedation.

Optional Workshop: Using Ultrasound for Vascular Access

This two-hour optional workshop on Using Ultrasound for Vascular Access will be led by Dr. Geoffrey Hayden, the MUSC Director of Emergency Ultrasound. Space is limited to 20 participants.

Target Audience

The target audience for this optional workshop includes physicians, nurses and other clinicians who desire to enhance their knowledge and skills in the use of bedside ultrasound to achieve vascular access in children.

Statement of Need

Vascular access in pediatric patients is frequently more challenging than in adult patients given our population's size and degree of cooperation with the process. The delivery of most pediatric sedation requires indwelling venous access and unsuccessful attempts often lead to patient dissatisfaction and frustration for families and clinicians. In addition, many sedation services include proceduralists who are asked to place peripherally inserted central catheters or other central venous catheters in children for medical therapies. Recent evidence has shown that ultrasound enables better visualization of peripherally and centrally located veins in children and adults and leads to significant improvement in vascular access with decreased rates of complications.

Purpose

Participants will gain knowledge and clinical skills in ultrasound use for vascular access following didactic content and extensive hands-on instruction using vascular simulation models. The enhanced knowledge and skills can be used to improve patient care, catheter selection, and patient satisfaction during placement of venous access.

Objectives

As a result of participating in this workshop, one should be better able to:

1. Demonstrate how to use dynamic ultrasound guidance to place central and peripheral venous lines;
2. Assess the deep peripheral veins and central veins with ultrasound; and
3. Employ a checklist for performance of vascular access.

Credit Designation for Physicians

The Medical University of South Carolina designates this live activity for a maximum of 28 AMA PRA Category 1 Credit(s)TM. Physicians should claim only the credit commensurate with the extent of their participation in the activity. Note: Credit will be awarded based on actual attendance of various sessions. The above maximum total may include the Optional SPS Sedation Provider Course® which is certified for 9 AMA PRA Category 1 Credit(s)TM and the Optional Vascular Ultrasound Workshop which is certified for 2 AMA PRA Category 1 Credit(s)TM.

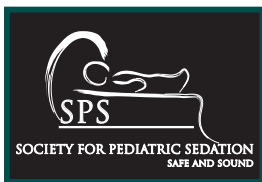
