Professor Keith Rome
Professor of Podiatry, AUT University, New Zealand



Keith is Professor of Podiatry but also acting Director of Health & Research Rehabilitation Institute, AUT University. His research focuses on chronic foot disorders affecting pain, impairment and disability in rheumatic conditions and diabetes and incorporates studies of balance, fall risk factors, effects of rheumatic disease on gait and foot function, and the effects of chronic foot disorders and footwear. His research expertise extends from laboratory-based human movement studies, through to the conduct of clinical trials.

Dr David Coppini
Consultant Diabetologist, Poole Hospital



Dr Coppini has an interest in diabetic neuropathy and foot disease, and is also Honorary Senior Lecturer at the University of Southampton. He has published widely on diabetic neuropathy and has presented original research both nationally and internationally. He is also associate clinical sub-dean and founder member of the European diabetic foot study group. Dr Coppini specialises in endocrinology and has a particular interest in thyroid disease.

Debbie Sharman
Consultant Podiatrist and Visiting Lecturer, University of Southampton



Debbie has specialised in the management of diabetic foot complications for over twenty years. She was appointed as Consultant Podiatrist for Diabetes in 2008 and is a Visiting Lecturer at the University of Southampton. Alison Burgin is a qualified pharmacist. She completed a Master of Pharmacy degree at the University of Bath in 2004. After qualification, she completed a post-graduate diploma in clinical pharmacy at the University of Portsmouth and became a non-medical prescriber in 2011 from the University of Reading. She specialises in oncology and haematology and is a non-medical prescriber for the acute oncology and urology teams at University of Southampton NHS Foundation Trust. She has a special interest in prostate cancer. She teaches on the non-medical prescribing programme and undergraduate nurses at the University of Southampton.

Professor Mark Nixon
Professor of Computer Vision, University of Southampton



Professor Mark Nixon has developed ground-breaking science in the recognition of static and moving faces, and gait patterns. Most recently, Mark has been involved in funded work using data fusion in the area of biometrics, and in a UK/US collaboration towards the Information Technology Alliance. In particular, Professor Nixon's work in tracking a person's gait has led to the development of the country's first biometric tunnel on the University campus in Southampton. The tunnel contains 12 cameras which track and measure a person's gait as they walk.

Dr Tony Berendt

Deputy Medical Director, Oxford University Hospitals NHS Trust, Oxford; and Consultant in Infectious Diseases, Bone Infection Unit, Nuffield Orthopaedic Centre, OUH, Oxford



In 1997, Tony became the first Consultant Physician-in-Charge of the Bone Infection Unit. He has authored over 60 peer-reviewed articles, and over 40 relevant reviews and textbook chapters. He has lectured, run workshops, Meet-the-Professor and Meet-the-Expert sessions, acted as a panel discussant, debated clinical controversies, and chaired symposia, at over 25 international and as many national conferences. He has served on clinical practice guidelines committees for diabetic foot infection (IDSA), International Working Group on the Diabetic Foot, NICE) and prosthetic joint infection (IDSA).

Barry qualified in 1964 at the London Foot Hospital. His chief interests are podiatric surgery and interpretation of gait and its clinical effects on patients. Barry has been involved in the development of a state of the art computerised gait analyser. He has for many years been involved in medico-legal practice, dealing with medical negligence and personal injury cases and in recent years, Barry has become involved in forensic gait analysis.

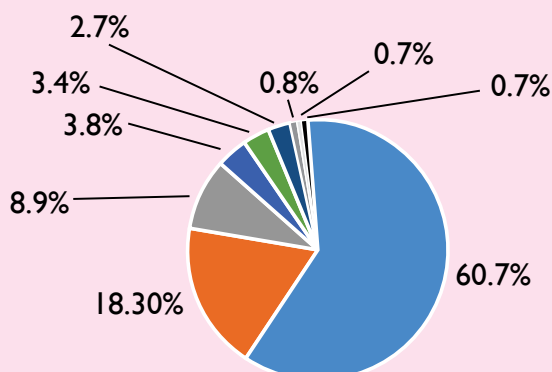
