NEWS FROM FLORIDA MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Each year, the Florida Medical Association's legislative goal is twofold: to get pro-medicine legislation passed and to defeat bills that are bad for medicine and patients alike. The 2014 legislative session, which ended on May 2, presented numerous challenges that required us to play a strong defense against harmful legislation. All told, we tracked more than 300 bills and fulfilled our commitment to being the most effective and aggressive

advocate for Florida's physicians.

The FMA was successful in a number of ways. First, we fought hard against a measure that would have allowed Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioners to practice independently without physician supervision, and to prescribe controlled substances. Preventing inappropriate scope of practice expansion is a constant legislative battle, but the FMA has stated repeatedly that allowing non-physicians to practice medicine is not the right solution for increasing access to care.

While the FMA believes telemedicine has great potential, the proposal being considered during this session fell far short of a reasonable approach. To ensure accountability and patient safety, it is imperative that doctors have a Florida medical license before practicing telemedicine in this state. Ultimately, the flawed telemedicine portion of a larger health care bill was removed. The FMA remains engaged in this issue. In anticipation of the 2015 legislative session, we will continue advocating for smart public policy on telemedicine.

Finally, the FMA is encouraged by the strides we made this year toward insurance reforms aimed at reducing physicians' burdens and making sure patients get the right treatment at the right time. Passing this legislation will be one of our highest priorities in 2015.

Advocacy on behalf of doctors is a major part of the FMA's mission, and our work in this arena doesn't begin and end with the legislative session. The issues may change from year to year, but our commitment to protecting the profession and advancing legislation that helps all physicians practice medicine is constant.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS & ADVOCACY UPDATE

Group: Med Mal Cap Amendment Needed (HealthNewsFlorida, April 16, 2014)

Following a Florida Supreme Court decision that struck down caps on certain awards in medical malpractice lawsuits, the members of a 2002 task force that supported those caps are calling for a constitutional amendment that would place the caps on solid footing. The task force appointed by then-Gov. Jeb Bush recommended a cap for individuals on non-economic damages, and the legislature passed it in 2003. The five people who served on that task force wrote to Senate President Don Gaetz and House Speaker Will Weatherford on April 9, asking for the proposed amendment. It would have to be approved by voters.

States aim to repeal, raise malpractice caps (Clinical Endocrinology News, May 7, 2014)

Caps on non-economic damages in medical malpractice cases are coming under fire by courts, legislators and trial attorneys in a number of states. Florida physicians were disappointed to lose the wrongful death damages cap, said Jeff Scott, director of legal and government affairs for the Florida Medical Association. Since its enactment, the cap helped stabilize premiums in Florida and has supported the return of a number of liability insurers returning to the state, he said.

Infighting, maneuvering doomed health bills in Tallahassee (Tampa Bay Times, May 7, 2014)

The House wanted to tackle the doctor shortage by allowing nurse practitioners more leeway to work independently, and by allowing doctors to treat Florida patients over the phone or Internet. The Florida Medical Association, with Senate support, blocked those ideas. The House also wanted to let outpatient surgery centers keep patients for up to three days after an operation, arguing it could save money. But the Senate sided with hospitals to kill that idea.

Nurses, Telehealth Fall Off 'Train' (HealthNewsFlorida, May 2, 2014)

The two biggest health initiatives of the Florida House for 2014 – 2015 both died at the hands of the Senate during the final 36 hours of this year's legislative session. They were: allowing nurse practitioners who have sufficient training to practice independently of physician supervision; and setting up a structure under the law for the growth of distant health care through telemedicine or telehealth, terms used at various times during the session. It was a big defeat for the House Health Committee on Health Care Innovation, which spent months holding hearings and doing research. Supporters of the older, more-established trauma centers told the News Service they are frustrated but hopeful negotiations between the feuding hospitals and the Florida Department of Health can resolve the now-three-year-old dispute.

FMA, TaxWatch spar over nurse practitioner report (Miami Herald, March 18, 2014)

A recent report from Florida TaxWatch backs proposals before the Legislature to allow highly trained nurses to practice independently from doctors and prescribe controlled substances. TaxWatch's report says the state could save \$44 million in Medicaid spending and up to \$339 million total by allowing nurse practitioners and physician assistants to practice with fewer restrictions. The FMA accused TaxWatch of using outdated data and faulty assumptions in arriving at its conclusions.

Doctors to Get 1-Time Fee Cut (HealthNewsFlorida, April 8, 2014)

Florida's 61,000 medical doctors will get a 31 percent cut on their

license renewal fee under a proposal adopted by the Florida Board of Medicine. The renewal fee for MDs who have active licenses will be reduced from the usual \$360 to \$250 during the calendar years 2015 – 2016, under the proposal. This one-time fee cut was adopted by the board's finance committee in March and by the full board. It still has to go through the rule-making process, which takes several months. No serious opposition is expected.

Medical residencies key to new doctors in South Florida (Sun Sentinel, April 13, 2014)

A new medical residency program at Florida Atlantic University in Boca Raton will begin in June and add 36 residencies. FAU plans to have 96 by next year and 400 in five years. While it's a good start, it's not enough, said Dr. Bernardo Obeso, director of FAU's program. He said thousands more residencies will be needed. By 2020, FAU estimates, Florida will have 400 more state medical school graduates than available first-year resident positions. FAU said its medical school, which opened in 2011, expects to graduate 64 physicians in its inaugural class of 2015. At full enrollment, the school will have 256 students.

Feds OK \$2.2B for Hospitals, Med Schools (HealthNewsFlorida, April 11, 2014)

Florida Medicaid received word that federal officials have authorized a \$2 billion hospital fund for indigent care starting July 1 and an extra \$200 million for the state's medical schools. Medicaid Director Justin Senior said CMS approved \$2.2 billion for the Low Income Pool (LIP), a program to support "safety-net" hospitals and clinics.

Medical Tourism Passes Senate (AP, April 24, 2014)

The Florida Senate has passed a bill that would market the state as a destination for medical procedures to national and international audiences. The state Chamber of Commerce and other supporters believe Florida offers a number of high-profile medical services but has done little to promote them.

Confusion reigns in Medicaid change (Ocala Star-Banner, April 30, 2014)

Private transportation companies that have provided low-cost rides are telling some seniors they do not have contracts with the new insurance companies now part of the Managed Medical Assistance services. Over the next several months, an estimated 3.5 million Floridians with Medicaid will transition into the managed care system. Regions 2, 3 and 4 – which include part of the Panhandle, Northeast and North Central Florida – start under the new system today.

Prescription drug program "saved" by AG's \$2M pledge (The Laker/Lutz News, May 5, 2014)

Using money made from a settlement with CVS Caremark, Bondi has pledged \$2 million toward the prescription drug program, enough to keep it going until 2018, after the state Legislature failed to include \$500,000 in annual funding in its \$77 billion budget.

New emergency clinic affiliated with health insurer (Orlando Sentinel, May 9, 2014)

GuideWell Emergency Doctors and Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida will be owned by the same company, GuideWell Health, which has begun purchasing or opening doctors' practices in Largo, Tallahassee and now Winter Park. Some industry observers worry that insurance companies might discourage affiliated clinics from performing tests patients should have in order to cut unnecessary procedures that run up insurance bills.

EDUCATIONAL NEEDS & OBJECTIVES / ACCREDITATION

Educational Needs:

The field of urology covers a broad spectrum of both benign and malignant diseases of the genitourinary system, including the kidneys, ureters, bladder, prostate, urethra and male external genitalia. Clinical research evidence to guide the evidence-based practice of urology continues to involve rapidly; however, outside CME events, urologists have limited opportunity to familiarize themselves with evolving diagnostic and therapeutic approaches to the disease they treat on a day-to-day basis.

The objective of this meeting is to provide Florida urologists with a convenient opportunity to educate themselves about the state-of-the-art management of urological diseases and engage with expert faculty of national prominence. Particular emphasis will be provided to the recommendations from evidence-based clinical practice guidelines as well as continued quality improvement in urological patient care. For example, specific lecture sessions surrounding the treatment of prostate, bladder and kidney cancers by surgeons with exemplary experience and success in robotic surgery will increase surgeons' abilities to treat urologic cancer. It will also better address diagnoses for patients presenting with urologic cancer, leading to better patient outcomes.

In addition, controversies associated with the ever-expanding arena of hypogonadism and men's health can present a daunting challenge in terms of keeping up with the knowledge to safely and effectively treat patients. Erectile dysfunction and Peyronie's disease are examples of specific pathologic entities that present significant challenges for providers to address and successfully manage. It is important to have experts and panels discuss the new techniques and technologies in an evidence-based manner to advance the overall urology field of knowledge. National experts will address these current issues and present state-of-the-art information to attendees. The overall goal of the meeting is to provide an evidence-based pathway to discuss the current management of patients suffering from urologic diseases, ranging from GU oncology and stone disease to hypogonadism, erectile dysfunction, Peyronie's disease and male stress incontinence.

Educational Objectives:

At the conclusion of the FUS 66th Annual Meeting, attendees should be able to:

1. Identify key findings of published high-quality research studies related to urological oncology, stone disease and female urology that promise to impact the standard of care.

8. Describe evidence-based selection criteria for the choice of slings versus artificial sphincters for the management of refractory male urinary incontinence.
9. List prognostic criteria in elderly patients with renal masses relevant to clinical decision-making for total versus nephron-sparing surgery.
10. Identify the role of PSA screening and management of negative prostate biopsies.
11. Integrate the evidence-based recommendations of the 2013 clinical practice guidelines of the American Urological Association for the management castrate-refractory prostate cancer.
12. Describe frontiers in the application of robotic-assisted surgery in urology in the arenas of prostatic surgery, bladder cancer surgery and microsurgery with special emphasis on issues of learning curve and quality assurance.
13. Describe the evidence for open versus robotic-assisted laparoscopic-assisted radical cystectomy and the relative merits and risks of either approach.
14. Integrate robotic technology in the treatment of urologic oncology which will improve patient outcomes.
15. Describe the management of erectile dysfunction and the principles and complications with penile prosthetic surgery.
16. Describe the evaluation and medical and surgical management of Peyronie's disease.
17. Describe the evaluation and contemporary management of

female sexual dysfunction.

18. Describe the evaluation and management of premature ejaculation.
19. Describe the role and techniques associated with male sling products and the artificial urinary sphincter device.
20. Describe the history of the Florida Urological Society.

Nurse Practitioner & Physician Assistant Hands-On Session

Nuts & Bolts of Foley Catheter Insertion: A Hands-On Approach to Foley Catheter Insertion, Dilation Techniques, Cystoscopy, Stricture Management, Visual Foley Insertion, Supra-Pubic Catheter Insertion and Decreasing Catheter Related Events

Educational Needs:

Catheter-related events are gaining quite a bit of national interest and focus as we move to a more managed care type of medical care system. Although these events are relatively rare (0.001% to 0.003%), once urethral trauma occurs, it can lead to a significant amount of patient morbidity and increased health care costs. With the declining urology physician workforce and increasing aging patient population, it is likely that nurse practitioners and physician assistants may play a larger role in the management of difficult urethral catheterization (DUC). There is a paucity of structured hands-on training for nurse practitioners and physician assistants in DUC and this session is geared at meeting those needs and providing a foundation for further on-the-job training and application.

Educational Objectives:

At the conclusion of this session, attendees should be able to:

1. Explain the normal urethral anatomy and be more comfortable with Foley catheter insertion.
2. Describe dilation techniques for urethral strictures and become proficient in dealing with this issue.
3. Integrate cystoscopy technique along with tricks and tips.
4. Identify all treatment options for stricture disease.
5. Illustrate visual Foley catheter insertion.
6. Describe the basics and techniques of supra-pubic catheter insertion.
7. Recognize the risks and morbidity associated with catheter-related complications.
