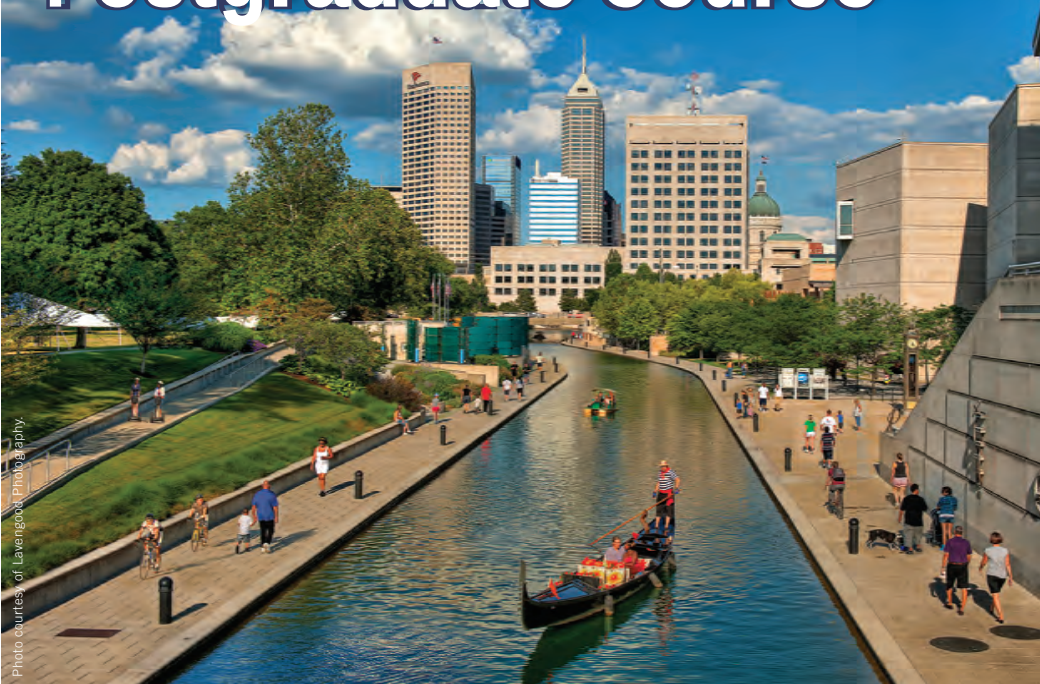

Program Description and Accreditation/CME

The introduction and advances of innovative diagnostic techniques and novel therapeutics has created an exciting range of approaches to many important areas of GI disease and patient care. The structure of the program includes a mix of didactic presentations delivered by expert faculty, interactive audience discussions as well as significant question and answer opportunities. 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2014 Midwest Regional Postgraduate Course

On Saturday afternoon, hands-on workshops and breakout sessions will be offered. Breakout sessions include Barrett's esophagus, celiac disease and non-celiac gluten sensitivity, personalized medicine, and new requirements and strategies for success with the GI Boards.
