THE CHOICE OF 7 ACTIVE LEARNING MODULES (ALMS)

The 2014 - 2016 RACGP triennium requires GPs to earn 130 CPD points of which 80 are compulsory Category 1 points and the remainder can be Category 2 points. CPR training is mandatory and earns five points.

The GPCE ALM program will afford you the opportunity to earn 40 of these Category 1 points per ALM. In addition, you can earn Category 2 points for additional sessions attended over the three days. You will need to complete a predisposing activity (details of which will be available via the Online Delegate Lounge – once registration is complete) as well as complete an evaluation and reinforcing activity after attending the ALM sessions.

PROCEDURAL GRANTS

There are three procedural grant streams available: Surgical Practical Medicine (ALM A), Management of the Emergency Patient in the General Practice & Remote Setting (ALM B) and Men's & Women's Health (ALM E). Proceduralists may be eligible for a one day grant (\$2,000). Eligibility for a one day grant is attendance at six sessions/hours in a procedural grant stream over one day. If you wish to apply for a procedural grant please contact Pauline Curtis at the RACGP on 08 8267 8351 or ACRRM on 1800 223 226 to confirm your eligibility. You will need to be registered in the Rural Procedural Grants Program prior to attending the GPCE.

Delegates must register for six sessions/hours within the same ALM stream over the 3 days of which at least four hours must be workshops.

Each ALM stream is coded with a letter on the program. Follow the particular letter to complete your registration.

S11A Gout – Advances in Knowledge and New Treatment Paradigms

Gout is an inflammatory arthritis caused by urate crystals. It is increasing in prevalence, especially amongst older adults. This presentation is an update on the new advances and treatment paradigms that emerging evidence has given us and will include the pathogenesis of gout, confident diagnosis and management options.

S12B Novel Oral Anticoagulants (NOACs) in Practice

This session will discuss the use of the NOACs in patients with non-valvular atrial fibrillation and how best to apply this knowledge to maximise patient care. Topics covered will include screening and detection of atrial fibrillation, assessing stroke and bleeding risk, applying clinical trial results to optimise patient care and practical considerations in managing patients suitable for NOACs.

S13B Gynaecologic Health Update – A Practical Approach to Assessing and Managing Heavy Bleeding

This gynaecologic health session for General Practitioners will focus on heavy menstrual bleeding as a symptom of a number of underlying conditions, including how to identify and treat the potential causes. Clinicians who attend this case study based seminar will learn about key considerations for differing age groups, including polycystic ovaries, sexual health and iron deficiency. In addition, a review of the changes to the National Cervical Screening Program and the impact of the HPV vaccine will be covered.

S14A The Role of the GP in Secondary Prevention for Myocardial Infarction and Unstable Angina Patients

This session will provide guidance to GPs on ACS management in Australia (PCI/CABG/medical management rates), the ongoing risk of secondary events and mortality for myocardial infarction and unstable angina patients, the importance of secondary prevention for myocardial infarction and unstable angina patients, guideline recommended therapies for myocardial infarction and unstable angina patients post discharge, the role of dual antiplatelet therapy in secondary prevention for both patients that receive a stent, and those who do not get revascularised i.e. medical management only. The current treatment gap in guideline recommended therapies, in particular dual antiplatelet therapy (data from SNAPSHOT, GRACE, ACACIA), the current oral antiplatelet therapies available and the role of the GP in coordinating care of patients after myocardial infarction or an unstable angina event and ensuring patients receive optimum therapy will also be discussed.

S15B Differential Diagnosis and Management of COPD and Asthma in General Practice

Management of COPD and asthma requires a different approach based on the National Asthma Council and Lung Foundation Australia Guidelines. The session aims to equip the General Practitioner with practical advice to ensure the correct diagnosis and to clarify the appropriate management for patients with these conditions.

S21B The Role of Cholesterol in the Diet and the Risk of Metabolic Syndrome, Type 2 Diabetes and Cardiovascular Disease

This session will provide an overview of dietary cholesterol and its link to metabolic syndrome, type 2 diabetes and CVD. Simple, straightforward dietary advice has the potential to help lower LDL and total serum cholesterol in patients at risk, therefore reducing the risk of cardiovascular disease. Numerous studies have investigated the effects of dietary cholesterol on serum cholesterol levels. The findings were that dietary cholesterol has little or no effect on blood cholesterol and diets high in saturated fat have a greater impact on blood cholesterol levels and associated health risks than dietary cholesterol. This presentation will provide you with an overview of the latest research as well as practical advice relevant for your practice.

S22A Recurrent Fertility Failures

Recurrent fertility failures is a combination of both the inability to fall pregnant as well as the reasons WHY the pregnancy fails. Current research into why a pregnancy fails can be linked to chromosomal abnormalities and genetic disorders. In women 35 years and older, approximately 35% of pregnancies are miscarried, chromosomal defect account for 50% or more of these losses. The method of CGH testing has the potential to eliminate unnecessary miscarriages by prioritising chromosomally normal embryos for transfer, therefore increasing fertility outcomes and IVF success. This presentation will give evidence to show the science behind the technology that is CGH (Comparative Genomic Hybridisation).

S32A Key Nutrients for Australian Pregnant Women – Reviewing Evidence and Addressing Patient Needs

This seminar discusses current recommendations and evidence on key essential nutrients for your pregnant patients. Research has shown that Australian women have inadequate levels of a number of key nutrients including vitamin D, iron and iodine. For example an estimated 20% of Australian women in their reproductive years have low or marginal levels of iron. Currently supplementation is recommended in pregnancy, but at what level and at what stage? This seminar discusses the latest clinically relevant information to assist you in recommending appropriate nutrient forms and dosages. Consequences of inadequate key nutrients levels will be discussed, including recent research demonstrating that even mild iodine deficiency during gestation can be associated with neurocognitive sequelae. Approaches to achieving optimal nutrient levels will also be covered.

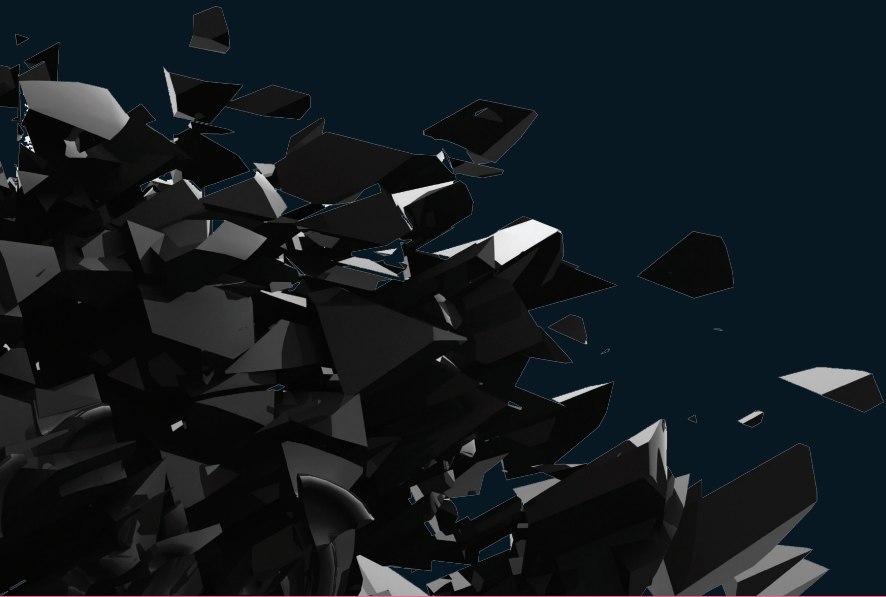
