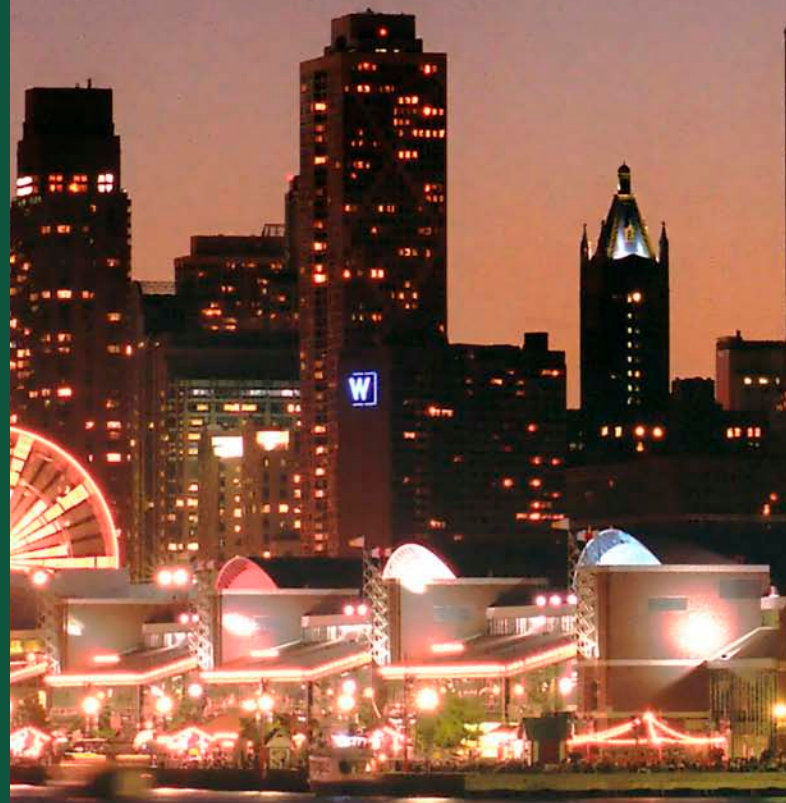

SHEDD AQUARIUM & FIELD MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

We'll dive right in for a wet and wild adventure at Chicago's Shedd Aquarium. Follow the call of the whales through a spruce and cedar rain forest to the water's edge. GLESSNER AND CLARKE HISTORIC HOMES

Explore the historic Glessner and Clarke Homes, located just south of Chicago's busy Loop. These two incredible monuments of Chicago's history are uniquely important and help to explain the roots and culture of the city.

The historic Glessner House was designed by Henry Hobson Richardson and not only served as an inspiration to a young Frank Lloyd Wright, but also helped to reform domestic architecture in the late 19th Century. This National Historic Landmark and museum protects and conserves an outstanding collection of 19th and early 20th Century furniture and decorative art objects. The fortress like landmark brings the past to life from the glamour of the Gilded Age to the vast cultural changes surrounding World War I, to the excitement of the Jazz Age and Prohibition.

Just a short stroll away is the Clarke House, Chicago's oldest building, surviving the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. Built in 1836, the Clarke House is the only place in the city to see how early Chicago families lived with original furnishings and wallpaper from the early nineteenth century. An informative timeline display in the basement explains how the rich histories of the house and the city are intertwined. This restored Greek Revival home and museum is also famous for having been moved three times from its original location and is an important part of Chicago's history.

ERNEST HEMINGWAY MUSEUM AND HOME

Hemingway's Birthplace is a good place to begin to explore the roots of the author's life and art. This Queen Anne house, built by his maternal grandparents and recently restored, is as it was when Ernest lived there. Born in a second floor bedroom on July 21, 1899, young Ernest spent his first six years in these grand rooms rich with Victorian decor.

On the first floor, Hemingway joined his family in Grandfather Abba's Bible readings and prayers. His mother, Grace Hall Hemingway, gave music lessons in the parlor. The top floor of the tower was a mini-museum, where Ernest's father, Dr. Clarence Hemingway, kept his wildlife specimens. Grace's uncle, Tyley Hancock, who roomed on the second floor, had traveled widely. Ernest listened avidly to his colorful tales, and acted out poems and stories from the family's well-stocked library.

Just a short walk from the birthplace, the Ernest Hemingway Museum is host to permanent and temporary exhibits that explore the author's life. Kiosks fashioned from historic doors hold exhibits of rare photos and artifacts, including Hemingway's childhood diary and the famous letter from nurse Agnes von Kurowsky-later portrayed in A Farewell to Arms- ending their engagement.

ACOG Junior Fellow in Practice (RG02): Must be an obstetrician and or gynecologist who is a recent graduate from an allopathic approved residency program. Junior Fellowship is also available to physicians in Argentina, Central America, Chile, Dominican Republic, Mexico, and the West Indies. Processing of completed applications may take two to four weeks. Incomplete applications may take longer. ACOG admits and activates qualified candidates on a monthly basis.

ACOG Junior Fellow in Training (RG03): Must be an obstetrician-gynecologist resident, in an approved program (United States and Canada). Junior Fellowship is also available to residents in Argentina, Central America, Chile, Dominican Republic, Mexico, and the West Indies. Processing of completed applications may take 2-4 weeks.

ACOG Life Fellow/Fellow Senior Status (RG04): Life Fellow is a Fellow who has fully retired from any professional activity with 25 years of active Fellowship status and attainment of age 65. Fellow Senior Status is a Fellow engaged part-time in any professional activity with 25 years of active Fellow status and attainment of age 60. Processing of completed applications may take two weeks.

ACOG Associate Member (RG05): Any physician who has given valuable service in obstetrics and/or gynecology and who is not eligible to be a Fellow. Practicing board-certified physicians of other specialties in the geographic confines of ACOG may apply for membership under this category. Practicing osteopathic board-certified ob-gyns physicians in the geographic confines of ACOG may apply for membership under this category. Practicing non-board-certified ob-gyns in the geographic confines of ACOG may apply for membership under this category. Processing of completed applications may take four months. Incomplete applications may take longer. ACOG admits and activates qualified candidates on a monthly basis.

ACOG Educational Affiliate (RG06): An individual in a medical education or training program that would not qualify for physician membership or a certified health care professional may apply. Applicants must provide patient care. Processing of completed applications may take two to four weeks. Incomplete applications may take longer.

Resident, Non-ACOG (RG07): A graduate and licensed physician receiving training in a specialty in a hospital and is not a member of the College.

Physician, Non-ACOG (RG08): A physician who is not a member of the College and who provides direct women's healthcare clinical services to patients.

Other Healthcare Professional (RG09): An individual who provides hands-on, direct patient healthcare services or is engaged in women's healthcare research and who is not in any of the membership categories of the College or is not a physician. These individuals may include, but are not limited to, nurses, midwives, physician's assistants, sonographers, radiology technicians, etc. This category does not include individuals who work for medical industry companies.

Medical Student (RG10): An individual currently enrolled in medical school (MD, DO) at an accredited institution. Not open to other types of students. Processing of completed applications may take two to four weeks. Submission of your application is done electronically. Medical students must show identification from an accredited institution when their registration packets are picked up onsite.

Spouse/Guest (RG11): Is defined as a spouse, significant other, friend, or an adult child age 18 or older who wishes to attend the meeting but does not wish to receive continuing medical education (CME) credits or cognates. An exhibitor, co-worker, or an associate of an exhibitor does not qualify for the guest registration category. A registered spouse or guest is allowed to attend the symposia sessions, the Welcome Reception and to visit the exhibit hall.
