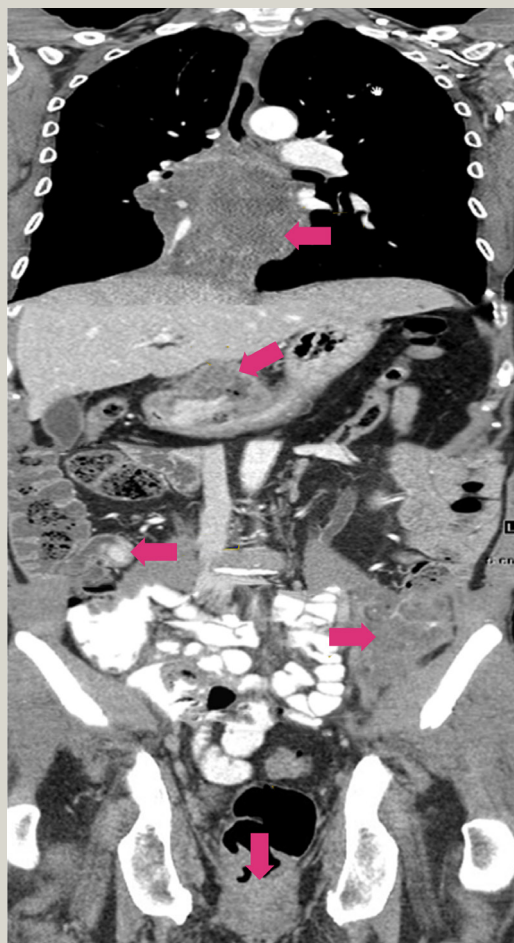

OVERVIEW

This will be a comprehensive course covering imaging of esophageal, gastric, small intestinal and colorectal cancers. It will consist of two days of lectures and multidisciplinary tumor boards. The lectures and tumor boards will be given by radiologists, surgeons, medical oncologists and radiation oncologists. Lectures are 15-40 minutes and will utilize an audience response system which will have questions embedded in each lecture.

The lectures and tumor boards are clustered into sessions. The first day will start with Esophageal Cancer, followed by Gastric Cancer and then Small Bowel Cancer. The second day will cover Colon, Rectal and Anal Cancers. Each lecture will emphasize emerging or existing tumor metric systems to use clinically and in research. This conference will make attendees aware of national protocols and radiologic/nuclear medicine standards that are currently being used or explored.

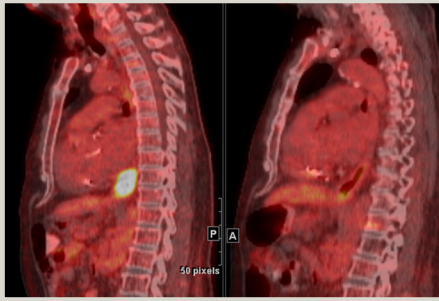
The target audience for this course includes Radiologists as well as GI Medical Oncologists, GI Surgical Oncologists, Gastroenterologists, and Radiation Oncologists.

By attending this symposium, attendees will:

- Understand the scope and demographics of gastrointestinal cancers
- Explain the role of imaging in screening, staging, restaging and surveillance
- Become aware of challenges and limitations of imaging modalities and of various response assessment metrics
- Outline the standard of care treatment for each cancer and the role of the multidisciplinary team approach
- Recognize the most recent trends in treatment and diagnosis and ongoing clinical trials
- Describe treatment side effects and their imaging appearances
- Create added-value reporting templates at their institution or practice that will carry forward and will implement acquired knowledge into practice

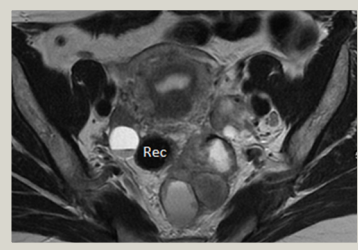

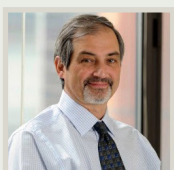

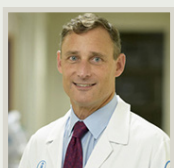

1. Patient has residual minimal FDG activity. At surgery this was pCR
2. Sagittal image; superior wall near liver
3. 0.6cm RLD focus unresected
4. Diverticulosis/myochohosis only on endoscopy
5. Left Obturator node; not routinely resected
6. SCC; typical necrotic/cystic nodes; rare with AdenoCa
