Education and social activities

The focus of ATU 2015 is *Advancing therapeutic knowledge and medication management*. It is designed to improve pharmacists' knowledge in key therapeutic areas with the aim of improving the health outcomes of patients. There will be opportunities to talk to friends and colleagues, build relationships with allied health professionals and take advantage of exhibitor promotions.

Friday 6 March

Up to 17 Group 2 CPD credits

Join us for a late start on day one which will allow you to travel to Terrigal in the morning. Start your three-day conference experience with tailored clinical practice workshops. These interactive, case study based workshops will allow you to focus on key therapeutic areas.

Immunisation and anaphylaxis

This immunisation workshop will provide you with a valuable opportunity to expand your healthcare role within community pharmacy and increase your skills base. You will gain a heightened understanding of the Australian Immunisation Program, how to prepare and safely administer vaccines as well as how to manage adverse events. The Australasian Society of Clinical Immunology and Allergy (ASCIA) will also present at this session. ASCIA will cover the signs, symptoms, treatment and management of anaphylaxis including demonstration of adrenaline autoinjector.

Balancing outcomes in opioid replacement therapy

Opioid-related problems, including addiction, are increasing in Australia hence more pharmacists are likely to have contact with such patients. Provision of opioid replacement therapy through community pharmacy carries many benefits, however it also presents challenges to the community and to pharmacists.

This workshop will raise the public health and clinical issues relating to the abuse and misuse of opioids and opioid substitution, and encourage much needed discussion to find some clinical and ethical solutions.

Stroke; types, treatment and prevention

Stroke is Australia's second biggest killer after coronary heart disease and is among the top causes of disability. In 2014 there are 437,000 people living with the effects of stroke, and this is expected to increase to 709,000 in 2032. Hence, the role of healthcare professionals in raising awareness of the risk factors for stroke, its prevention and treatment within the community will become increasingly important. This workshop will help pharmacists apply the latest stroke guidelines into clinical practice and reduce the burden of this disease on the health care system.



Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) course

Get ready for immunisation training and ensure that your CPR Certificate is current; although the First Aid Certificate is valid for three years, the CPR component requires an annual refresher.

The CPR course delivers the essential principles, skills and knowledge to maintain or restore breathing and circulation in an adult, child or infant. The course content is based on the policies and standards of the Australian Resuscitation Council. It is recommended by the Australian Resuscitation Council that you update your CPR skills every 12 months.

The Saturday sessions will feature specialist clinical speakers who will focus on key therapeutic areas. The morning presentations will provide you with the foundations to explore these therapeutic areas, while the afternoon interactive case workshops will build on the morning presentations and allow you to explore the topics in more detail.

The evolving role of pharmacists in the treatment of Hepatitis C

Community pharmacists are in a key position to raise awareness, provide education and decrease social stigma associated with Hepatitis C. By actively promoting the health of the individual and the community, pharmacists can enable people to take greater control of their own health.

Pharmacists are in an ideal position to improve the treatment of patients with chronic Hepatitis C by providing information about the disease including its treatments and associated adverse events, while also emphasising the importance of treatment adherence for successful outcomes. This session will update pharmacists on current treatment options for Hepatitis C, and the various considerations for tailoring treatment to individual patients.

Dermatological manifestations of systemic diseases

Dermatologic complaints are some of the most common conditions presented to pharmacists. This session will discuss possible causes of the complaints, which in some cases may be manifestations of more serious underlying systemic diseases that require additional treatment.

Medicines and ageing: past, present and future

This session will identify physiological changes in ageing that affect the absorption and therapeutic efficacy of medicines in the older person. We will also look at the adverse events that occur as a consequence of poor medication management and adherence.

Managing the aches and pains of Osteoarthritis

According to a report released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW), arthritis and other musculoskeletal conditions were listed as Australia's fourth most expensive group of diseases. This session will provide an overview of osteoarthritis (OA), including a discussion of preventive measures, diagnostic assessment and various therapeutic options available. The session will also highlight some of the outcome measures and treatment guidelines used for OA.

Drug interactions that matter

Drug–drug interactions arise when the effects of one drug are altered by the co-administration of another. The clinical response seen depends on many factors, including individual patient characteristics such as age, co-morbidities and pharmacogenetics.

In Australia's ageing population there is an emergence of new drugs and an increasing prevalence of polypharmacy, therefore additional efforts are needed to avoid drug interactions and inappropriate prescribing. Although dispensing programs can help to reduce the number of drug interactions, a risk–benefit evaluation by the pharmacist is also required. This session will outline some of the more common interactions faced by pharmacists and the course of action needed.

Medicines and pregnancy

Become informed in the treatment of pregnancy by revisiting fundamental and emerging data on medicines in pregnancy through each trimester. This session will provide comprehensive information on specific disease states and the pivotal impact they have in pregnancy, and explore the crucial role of pharmacists during this stage.

Professor Andrew McLachlan

Professor Andrew McLachlan is a pharmacist, academic, teacher and researcher with experience in clinical and experimental pharmacology and research into the quality use of medicines. He is

Professor of Pharmacy (Aged Care) in the Faculty of Pharmacy at the University of Sydney based at Concord Hospital. His research focuses on understanding the causes and consequences of variability in response to medicines and how this informs the quality use of medicines.

Professor David Hunter

MBBS MSc PhD FRACP



Professor Hunter is a rheumatology clinician researcher whose main research focus has been clinical and translational research in osteoarthritis (OA). He is the Florance and Cope

Chair of Rheumatology and Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney and the Royal North Shore Hospital, and Consultant Rheumatologist at North Sydney Orthopaedic and Sports Medicine Centre. He is an Associate Editor for Osteoarthritis and Cartilage, an advisory editor for the premier rheumatology journal Arthritis Care and Research, an associate editor for BMC Musculoskeletal Disorders and part of the review committee for OA for the American College of Rheumatology, EULAR and OARS scientific meetings. He established the OA Imaging Group and the annual imaging workshop (now up to its 7th Annual meeting with over 100 international multidisciplinary delegates each year). He is also a Chair of the International OA Biomarkers Workshop. Professor Hunter has over 300 peer reviewed publications in international journals, numerous book chapters, has co-authored a number of books, and recently completed his second book on self-management strategies for the lay public.

Dr Victor O'Toole has practiced as a specialist in Obstetrics and Gynaecology for over thirty years. He is a Fellow of both the Royal College of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (London)

and the Royal Australian College of Obstetrics and Gynaecology. He is currently Director of Gynaecology at Strathfield Private Hospital.

Associate Professor Mark Danta

A gastroenterologist and hepatologist, Associate Professor Mark Danta is a staff specialist with the Department of Gastroenterology and Hepatology at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney and a Clinical

Academic with the Faculty of Medicine, UNSW. He has a Bachelor of Medicine (University of Newcastle 1992), a Diploma of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (University of London 1996), a Masters degree in Public Health (University of Sydney 2002), a Doctorate in Medicine (University of London, 2006) and is a Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians (2002). Associate Professor Danta also holds an academic position as Senior Lecturer in Medicine at the University of New South Wales, Sydney, based at St Vincent's where he teaches medicine in the undergraduate degree course. He is also Postgraduate Coordinator for higher degrees on the St Vincent's campus for the University of New South Wales.
