

August 2 – Civitavecchia (Rome), Italy



Plan your time here carefully, as the Eternal City's sights are endless: The Colosseum, the Forum, the Sistine Chapel, the Vatican, Venice Square, Trajan Markets, Spanish Steps, the Trevi Fountain, and so much more. Countless museums and art galleries are also to be found. Additionally, some of Italy's finest shopping incorporates entire streets: Via Nazionale, Via del Corso, Via Frattina, Piazza di Spagna, and Via del Tritone.

August 3 – Naples, Italy



School children everywhere know the story of Pompeii and the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius that destroyed it. In real life, Pompeii is even more impressive; meticulous excavation has bared the soul of a city frozen in time since 79 AD. Perfectly preserved, you'll gain an insight into the lives of the ancient Romans as you discover baths, theaters, temples, markets, and the huge forum. For a breath of fresh air, sail across the bay to the flowery Isle of Capri or visit the ostentatious boutiques of Sorrento, a village brimming with character and overflowing with picturesque street scenes and charming people. Sorrento inspired the Greeks' and Romans' art and industry, and you will find an extraordinary collection of wood work, mosaics, furniture, embroidery, and porcelain.

August 4 – Palermo, Sicily, Italy



Due to several changes in power over its history, Palermo is a fascinating combination of seemingly conflicting characteristics. Traces of Roman, Arab, and Norman influences mix here creating a vast range of architectural styles, a fusion of delicious ingredients used in local dishes, and many place names which are anything but Italian. Visit the Norman Palace with its golden Byzantine mosaics, the Arab markets with their splendid array of sights smells

and sounds, the Palatine Chapel in Palermo, and the Duomo of Monreale.

August 5 – La Goulette (Tunis), Tunisia



Tunis, the nearby capital, offers a bustling medina as well as the Bardo Museum, famed for its collection of mosaics and major finds from nearby Carthage, once the glorious rival of Rome.

August 7 – Livorno (Florence), Italy



The beautiful Italian seaport of Livorno is the gateway to Florence, Pisa and Tuscany's vast wine country. Pisa is most noted for its famous marble bell tower, the Leaning Tower of Pisa, which has tilted 14 feet since 1370.

August 8 – Calvi, France



Rumored to be the birthplace of Christopher Columbus, Calvi is a small and stunningly beautiful beach resort town on the Island of Corsica (known to be the birthplace of Napoléon Bonaparte). Visit Notre Dame de la Serra Chapel and take in 360° views of the bay and surrounding mountains; explore the centuries-old fortress Citadel of Calvi, a remarkable example of Genoese architecture; and relish time relaxing on one of Corsica's secluded white sand beaches.

August 9 – Monte Carlo, Monaco



The principality of Monaco is the essence of the Riviera: couture fashion, grand yachts, nightlife centered on its famed Casino.



August 10 – Saint Raphael, France



The harbor on this island was created by a volcano in 1,500 BC and the effect is still explosive: 1,000 foot-high cliffs rise from sea level and dazzling white houses cling to the cliffs. Santorini offers a wealth of scenery. Visit the Mountain of Prophet Elias 2,000 feet above sea level offering panoramic views of the island. From the caldera viewpoint, you can see how Santorini's three islands form a crater rim left by a massive eruption in 1,600 BC. Agios Nektarios

is a typically striking Cycladic with a blue and white facade, stone latticework, and an octagonal cupola – an excellent photo opportunity. Travel to Kamari fishing village, once the ancient port of Thera, famed for its dramatic black sand beach. Don't miss Fira, Santorini's largest town. Here you will see whitewashed houses that cling to steep volcanic cliffs. Accessible only by foot, Fira's narrow cobblestone lanes lead uphill past shops, homes, and cafes.

August 11 – At Sea

August 12 – Barcelona, Spain – Overnight



Barcelona is considered to be a genuine open-air museum filled with charming streets and the hustle and bustle of everyday life. While away the day exploring tree-shaded Las Ramblas, Spain's version of the Champs-Elysees, shop for exquisite Lladro ceramics, or ponder the otherworldly architecture of the Church of the Sacred Family, Gaudi's masterpiece. This is a sight not to be missed. It was started in 1882, but is still unfinished. Take a short ride to Figueres to enjoy the Dali Museum or to Sant Sadurni d'Anoia, location of the Codorniu Champagne Cellars. Tour the Gothic Quarter and Santa Maria dei Mar Church, considered by many to be the best example of Gothic architecture in Cataluna. Then visit the Picasso Museum, situated in the two beautifully preserved Gothic palaces of Berenguer Aguilar and Baron de Castellet.

August 13 – Barcelona, Spain – Disembark
