Dear Colleagues,

The highlight of the year for the Mid-America Orthopaedic Association is the annual meeting, so it is my pleasure to announce the preliminary program for 2015. It promises to be a great meeting in a fantastic location. Hilton Head in late April should be prime season to welcome us from the Mid-America region. The Westin at the Port Royal Plantation is on the beach, and the facilities are perfect for the meeting. A championship tennis center and three golf courses at Port Royal will be ready to test our members and guests.

But most important to the meeting will be the outstanding scientific program put together by Brian Wolf, the Program Chair. In addition to breakouts, plenary papers, and award papers featuring some of the latest research in the Mid-America region, there will be symposia in each of the three plenary sessions. These will be on controversies in fracture care moderated by Marc Swiontkowski with talks from Classics Speakers, Jim Kellam and Doug Dirschl, (Thursday); the future of healthcare moderated by the Presidential Guest Speaker, Stuart Weinstein, with a talk from the Rapp Lecturer, Josh Jacobs, (Friday); and treatment of unicompartmental knee disease moderated by Craig Della Valle (Saturday). These symposia with synthesized information will be added to our already outstanding research meeting and they will be the major difference to our standard format. The Program Committee will be interested in your feedback on this variation in format. Similar to last year, there will be afternoon sessions – Thursday on fracture cases and on Friday, Craig Mahoney will moderate a session on practice management.

The guest speakers are absolutely outstanding and they will enhance our meeting and enrich the program. I am thrilled they have agreed to join us. They are all leading figures in orthopedic surgery and personal friends of mine. They will speak on subjects where they are national and international experts, and in addition to their featured talk, they will all participate in other areas of the program that I have highlighted in this letter.

The Steel Lecturer on Friday evening will be Iowa wrestling icon, Olympic gold medal winner, and one of the greatest coaches in NCAA history, Dan Gable. Dan's insights into what it takes to persevere, overcome obstacles, and succeed at the highest levels should not be missed.

Resident participation will be another highlight of the 2015 meeting. We have 259 scientific podium and 114 poster presentations on the program, and we estimate that two-thirds of them will be given by residents – most of whom will be supported to attend by Mid-America residency programs and by MAOA resident grants. Residents presenting their research is a core feature of the Mid-America meeting. In addition to Brian, I would like to thank the Program Committee members Drs. Craig Della Valle, Jeffrey Macalena, Benjamin Miller, Amy Moeller, and Michael Taunton who reviewed and graded all of the abstracts.

Dr. Jeffrey Macalena has put together a great pre-meeting course which will take place on Wednesday. The topic will be "The Athlete's Knee: Meniscus, Ligament, Cartilage, and Patellofemoral" and in addition to great speakers from the Mid-America region, one of the Classics Speakers, Chris Harner, will join the program. I hope many of you will want to spend an additional day in Hilton Head and put this outstanding program on your schedule. I bet you will be glad you did!

Topics will include metacarpal fractures, open injuries (gun shot, animal bites, fight bites), radius fractures, ulnar fractures, arthroscopically-assisted fracture reduction and fixation, ulnar collateral ligament repair of the thumb, bridge plating of the radius, scaphoid nonunion management à la Malerich, compartment syndrome management, among other common diagnoses. The goals of this instructional course are to increase the diagnostic skills and to provide treatment approaches for the practicing orthopedic surgeon and to improve their patient outcomes in the context of current research.
