Professor Jean-Daniel Chiche

Professor Chiche is a full Professor of Critical Care Medicine (Paris Descartes University), currently working in the Medical Intensive Care Unit of Cochin University Hospital in Paris. He graduated as MD in Paris, studied in Liege for 4 years (Belgium), and obtained a PhD after a 3-year research fellowship

at the Massachusetts General Hospital (Harvard Medical School) in Boston. His clinical interest lies in the field of acute respiratory failure and sepsis.

He also holds an appointment as Research Director at the Cochin Institute (INSERM U1016) where he develops an independent research program spanning various aspects of the biology of Toll-like receptors, innate immunity and variability of the inflammatory response. He has written numerous papers in peer-reviewed scientific journals and is a regular reviewer for major international journals. He has extensive experience as an investigator and DSMB member on major international studies in sepsis and ARDS.

Member of several scientific international societies, Professor Chiche is the current President of the European Society of Intensive Care Medicine (ESICM). He is also Member of the Steering Committee of the Surviving Sepsis Campaign, President of the European Board of Intensive Care Medicine, and Member of the Steering Committee of ISARIC (International Severe Acute Respiratory Infections Consortium).



Professor Arjen Dondorp

Arjen Dondorp trained as an intensive care and infectious diseases physician in the Netherlands. He is a Professor of Tropical Medicine at the University of Oxford, U.K. and Deputy Director and Head of Malaria Research at the Mahidol Oxford Tropical Medicine Research Unit, Faculty of Tropical

Medicine, Mahidol University, Bangkok, Thailand. His main research interests include the pathophysiology and treatment of severe malaria, antimalarial drug resistance and care for critically ill patients in resource limited settings.



Professor Charles Gomersall

Professor Gomersall trained in Medicine and Anaesthesia in London and Intensive Care in Hong Kong. Career choices seem to have consisted of a series of accidents: chose medicine because I couldn't think of anything better to do. Developed an interest in Intensive Care after becoming

unemployed and doing a locum in Intensive Care. I became interested in teaching after returning to London as a consultant and deciding that teaching was preferable to doing everything myself and developed an enforced interest in respiratory epidemics as a result of SARS arriving in Hong Kong. Only claim to fame is conning some friends (ex-friends?) into writing BASIC. Still a bit surprised that anyone wants to hear what I have to say and constantly amazed by the success of BASIC (I wish I could say it was all planned).



Professor Sunit Singhi

Dr Sunit Singhi is Head Department of Paediatrics and Paediatric Critical Care at India's Premier medical Institution, Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education and Research, Chandigarh. He is current President of World Federation of Paediatric Intensive and Critical Care Societies and was Vice President in

2012-13. An Associate Editor of Paediatric Critical Care Medicine, he is a fellow of National Academy of Medical Sciences and American College of Critical Care Medicine, Indian Academy of Paediatrics, Indian College of Critical Care.

Professor Singhi has received Swasth Bharat Award for Paediatrics 2011, for contribution to public health care system in India, Amrut Mody Unichem Prize 2010 of Indian Council of Medical Research for research in child health, Dr. K L Wig Oration National Academy of Medical Sciences for contributions to develop and conduct of Paediatric Advanced Life Support and Basic Intensive Care courses all over the country, a Life-Time Achievement Award of Indian Society of Critical Care Medicine, along with several medals, orations and best paper prizes.

Professor Singhi was instrumental in starting India's first Paediatric Intensive care Unit and first post-doctoral DM Course in Paediatric Critical Care and several Paediatric Subspecialties at PGIMER.

Professor Singhi has made significant original contributions in the understanding of fluid, electrolytes and body water compartments in bacterial meningitis, pneumonia and newborns with help of more than a dozen research grants from WHO, ICMR, CCMRC, INCLIN and Sweden.

Professor Singhi has more than 350 research papers in Indexed Journals, four books and 55 book chapters to his credit. He is current Chairman, Research Committee of Indian Society of Critical Care Medicine, and is engaged in collaborative research with Karolinska Institute, Stockholm, Sweden, on biomarkers in CNS infections in children.



Associate Professor Peter John Victor

Peter is presently working as an Intensivist at the Christian Medical College (CMC) Hospital, Vellore, India. He joined for MBBS in 1982 at CMC and went on to complete MD and DNB in General Medicine in 1994. In 1998, he came to Australia for critical care training and successfully completed FRACP in 2005, obtaining dual accreditation in general medicine and intensive care. In 2007, he was awarded the Fellow of the Joint Faculty of Intensive Care Medicine (FJFICM) and in 2010 Fellow of the College of Intensive Care Medicine (FCICM). More recently, in 2012, he was awarded the Fellow of the Indian College of Intensive Care Medicine (FICCM). He is also a member of the National Academy of Medical Sciences (NAMS), Delhi from 2008.

During under-graduate and post-graduate training, Peter won several academic awards including the undergraduate research award and the Jacob Memorial Prize for the Best and Excellent Care to patients as a postgraduate trainee. He was nominated twice for the best teacher award at The Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Adelaide in 2001 and 2002 and was adjudged the Best Teaching registrar in 2003. He is actively committed to teaching both undergraduates and postgraduates in medicine and trainees in critical care medicine.

Peter has over 100 publications in national and international journals and books. He has made several presentations in national and international scientific forums. He has the distinction of having won both the Felicity Hawker Medal and the Matt Spence Medal for the best paper presentations in the same year at the Annual Scientific Conferences of the Joint Faculty of Intensive Care Medicine and the Australian New Zealand Intensive Care Society. He was one of the Editors of 'Critical Care Update', an annual publication in critical care with relevance to India between 2006 and 2010 and is currently a member of the editorial board for the Indian Journal of Critical Care Medicine. He had peer reviewed for several leading journals including British Medical Journal, Critical Care Medicine, Clinical Toxicology, PLoS Medicine, Clinical Chemistry and Laboratory Medicine, Respiratory Care, Acta Anaesthesiologica Scandinavica and Regulatory Toxicology and Pharmacology.

Apart from academic activities, Peter holds several administrative positions in the institution including head of medical intensive care and pharmacy services. He is also a member of the hospital infection control committee and the clinical epidemiology unit.

Critical Care in a Disaster Zone – “When you’re under pressure and the gases are not!”

Discussion and demonstration on delivery of critical care in a decompensated disaster zone with limited field hospital facilities. WORKSHOP 2

An Introduction to Paediatric Non Invasive Ventilation and High Flow

Non Invasive Ventilation (NIV) and High Flow Nasal Prong (HFNP) oxygen therapy has become an integral part of Adult Intensive Care Practice. Its utilisation in Paediatric patients requires some additional knowledge and equipment.

This two hour seminar will outline the setup and application of NIV and HFNP to the full age spectrum of Paediatric patients, where its application may not only safely defer intubation but in many cases, avoid it altogether.

It will cover choice of delivery system, practical assembly and troubleshooting of Bubble CPAP, Paediatric NIV and Highflow as well as sedation options for establishing and maintaining patient comfort and tolerance.

This seminar is ideal for the occasional Paediatric practitioner or those looking to expand Paediatric services within their unit.

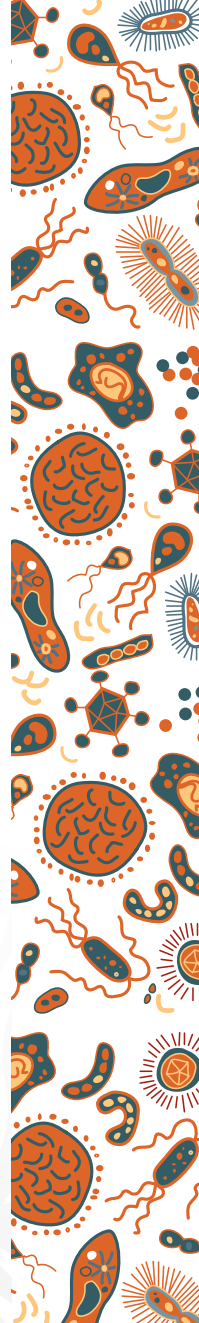

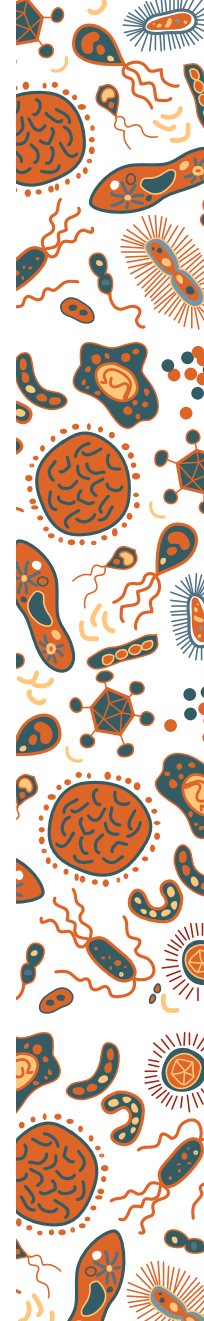

What do Directors want when looking for new specialists to employ?

Date: Friday 29th May

Do you have a clear plan of where you are going to work as a consultant? If not, you are not alone. Workforce and employment are at the forefront of many trainees and new fellows' minds. 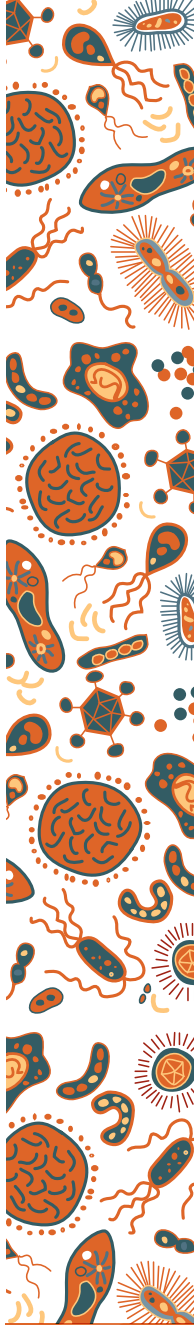
