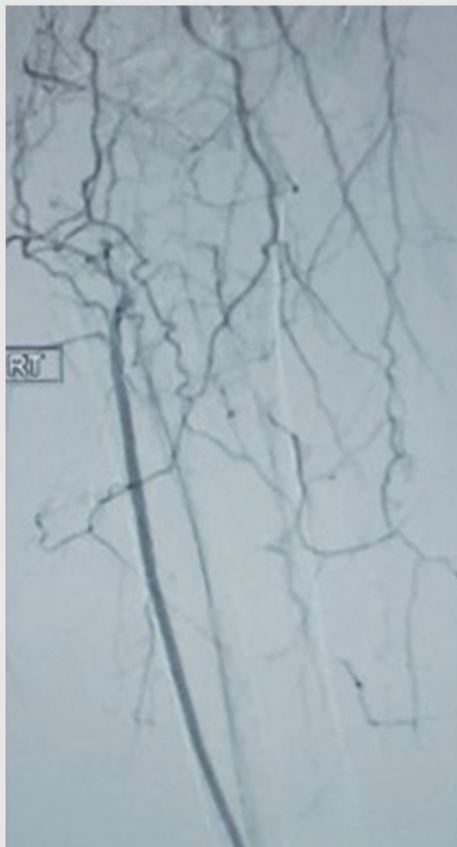

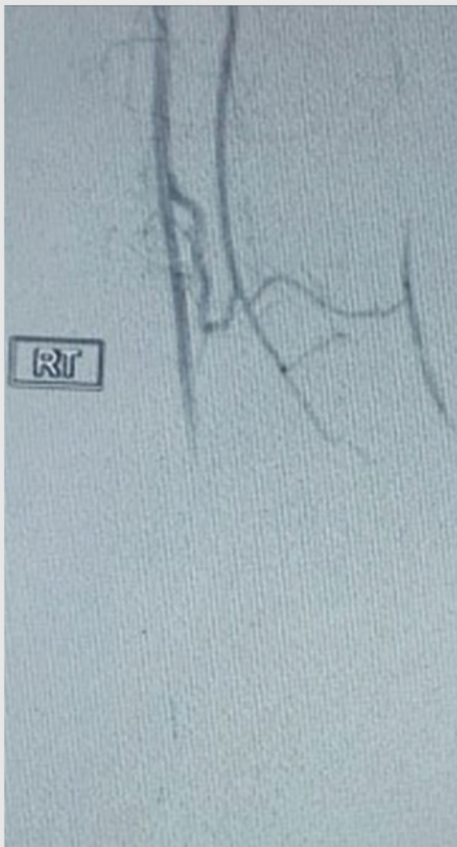

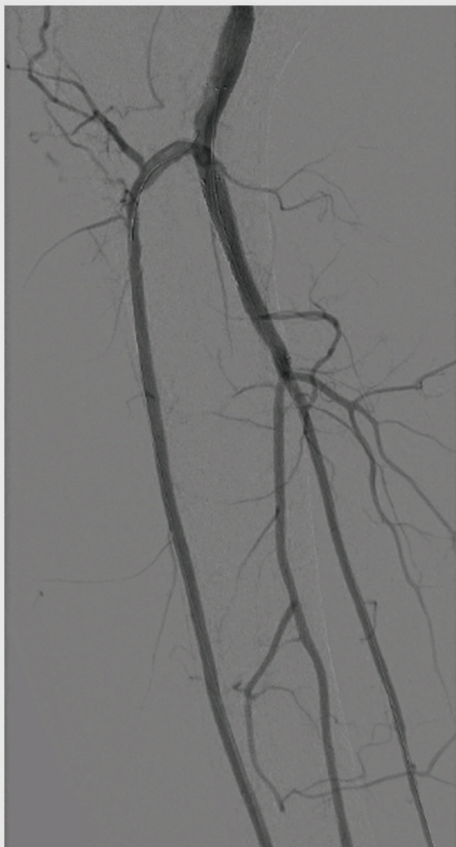

60-year-old female with Rutherford Class 6 is scheduled for above-the-knee amputation on following day if revascularization is not successful on date of procedure. Antegrade access and double retrograde access revealed hibernating peroneal and posterior tibial arteries.

AFTER 2

Complex revascularization reconnected all three vessels to popliteal resulting in three vessel runoff and immediate resolution of severe rest pain.
