And speaking of magnificent, the Scientific Assembly Committee (SAC) — with the dedicated work of chair Sheila Fallon Friedlander, MD — has outdone itself once again to create a truly stellar program, one that is both diverse and comprehensive. I encourage you to delve into the program and find the sessions that will enlighten and stimulate you, as well as sessions that will enhance your practice when you return home.

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"If it's dry, wet it...if it's wet, dry it.....and if that doesn't work, throw some steroids at it."

The 2018 AAD Summer Meeting completely demolishes that "urban legend" about our specialty, and provides us with a view to the phenomenal advancements in our field that make dermatology an academically rigorous field of medicine.

We now possess an even larger "therapeutic toolbox" that has eclipsed "drying, wetting, and adding steroids." Bruce Thiers, MD, will give the Plenary lecture that will walk us through our therapeutic history, and the vast number of treatment options that have supplanted the "wet it, dry it" era with those of sound biological basis and specific mechanism of action.

Another of our Plenary lecturers — birthmark guru Veronica Kinsler, MD, PhD — will explain how genetic characterization of birthmarks has revolutionized our understanding of their etiology. This new genetic comprehension has also allowed us to better categorize lesions and consider more innovative therapies.

Eric Simpson, MD, will carry the "genetics leads to better therapeutics" message forward by focusing on atopic dermatitis. This master clinician-scientist will review both prophylactic and therapeutic options that are anticipated to improve the lives of many patients.

Understanding and treating cutaneous malignancies remains the bedrock of dermatologic practice. Chrysalyn Schmults, MD, will discuss of the increasing risk of cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma, and provide new insights on the concept of "field cancerization," immunosuppression-associated SCC, and the importance of risk stratification and appropriate therapy.

Guest speaker Christine Sinsky, MD, will go "in search of joy in medicine" by offering ways to use innovation and practice design, while exploring how physician well-being affects patient outcomes. This will all be emphasized around the adage that "care of the patient requires care of the provider."

Furthermore, the Summer Meeting continues to evolve with the popularity and impact of our hands-on workshops. These sessions address a variety of topics including nails, surgery, scar revision, and fillers. Our "Patient Experience" hands-on sessions also address difficult topics such as "Breaking Bad News" and "The Difficult Patient," areas that challenge even the best and brightest of us.

Finally, the AAD is committed to helping all members deal with the changing economic landscape of medicine. Courses on MIPs, MACRA, and other governmental and insurance-related conundrums have been designed to make these issues more digestible. In addition, we have a course that focuses on consolidation of clinical practices and the role of private equity — issues that we are confronting more and more in everyday practice. Enjoy!

MEETING POLICIES

REGISTRATION

Individuals must register and pay the appropriate fee(s) in order to attend any portion of the meeting. Violations of this policy will result in removal from the meeting.

AGE LIMITS

Bruce H. Thiers, MD

The Golden Age of Dermatologic Therapy *Everett C. Fox, MD Memorial Award and Lectureship*

The therapeutic landscape for skin diseases has changed dramatically over the past several decades. New drugs and biologics have impacted the way we treat conditions as diverse as psoriasis, atopic dermatitis, pemphigus and other autoimmune conditions, melanoma and nonmelanoma skin cancer, and show potential for reversing the ravages of genetic disorders. These therapeutic advances have made the practice of dermatology even more rewarding and have greatly benefited our patients. This presentation will take a look back at past traditional therapies and a peek forward at what the future holds.

The Genetics of Birthmarks

The understanding of birthmarks has been revolutionized in the last decade, due to a combination of elegant clinical phenotyping and new genetic sequencing technologies. Disorders which were previously thought separate have been brought together, whilst others have been divided into previously unexpected subtypes. The key to understanding the genetics of birthmarks is to understand mosaicism, and what that really means in the context of the body as well as at molecular level. The explosion of knowledge in this field offers the promise of personalized medical therapy, drugs for birthmarks targeted to the individual. The genetics of birthmarks will be reviewed in the context of how it shapes clinical management, and what we all need to know about the latest findings to deliver the best service for our patients.

New Developments in Atopic Dermatitis- From Barrier to Burden to Biologics

This discussion explains the latest trends in AD research starting with our new understanding of disease pathogenesis, strategies to prevent the disease, and new approaches to patient assessment and treatment.

Squamous Cell Cancer: Management from in situ to Metastasis

Cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma (CSCC) is now approximately equal to basal cell carcinoma in U.S. incidence. Each is more common than any other human cancer. Though usually easily cured, CSCC is estimated to kill as many as melanoma in high-UV zones and many patients are afflicted with diffuse actinic damage (field cancerization) including a spectrum of actinic keratosis, in situ CSCC, and dermally-invasive SCC. Patients who form multiple CSCCs or who are immunosuppressed have a significant risk of metastasis and death. We will discuss management of field cancerization, prognostic stratification and management of high-risk CSCC, and emerging therapies for patients with unresectable disease who have heretofore had very limited options.



Christine Sinsky, MD

In Search of Joy in Medicine

National and international guest speaker Christine Sinsky, MD, will present "In Search of Joy in Medicine," and is expected to touch on practice innovation, redesign, and physician satisfaction.

Dr. Sinsky is the vice president of professional satisfaction at the American Medical Association. A board certified internist, she also practices at Medical Associates Clinic and Health Plans in Dubuque, Iowa.

Dr. Sinsky has worked to elevate national awareness of health professional well-being as an important driver of health system performance. From 2011 to 2012 she led "In Search of Joy in Practice: A Report of 23 High-Functioning Primary Care Practices," a project of the ABIM Foundation. She also co-authored the 2013 paper "From Triple to Quadruple Aim: Care of the Patient Requires Care of the Provider." At the AMA she leads the development of initiatives to improve clinician well-being and reduce burnout.
