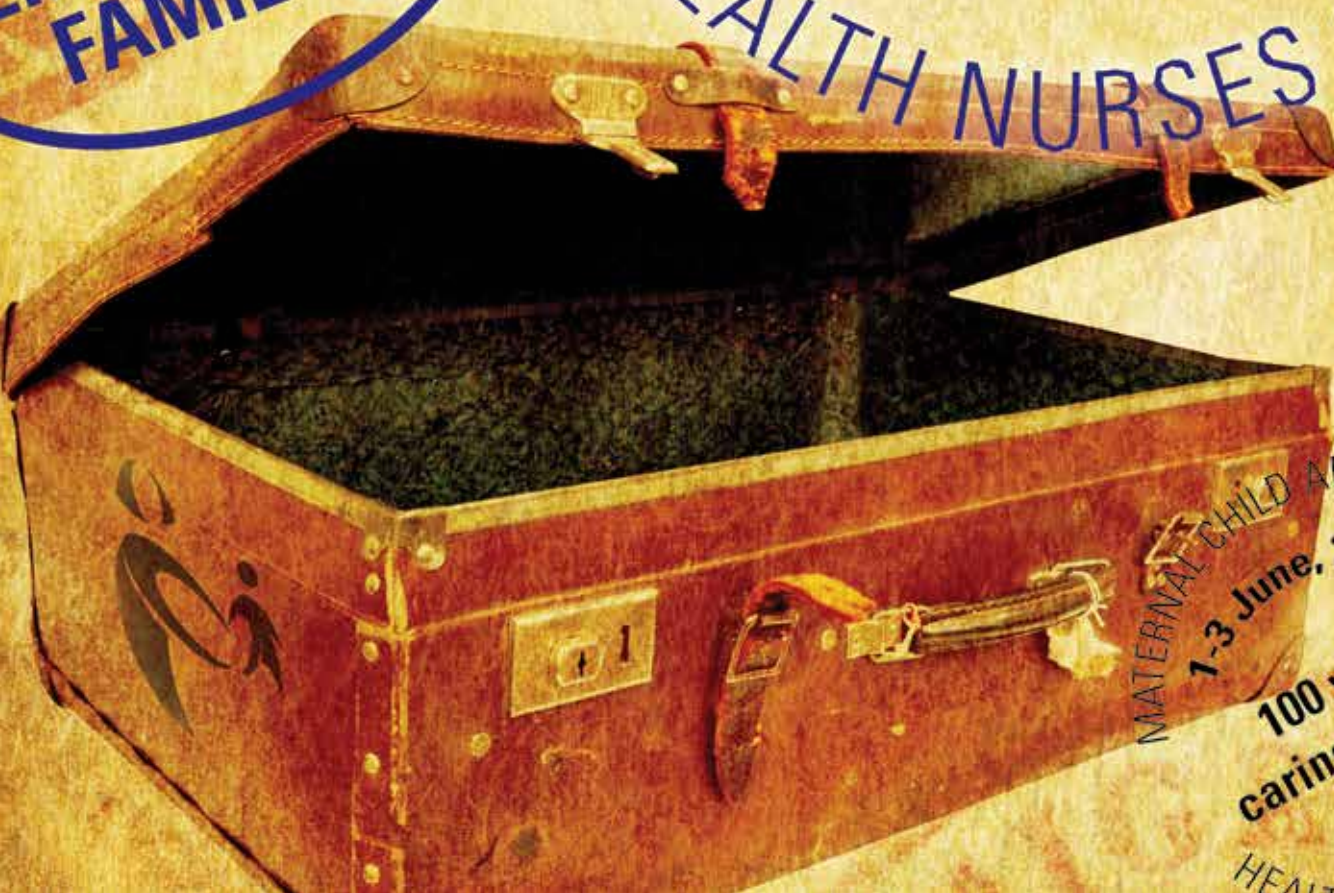

Child and Family Health Nursing at the Crossroad: challenges and opportunities

As the potential of child and family health nurses to engage and work effectively with vulnerable families is more widely recognised, there are immense opportunities for expanding roles in the historical journey of the profession. There are also great challenges. In an era of fiscal constraint one of the main challenges is that the secondary prevention capacity of the service may be strengthened at the expense of its primary prevention capacity. Other challenges include the tensions which can arise in working in partnership with statutory child protection services, and the self-care implications of work which is highly emotionally demanding
