1. White River State Park

As America's only cultural urban state park, White River State Park offers a unique blend of green space (Military Park, the Central Canal, White River itself) and cultural attractions (NCAA Hall of Champions, Victory Field, and more). Visitors can enjoy the park on foot or stop by Wheel Fun Rentals to rent a bike, boat, or kayak.



2. Mass Ave Arts District

This five-block area is ripe with theaters, restaurants, art galleries, and a number of eclectic, independent boutiques. You'll encounter unique finds on each block, from Stout's Shoes (the nation's oldest shoe store, established in 1886), to Silver In The City/At Home In The City (offering silver jewelry and unique gift items), to The Best Chocolate In Town (which is fairly self-descriptive). Venture to the Athenaeum for a stein of German lager in the historic Rathskeller biergarten, try local craft beers at Ralston's Drafthouse, or sip a cocktail at the prohibition-era ball&biscuit.



3. The Garage Food Hall

The Garage Food Hall at Bottleworks District is a 30,000 square foot community-focused food and market hall that occupies two of the historic bottling plant's original garage buildings. The food hall features 1930s Art Deco terracotta facades, industrial architecture, and large roll-up doors for a seamless indoor-outdoor experience. The Garage plays host to a variety of food and beverage vendors, bringing top culinary talent, artisan craftsmen, residents, and visitors together in the heart of Indianapolis. It's a supportive environment where chefs, producers, and artisans are pushed to be their best.

4. NCAA Hall of Champions

Sports fans will enjoy visiting two-levels of interactive exhibits designed to create a true-to-life understanding of what it takes to make the grade. Arena, on the first level, has all 24 NCAA sports represented and includes a novice to historian trivia challenge, current team rankings, video highlights, and artifacts donated from colleges around the nation. Play, on the second level, is a fully interactive area to compete virtually and hands-on through sports simulators, a 1930s retro gymnasium, ski simulator, and more.



5. Indianapolis Zoo

Located in White River State Park along the scenic riverbanks, the Indianapolis Zoo offers 64 acres of both indoor and outdoor animal attractions as well as three additional acres of outdoor gardens. The zoo protects nature, with a portion of each ticket funding wildlife conservation. The zoo features several biomes to enjoy: experience the Deserts, soar with Flights of Fancy, climb in the Forests, swim in the Oceans, or roam the Plains.



6. Sun King Brewery

The original downtown Indianapolis location opened as a small twelve tap tasting room and fifteen-barrel brewhouse in half of an unused warehouse space. Today the all-ages downtown brewery campus occupies three buildings and features food from Nacho by La Margarita. Sun King offers patrons the chance to purchase pints, sample flights, hand-crafted cocktails, and other alternative beverages for onsite consumption. Tours of the brewery are also available.



7. Soldiers & Sailors Monument/ Monument Circle

The monument is located on Monument Circle in the center of downtown and has come to symbolize the city of Indianapolis and the state of Indiana. Designed by Bruno Schmitz and constructed between 1887 and 1902, this limestone monument includes sculptures by Rudolf Schwartz (who created the figures on the structure's sides), George Brewster (who created the figure of Victory that caps the monument, as well as two astragals) and Nicolaus Geiger (who created the Army astragal). Observation level is 330 steps up or take the elevator to step 290.

8. The Children's Museum of Indianapolis

10. Newfields Museum

9. St. Elmo's Steak House

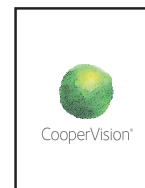
