Neonatology Point-of-Care Ultrasound (POCUS) Workshop

Sunday, March 6, 2022 • 1:00 pm - 5:15 pm

This is a didactic/hands-on workshop to promote neonatology point-of-care ultrasound. The workshop is aimed at increasing the adoption of these emerging practices in neonatology and facilitating the foundational basis for new (especially fellow level) and intermediate learners to acquire or improve ultrasound skills. We will start with a working lunch introduction with box lunches provided after the main CAN session has completed. We will provide didactic lectures that include basics of ultrasound, cardiac views, non-cardiac views, and clinical applications/scenarios. At least half of the workshop will offer hands-on learning at teaching stations to cover cardiac, non-cardiac and clinical applications. An ample number of instructors and live models will be present to provide a solid practical experience for participants. Additional focus this year will be in providing preparatory aids to supporting POCUS at participants' home institutions.
