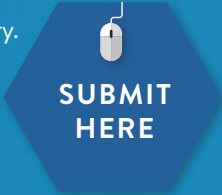
This year's program includes time for the presentation of several Free Papers. The presenting authors of the selected papers will receive \$250 off their registration fee.

Walking Trauma: Cervical, TL & Lumbar

Debate: TLICs 4, L2 burst fracture, neuro intact.

- Burst fractures have become an excuse to place perc screws, non-op is the way to go
- MIS treatment of burst fractures has been a game changer for my patient

- Cases:**
- Unilateral facet fracture/dislocation treated non-op, now with pain +/- deformity
 - Type 2 odontoid fracture in the elderly with delayed union
 - To brace or not to brace? Elderly woman with an osteoporotic TL compression/burst Fx with TL kyphosis
 - To brace or not to brace? 75 y/o AS or DISH with TL burst and with intact posterior column

- Yes! Be real and know your limits.
- No! Letting deformity patients go out of my practice is an egregious disservice to my community.

- Cases:**
- Treating the fractional curve only in adult deformity. Genius or ignorant?
 - 70 y/o with adjacent segment disease after a degen. fusion. Is this really a deformity or an expected degeneration?
 - *Doc fix me, my curve got worse and I want to Heli Ski.* Progressive deformity without pain
 - Peri operative sacral fracture after ALIF in a patient with osteoporosis

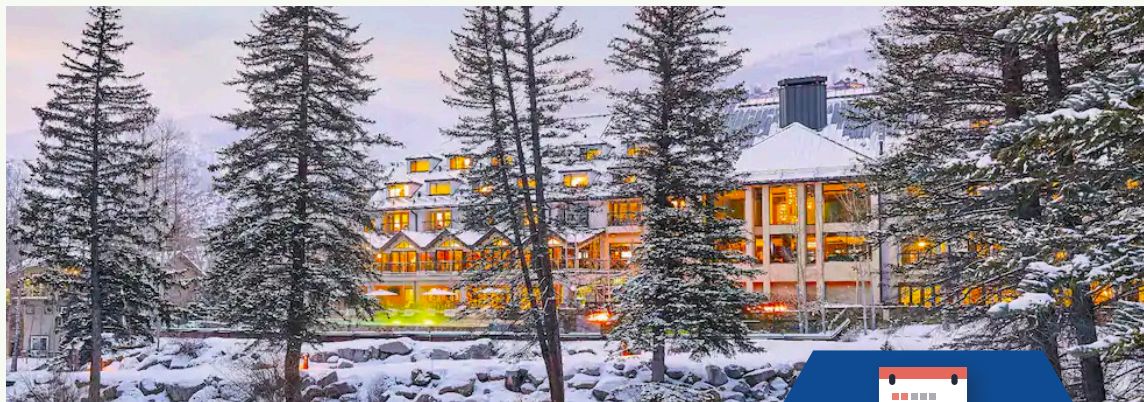

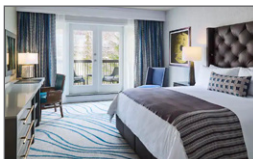

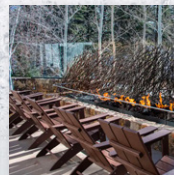
