P01 An In-Depth Review of NCCHC's 2026 Standards for Health Services in Jails and Prisons

This seminar will introduce the *2026 Standards for Health Services*, NCCHC's revised and updated recommendations for managing medical and mental health care delivery in jails and prisons. The new *Standards* are scheduled for publication in August 2025. The course will highlight new requirements and content and share insights into the reasoning behind the changes. Whether or not your facility is accredited (or plans to be), this practical seminar will provide guidance on implementing an effective

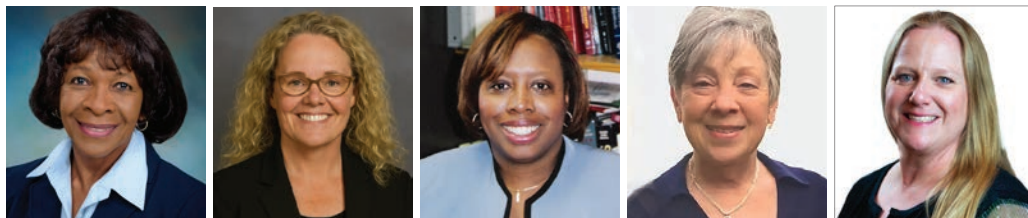

P05 Nursing Management Case Study: Pregnant Patient Who Refuses Health Care

The session will examine perspectives on care, evidence-based nursing approaches during screening and assessment, and the ethical and legal responsibilities that can inform meaningful policy reform. **3.5 CE credits**

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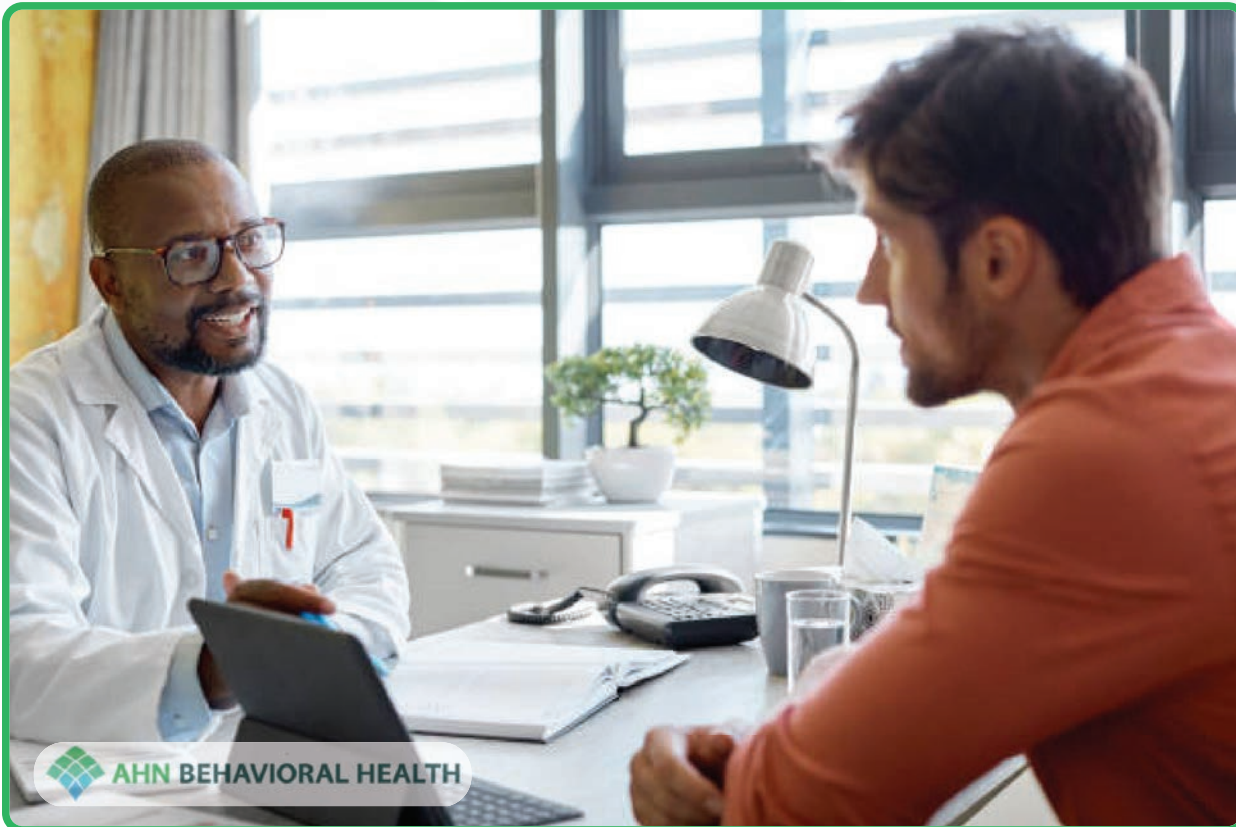
