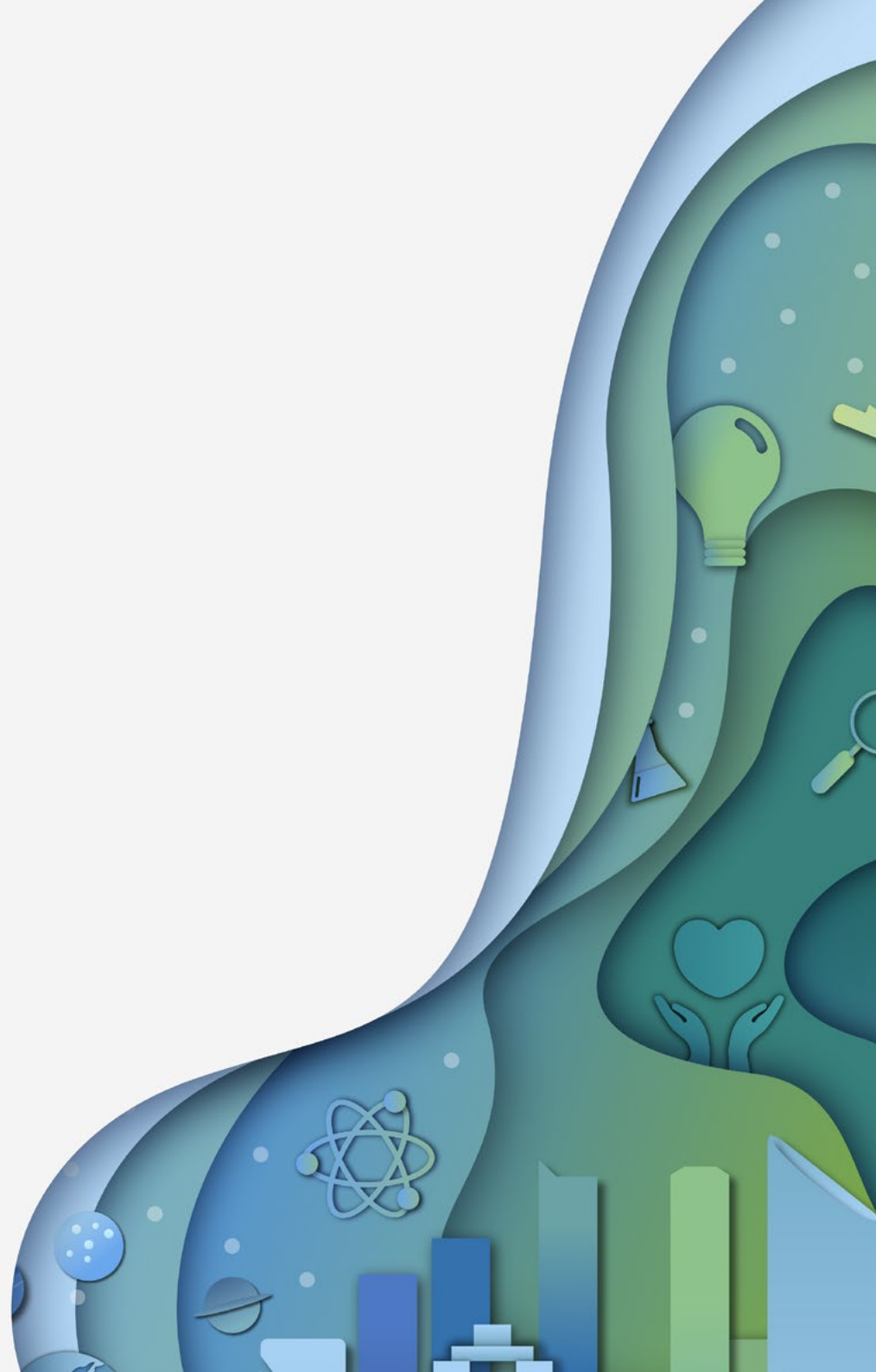

This innovation extends to the in-person and onDemand offerings at the 2024 ASM.

Meeting regulatory changes

In 2023 the Medical Board of Australia (MBA) and Medical Council of New Zealand (MCNZ) changed their registration and recertification requirements. To ensure you continue to meet the updated regulatory requirements, the ANZCA and FPM CPD Program has embedded innovative opportunities – with full details available on our [dedicated CPD page](#).

In-person attendance in CPD portfolio in June 2024

Participants of the ANZCA and FPM CPD Program who register for the in-person registration will automatically have their attendance auto-populated to their CPD portfolio in June 2024.

ANZCA and FPM CPD participants with full in-person ASM registration will receive 24 hours under *Knowledge and skills – learning sessions* activity for the ASM program. Additional sessions or workshops will indicate specific CPD values (for example emergency response activities).

onDemand package

ANZCA and FPM CPD participants who purchase an ASM onDemand package will need to manually record their CPD hours under *Knowledge and skills – learning sessions* activity. Due to security purposes, the **OnDemand functionalities do not allow for auto-population** into the CPD portfolio.

There is **no live stream** of any ASM content. The ASM onDemand package will ensure those unable to attend in person, still gain access to the ASM's world-leading content, which will be available from 14 May 2024.

How can I claim CPD hours for viewing content post-meeting?

In-person delegates and participants that have purchased an ASM onDemand package can claim post-meeting content viewing. This viewing will need to be manually updated to your CPD portfolio.

Participants of the ANZCA and FPM CPD program may claim time spent on online learning under *Knowledge and Skills – learning sessions*.

When recording time in your CPD portfolio, suitable evidence could be a certificate of attendance/participation/completion, written confirmation of registration or screen shot of online resources.

Full coverage of CPD categories

The 2024 ANZCA ASM provides more innovative opportunities for your professional development across all three CPD categories – practice evaluation (reviewing performance, measuring outcomes), knowledge and skills and emergency response.

Practice evaluation

Attendance at the W01, W03, W14, W57, *IndigenousX – Cultural safety* workshop can be claimed under:

- Practice evaluation, reviewing performance – Cultural safety.

Attendance at the W07 *Be awareness aware* can be claimed under:

- Practice evaluation, measuring outcomes – audit.

Attendance at the W59 and W83 *Fix it Twice* – can be claimed under:

- Practice evaluation, reviewing performance – Case discussions.

Knowledge and skills

Plenary sessions, panels, and lectures are claimed under:

- Knowledge and skills – learning sessions.

Interactive and practical workshops, and small group discussions (SGDs) are claimed under:

- Knowledge and skills – short format learning

Attendance at W02, W04, W18, W19, W40, W60, W84, W87, are claimed under:

- Knowledge and skills – wellbeing CPD education sessions

Emergency responses

The workshop outline states if a workshop satisfies a CPD emergency response requirement, it will be prospectively recognised as suitable to be claimed as that specific emergency response activity.

This refers to workshops covering management of cardiac arrest, anaphylaxis, major haemorrhage, can't intubate and can't oxygenate (CICO), acute severe behavioural disturbance (ASBD) in the adult patient and opioid induced ventilatory impairment (OIVI)

If you're not participating in our CPD program, please check with your respective college/provider regarding your CPD classifications. Post-event, you may request an electronic certificate of attendance for CPD evidence from the ANZCA events team.

- All activities have limited space and places are allocated on a first come first served basis.
- Delegates are encouraged to register their partner/family members for optional activities while they attend the meeting. Your family's enjoyment and experience of Brisbane is very important to us and certain activities have been designed with this in mind.

- Check transport information for offsite workshops or activities when registering.
- Our sessions are always well subscribed, so we encourage you to register early to secure your place.
- Facilitators may contact participants directly in the lead up to the meeting to provide background or preparatory material. By registering for a workshop or SGD you give consent for your details to be shared with the key organiser/ facilitator.
