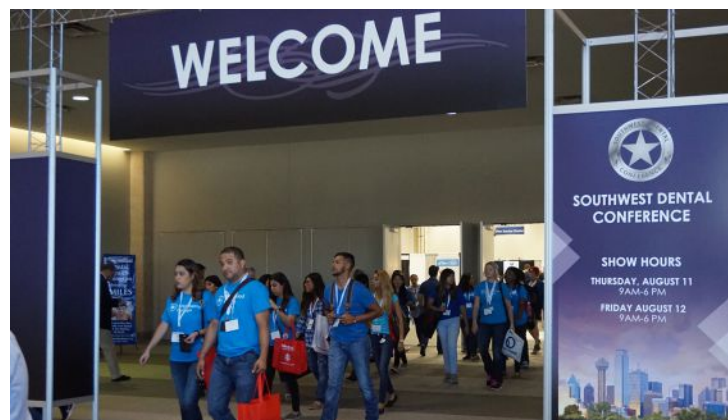
CE VERIFICATION

For on-site scanning, the CE Center is located at the back of the Exhibit Hall. 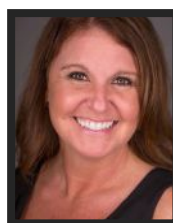

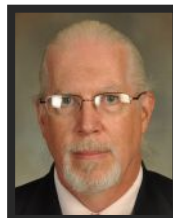

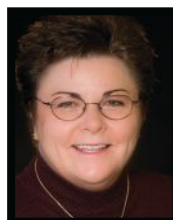
