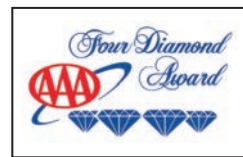

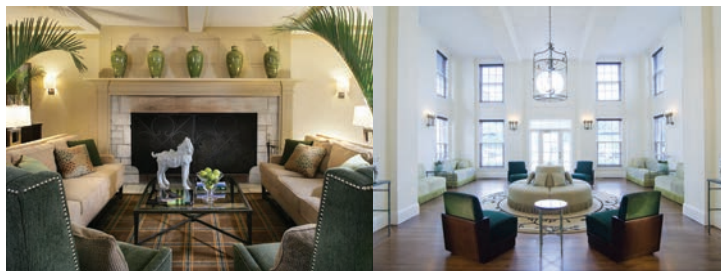
Hotel Overview
