ACG's Esophagus School

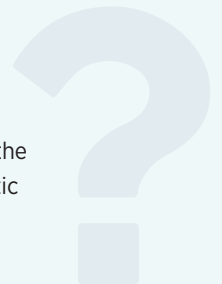
ACG's Esophagus School, is a day-long comprehensive esophagus program. Led by Course Directors Evan S. Dellon, MD, MPH, FACG, and Felice Schnoll-Sussman, MD, MSc, FACG, this "deep dive" into the esophagus will be of particular interest to community-based gastroenterologists who seek comprehensive evidence-based education on all things esophagus. This program is designed to better enable clinical gastroenterologists and their advanced practice provider colleagues to diagnose and treat patients more efficiently. Topics include GERD, Barrett's esophagus, achalasia, and EoE, as well as current and emerging treatments and therapies.

ACG/VGS/MASGNA Regional Postgraduate Course

The ACG/VGS/MASGNA Regional Postgraduate Course will be offered all day Saturday and a half-day Sunday, with an agenda that features presentations on upper GI disorders, GI autoimmunity, IBD, liver, pancreatobiliary disease, and endoscopy. ACG President, Amy S. Oxentenko, MD, FACG, will deliver the Keynote Lecture where she will discuss the keys to managing work-life balance and avoiding burnout in the medical profession. The program will also feature a special MASGNA-sponsored session on Saturday afternoon, as well as fellows' case presentations illustrating difficult GI management issues.
