Problematic biopsies contain changes, including inflammations and polyps, that do not fit neatly into well-established diagnostic categories. Practical guidelines to deal with these biopsies are needed. Also, as a result of an ever increasing load of endoscopic biopsies, surgical pathologists are confronted with more and more polyps in the stomach that are unique to that site and with which they may have had little experience. Basic histologic features of the most common gastric polyps will enhance competency in diagnosis.

Dr. Henry Appelman received his M.D. from the University of Michigan in 1961 where he also completed his residency training in Anatomic and Clinical Pathology in 1966. He is board certified in Anatomic and Clinical Pathology.

Dr. Appelman is one of the pioneers in modern biopsy pathology of the gastrointestinal tract. He is the author of more than 400 peer-reviewed publications, books, book chapters and abstracts. Dr. Appelman has been invited on over 300 occasions to deliver extramural, national and international presentations, including 20 named lectureships and over 50 visiting professorships.

Dr. Greenson received both his undergraduate degree and M.D. at the University of Michigan, in 1980 and 1984, respectively. In 1993, he joined the Department of Pathology at the University of Michigan as an Assistant Professor, where he became the Director of Surgical Pathology Fellowship Program in 1995 and the Director of Surgical Pathology in 1997. He served in these positions through 2005. He was promoted to the rank of Professor in 2003.

Dr. Greenson has clinical and research interests in gastrointestinal and liver pathology. Dr. Greenson is also a past-president of the Gastrointestinal Pathology Society.

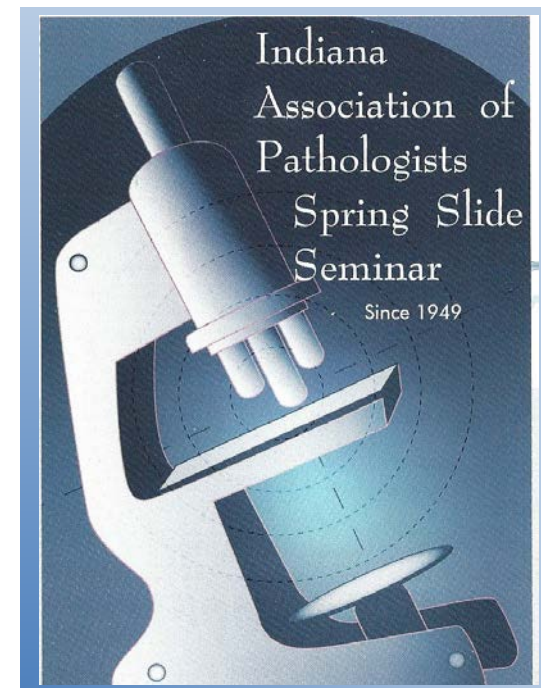
