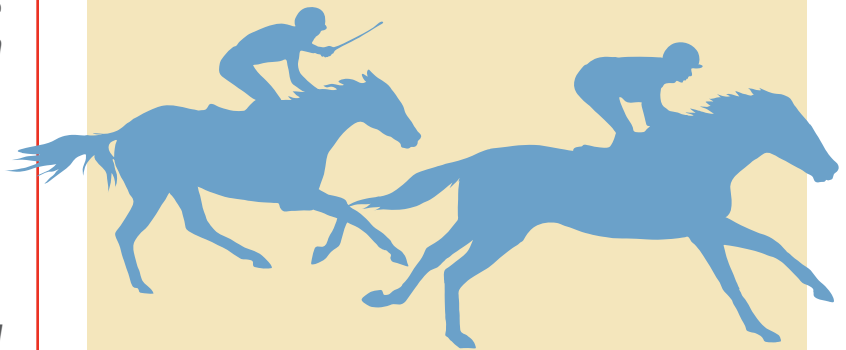

P01 An In-Depth Review of NCCHC's Standards for Health Services in Jails and Prisons

This seminar will examine the *Standards*, NCCHC's recommendations for managing medical and mental health care delivery in jails and the foundation of its accreditation program. Whether or not your facility is accredited (or plans to be), this practical seminar will provide guidance on how to implement an effective correctional health care system and demonstrate compliance with the standards. This course is an excellent review for all professionals who are interested in taking the CCHP exam or who have signed up to take it on April 6. The registration fee includes a copy of the 2018 *Standards* (your choice, Jail or Prison), a \$90 value.

P02 An In-Depth Review of the NCCHC Standards for Opioid Treatment Programs in Correctional Facilities

This seminar will discuss NCCHC's 2025 *Standards for Opioid Treatment Programs in Correctional Facilities*. In October 2024, the *Standards* were submitted to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for review as required due to NCCHC's designation as an approved accreditor for corrections-based OTPs. SAMHSA's updated February 2024 rule increases access to OUD care by expanding the scope of practice for nurse practitioners and physician assistants, allowing the

use of telehealth, revising admission criteria, and more. Whether your facility operates an accredited OTP or is planning to establish one, this seminar will provide essential guidance on the steps needed to implement and sustain a successful program. The registration fee includes a copy of the 2025 *Standards*, a \$99 value. **7 CE credits**

P03 An In-Depth Review of NCCHC's Standards for Mental Health Services

The *Standards for Mental Health Services in Correctional Facilities* provides a framework for improved mental health care delivery and outcomes in adult correctional facilities. The foundation of NCCHC's mental health accreditation program, these standards parallel those for health services in format and substance, but they make more explicit what the standards require for adequate delivery of mental health services. Whether or not your facility plans to be accredited, this seminar will explain what the standards say with regard to the areas of care and treatment, clinical records, administration, personnel, legal issues, and more. This course is

P04 Suicide Precautions: Clinical Risks, Legal Risks, and Solutions

Suicide is the leading cause of death in jails and a major concern in prisons. Overreliance on extreme preventive measures can cause harm and discourage individuals from reporting suicidal thoughts. This seminar will explore clinical, legal, and environmental factors contributing to suicide in correctional settings and review evidence-based interventions like cognitive behavioral therapy. Learn about more humane, effective methods to promote safety and treatment engagement and discuss case studies and the components of a comprehensive suicide prevention program. **3.5 CE credits**

Emergencies are an inevitable part of life in our field and timely and accurate assessment and treatment can significantly impact patient outcomes. P06 Continuous Quality Improvement: Strategies and Techniques to Measure Change

Effective continuous quality improvement programs advance patient care, improve efficiencies in medical and mental health services delivery, help health professionals practice smarter, enable analysis of outcomes, and lead to objective analyses of areas needing improvement. A well-formulated CQI program also enables a correctional system to effectively respond to litigation. Participants will gain appreciation for the clinical and administrative value of a comprehensive CQI program and learn how to implement a useful program. **3.5 CE credits**

P07 Managing Wound Pain and Inflammation to Promote Healing

Pain protects health, but excessive wound pain and inflammation can delay healing. Clinicians often mistake inflammation for infection and may lack tools to address pain—especially when opioids are unsuitable. This session explores biological processes, assessment tools, and evidence-based interventions, including nonprescription and prescription options. Through detailed illustrations and case studies, participants will learn strategies to manage procedural, activity-related, and persistent pain while controlling inflammation, ultimately improving patient outcomes and healing trajectories. **3.5 CE credits**
