Each year, CLI causes approximately 65,000 to 75,000 major amputations and costs \$25 billion in healthcare expenditures. CLI has a five-year mortality rate, exceeding that of coronary artery disease, breast cancer, and colorectal cancer. Given these alarming statistics, AMP fills a crucial need as the nation's only medical conference dedicated to preventing CLI and amputations related to CLI.

SESSION 5: POST-ACUTE CARE

ASSESSING AND TREATING SKIN TEARS

While some skin tears are unavoidable, many are considered to be preventable. It is critical that clinicians understand the effects of aging on the skin and take appropriate measures to reduce patient risk. This session will explore why skin tears occur, review classification tools available, and provide a practical guide to prevention and management.

SESSION 17: POST-ACUTE CARE

SURVIVING A FISTULA: THE REALITY FOR THE PATIENT AND CARE PROVIDERS

The physical and emotional trauma that some patients experience when a fistula develops is life changing. The leakage, odor, skin destruction, and depression can lead to unbearable physical and emotional pain. Caregivers also suffer in terms of frustration with management problems and their inability to "make it better" for the patient with the condition. This session will demonstrate poucing techniques using negative pressure wound therapy to contain the drainage, skin management to reduce the discomfort, and tips for keeping the patient clean, dry, and comfortable during this trying time.

Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy (HBOT) is an effective treatment modality when utilized on the right patient at the right time. This session will discuss the diagnosis of diabetic foot infections and treatment approaches with oral antibiotics, wound care, and offloading.
