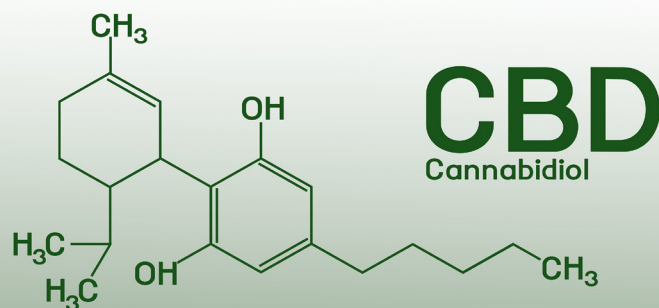
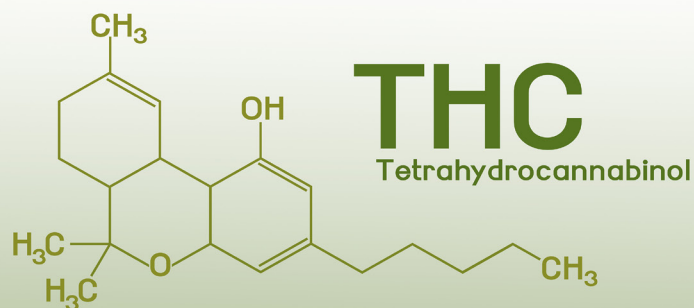

- Contrast the effects of delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol and cannabidiol on the endocannabinoid system.
- Critique labels of cannabis products and certificates of analysis in order to identify potential hazards versus benefits of available formulations.
- Determine the unique risks of cannabis for pediatric and geriatric patients.
- Specify commonly recommended starting doses for cannabis products based on available research.
- Define what a certificate of analysis is and the information it contains.
- Identify additional testing measures needed in order to assess product quality and reliability.
- Describe ways to assess patients in order to determine whether cannabis is effective for pain.

Narda G. Robinson, DO, DVM, MS, FAAMA

Dr. Narda Robinson is a leading authority on scientific integrative medicine, one of the first faculty members at Colorado State University to study cannabis. She is an osteopathic physician and veterinarian, as well as the president and CEO of the CuraCore Integrative Medicine & Education Center.



In 2015, Dr. Robinson was invited by the President of CSU, Dr. Tony Frank, to explore the research potential of cannabis. She then participated on a university-wide committee that, in conjunction with the University of Colorado, helped to lay the groundwork for academic study of cannabis. She coauthored a seminal survey on consumers' perceptions of the value of hemp products for dogs. The results from this study helped to stimulate and pave the way for clinical research on cannabis at CSU. Dr. Robinson currently teaches online and onsite courses on cannabis for both human and veterinary practitioners. Through these programs, Dr. Robinson promotes scientific scrutiny and critical inquiry insofar as they relate to cannabis treatment and lawful practice.

Dr. Robinson holds a Bachelor of Arts (AB) degree from Harvard/Radcliffe, a doctorate in osteopathic medicine (DO) from the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine, and a doctorate in veterinary medicine (DVM) and a master's degree in biomedical sciences (MS) from the Colorado State University College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences. She is a fellow of the American Academy of Medical Acupuncture. She also serves on the American Board of Medical Acupuncture, the board-certifying organization for physician medical acupuncturists, as well as the board of the American Academy of Medical Acupuncture.
