- Identify the clinical symptoms of exposure to ten poisons that are life-threatening to young children and manage these patients appropriately.
- Recognize the hallmark symptoms of primary ciliary dyskinesia and reliably distinguish children with this disease from those with viral respiratory illness.

Flights

The main airport in Maui is the Kahului Airport (also known as the Maui International Airport), code OGG. This airport is 28 miles from the Sheraton Maui Resort in Ka'anapali, about 45 minutes by car.

The much smaller Kapalua Airport in west Maui, code JHM, is served by commuter flights to and from Honolulu (code HNL). This airport is 5 miles from the Sheraton Maui Resort, about 15 minutes by car.
