A1) The Wormhole of Oral Chemotherapy: The Impact of an Oncology Clinical Pharmacist

The solid tumor clinic pharmacist at OHSU has many roles; one of the roles includes navigating the challenges involved with filling oral chemotherapy for patients. Cancer treatment in general can be complicated for patients but there is added complexity when medications are prescribed through a pharmacy compared to coming in for an infusion. There is also frustration from the clinic and providers who prescribe oral chemotherapy. This discussion is to detail the successes and challenges with implementing a clinic pharmacist used to help assist navigating this foreign territory. It will also discuss the differing challenges between getting both on and off labeled indications authorized and filled for patients.

ACPE Details | Learning Objectives: Explain the successes and challenges of implementing an oral chemotherapy clinic pharmacist into hematology/oncology ambulatory clinic. Describe steps necessary to facilitate the ordering, checking, authorization and filling of an FDA approved indications for oral chemotherapy. A2) The Next Round is On Us: Using the Updated Beer's Criteria to Improve Patient Safety

Pharmacists must be able to understand why medications are considered by the authors of the updated American Geriatrics Society (AGS) 2015 Beers Criteria as "potentially inappropriate medications" (PIMs) in order to use such medications in the safest possible manner. Often PIMs can be avoided by using a safer alternative or by simply de-escalating therapy. However, there are times when a PIM may be the most appropriate option. If PIMs cannot be avoided, the older adult would likely benefit from strategies such as using reduced doses and additional safety monitoring. This course will provide attendees with multiple examples of patient-safety strategies for older adults taking PIMs.

ACPE Details | Learning Objectives: Discuss the changes in the 2015 American Geriatrics Society Beers Criteria Update. Recommend for or against the use of potentially inappropriate medications for specific patients. Recommend strategies to utilize potentially-inappropriate medications in the safest possible manner. 1 credit hour Patient Safety

B1) HIV Prevention: Getting to Zero

HIV prevention no longer consists of condoms and abstinence education. Other modalities from improved HIV screening tests to decreased community viral loads have emerged as effective HIV prevention strategies. After attending this presentation, participants will have a general knowledge of various HIV prevention strategies and will be able to offer education and referrals to patients with questions about HIV prevention options.

Recognize when PrEP versus PEP is indicated when approached with questions about a potential HIV exposure. B2) Cost meets Quality: The Evolving Role of Pharmacy in Accountable Care

Over the past 20 years U.S. health care costs have increased without a concurrent improvement in health outcomes. Payment methodology is increasingly moving from fee for service to value-based payment, with health care organizations sharing the risk for improving care while reducing costs. This presentation will discuss how pharmacy services can contribute to the success of accountable care organizations and the opportunities for expanded roles for the profession.

ACPE Details | Learning Objectives: Define terms including Accountable Care Organization, Coordinated Care Organization, population health, and risk sharing arrangements. Describe common metrics used to measure ACO success. Discuss the evolving roles of pharmacists and technicians in supporting successful outcomes in the ACO model. GENERAL SESSION: Persistent Pain Management: A How To

The treatment of persistent pain is challenging given the risks associated with opioid and their lack of efficacy for persistent pain. This course will provide strategies for approaching and treating patients with persistent pain.

ACPE Details | Learning Objectives: Discuss the limitations of prior approaches to understanding and treating persistent pain. Discuss the risks associated with chronic opioid use. Given a patient case, calculate the morphine equivalent dose and provide an opioid taper. Explain the criteria for when to consider buprenorphine and/or naloxone. Evidence-based Uncertainty: A Spirited, Hopeful, and Pooled Debate Over Hypertension and Cardiovascular Risk Assessment

Jonathan White, PharmD, BCPS, BCACP and Chad Martell, PharmD, BCPS

This session will feature a debate style format addressing two topics, including the clinical implications associated with each: blood pressure goal controversies, and utilization of atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease (ASCVD) risk calculators for patient assessment. Blood pressure goals have been fluid in response to guideline changes and evidence-based support, and goals for specific patient populations, including the elderly and those with co-morbidities, remain a clinical debate. Presenters will examine recent literature and guidelines to support and refute current therapeutic recommendations for hypertension. In 2013, new clinical practice recommendations for statin use and ASCVD risk reduction were published. Within the practice recommendations, a new tool for assessment of ASCVD risk was endorsed for use by clinicians. Since publication, the assessment tool has been scrutinized. The second portion of the session will evaluate current strategies for ASCVD risk assessment and the merits or disadvantages for each method.

ACPE Details | Learning Objectives: Describe the blood pressure treatment goals and evidence-based medications for patients with hypertension based on clinical outcomes studies and national guidelines. Analyze the outcomes of recent hypertension trials and their potential implications on the population-wide approach to treating patients with hypertension. Evaluate the advantages and disadvantages of the contemporary cardiovascular risk calculators used to predict outcomes and guide pharmacotherapy decisions. 1.25 credit hour Disease State Management/Drug Therapy. UAN: 0036-9999-16-223-L01-P
