OBJECTIVES

- Utilize appropriate diagnostic testing and antimicrobial therapy in children with suspected tick-associated infections
- Implement methods to prevent tick-borne infections
- Differentiate bacterial from aseptic meningitis
- Utilize antimicrobial therapy for acute bacterial meningitis
- Assess benefits and risks of using corticosteroids in children with acute bacterial meningitis
- Educate parents about the lack of association of available vaccines (and their components) with neurodevelopmental disorders, including autism
- Utilize appropriate diagnostic testing strategy for children with suspected pneumonia
- Utilize appropriate antibiotic therapy for children with pneumonia, depending on disease severity
- Describe criteria for discharging hospitalized children with pneumonia and plans for continuing antimicrobial therapy at home

- Assess appropriate laboratory testing for youth with chronic urticaria
- Evaluate signs/symptoms of recurrent infections to determine onset of primary immune deficiencies in adolescents

- Treat asthma in adolescents according to current diagnostic testing and treatment guidelines
- Obtain outcome measures that can be performed for each asthma patient over 4 years old

- Implement rules for adolescent consent and confidentiality as it relates to STDs
- Implement strategies to help adolescents change behavior, as it relates to STDs
- Identify substance use and abuse in adolescents
- Educate adolescents about the impact of substance abuse on health
- Apply the FRAMES clinical intervention in practice
- Refer adolescents and their families to local substance abuse resources
- Assess evidence-based benefits of positive youth development strategies for the health and well-being of youth
- Foster positive youth development in your practice
- Develop a comprehensive approach to the child with poor growth
- Evaluate and manage children with early or late puberty
- Identify children who have Metabolic Syndrome
- Identify children at risk of developing diabetes
- Differentiate Type 1 from Type 2 diabetes in children

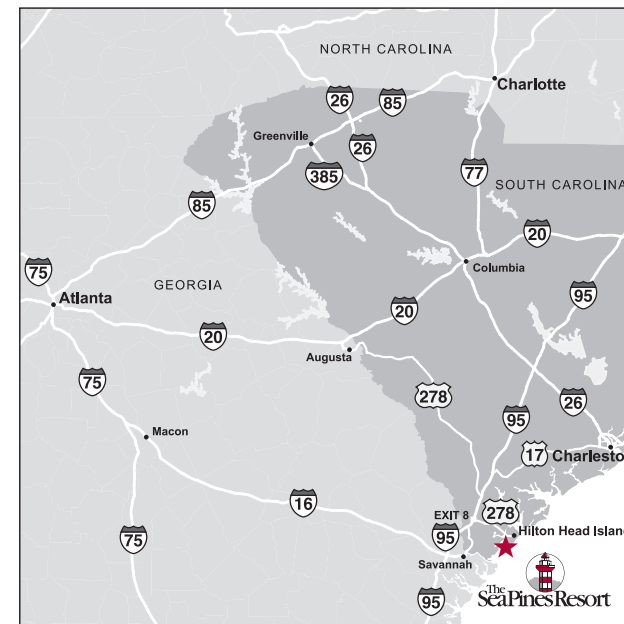
GETTING HERE

BY AIR

The Sea Pines Resort, located on subtropical Hilton Head Island, is conveniently accessible by two airports: Hilton Head Island Airport, located mid-island about 15-20 minutes from the resort, and Savannah / Hilton Head International Airport, which is located in nearby Savannah, Georgia – about 45-50 minutes by car. Limousine, taxi and car rental services are available at both airports.

BY CAR

The Sea Pines Resort is conveniently accessible by car from many major cities, such as: Savannah, GA (about 45 miles); Charleston, SC (about 100 miles); Jacksonville, FL (about 175 miles); and Atlanta, GA (about 280 miles). From I-95 (SC), take Exit 8 and follow US 278 East to Hilton Head Island (about 20 miles). Once to Hilton Head Island, take the Cross Island Parkway to the Sea Pines Circle (traffic circle). Take Greenwood Drive from the traffic circle to The Sea Pines Resort Welcome Center, about a quarter mile on your right.
