Research Forum: Poster and Oral Presentations

The clinician needs to identify relevant studies from multiple different resources and decide which information to incorporate into clinical practice. The research forum will review and discuss research projects primarily submitted from within New York.

New Speakers Forum: Best Practices in Emergency Medicine

Emergency medicine is fast-paced and ever changing. National organizations such as the Institute of Medicine (IOM) and ACEP provide evidence-based guidelines and standards for various topics in medicine, from organizational recommendations to optimize emergency department throughput to clinical aspects such as STEMI and acute stroke. This forum of emerging dynamic speakers will provide clinicians with various evidence-based best practices in emergency medicine.

TUESDAY JULY 9

Concussions

Andy S. Jagoda, MD FACEP

Emergency physicians frequently care for patients with head injuries and concussions. Evidence-based practice guidelines and recommendation exist for concussion management and treatment. This lecture will provide physicians with an understanding of the guidelines and recommendations to provide their patients with optimal evidence-based care.

- Explain which patients are at risk for an acute intracranial lesion.
- Distinguish which patients are at risk of developing postconcussive syndrome or chronic traumatic encephalopathy.



Can You Manage These Critically Ill Cases?

Advances in the treatment and management of critically ill patients enable emergency physicians to appropriately provide optimal care for complicated cases. This lecture will provide information on the care of patients with severe pulmonary HTN, patients with heart failure and LVADs and the critically ill obese patient.

- Discuss the resuscitation of the patient with a left ventricular assist device.
- Outline the emergency department management of the crashing patient with pulmonary hypertension.
- Describe critical interventions in the care of the critically ill obese patient.

Dangerous Drug-Drug Interactions in the ED

Polypharmacy greatly increases the risk of adverse drug events in emergency department patients. This presentation will review the most common, the most serious, and some of the little-known dangerous drug-drug interactions that occur in the emergency department.

- Identify the barriers to recognizing dangerous drug-drug interactions in the emergency department.
- Describe the most serious drug-drug interactions occurring in emergency department patients.

Critical Care: Recent Articles You've Got to Know!

Michael E. Winters, MD FACEP

Emergency physicians care for critically ill patients on a daily basis. With the persistent epidemic of hospital and intensive care unit overcrowding, emergency physicians are now managing critically ill patients long beyond the initial resuscitation and diagnostic evaluation. The speaker will discuss a compilation of cases of challenging critically ill patients that presented to the emergency department at the speaker's institution. For each case, critical pearls and pitfalls in the recognition and management of these patients will be discussed.

- Identify important articles from the recent emergency medicine and critical care literature.
- Discuss the incorporation of evidence from recent critical care literature into the practice of emergency medicine.

Technology Resources for the Emergency Physician (Optional Workshop)

Jeremy D. Joslin, MD

Smartphones and the internet are advances in technology that are being incorporated in the medical field as clinical resources and have become integral decision making tools. With a myriad of choices, how can the student, resident or practicing physician decipher which sources will be valuable or even medically sound? This workshop will focus on the discovery of valuable apps and web sites, the exploration of quality indicators and some specific usage patterns the clinician can integrate into the clinical setting.

- Discuss smartphone and technology use in the clinical setting and review indicators of a quality product.
- Identify several high-quality web sites and applications.
- Apply a hands-on introductory workshop to become familiar with these applications and web sites.

WEDNESDAY JULY 10

Risk Management and the Neurologic Exam

Andy S. Jagoda, MD FACEP

There are significant liability concerns with neurologic cases in emergency medicine that can be mitigated with the appropriate documentation. This lecture will increase awareness of the critical physical exam components to document which will enable physicians to demonstrate they follow best practices in the event of a medical liability claim.

- Discuss neurology cases presenting to the emergency department that resulted in medical liability.
- List important features of the neurologic exam and the proper documentation of the neurologic exam to avoid medical liability.

Post-Arrest Care...3 Interventions That Save Lives!

Michael E. Winters, MD FACEP

Care of the patient with a return of spontaneous circulation (ROSC) following sudden cardiac death is challenging. Recent evidence has demonstrated that a comprehensive approach to the "post-arrest" patient can increase the chances of meaningful recovery. The speaker will discuss a systematic approach to the management of patients with ROSC following cardiac arrest. Emphasis is placed on optimizing oxygenation and ventilation, maintaining adequate perfusion pressure, initiating therapeutic hypothermia, and identifying patients appropriate for emergent cardiac catheterization.

- List the oxygenation, ventilation, and hemodynamic resuscitation goals for patients with return of spontaneous circulation following cardiac arrest.
- Discuss the use of therapeutic hypothermia in the post-arrest patient.
- Identify candidates for early cardiac catheterization following resuscitation from cardiac arrest.

Emerging Street Drugs of Abuse

Steven B. Bird, MD FACEP

Emergency departments often serve to identify sentinel events related to emerging drugs of abuse. Proliferation of online resources has helped to foster several new classes of drugs of abuse, and to disseminate methods of modifying existing drugs of abuse. This presentation will describe some of these online resources as well as the newest emerging drugs of abuse.

- Describe the physical examination findings seen with acute cathinone or designer amphetamine intoxication.
- Identify management options for treating acute agitation after designer cathinone or amphetamine intoxication.
- Define the limitations to biological fluid testing for emerging drugs of abuse.

Clinical Decisions in Seizure Management

Andy S. Jagoda, MD FACEP

Patients presenting with seizures are frequently encountered in the emergency department, however there are multiple reasons patients have seizures. This lecture will describe the appropriate management of first-time seizures and the treatment of patients with status epilepticus using evidence-based guidelines.

- Describe an evidence-based approach to the management of status epilepticus.
- Define the appropriate management of a patient with first-time seizure.
