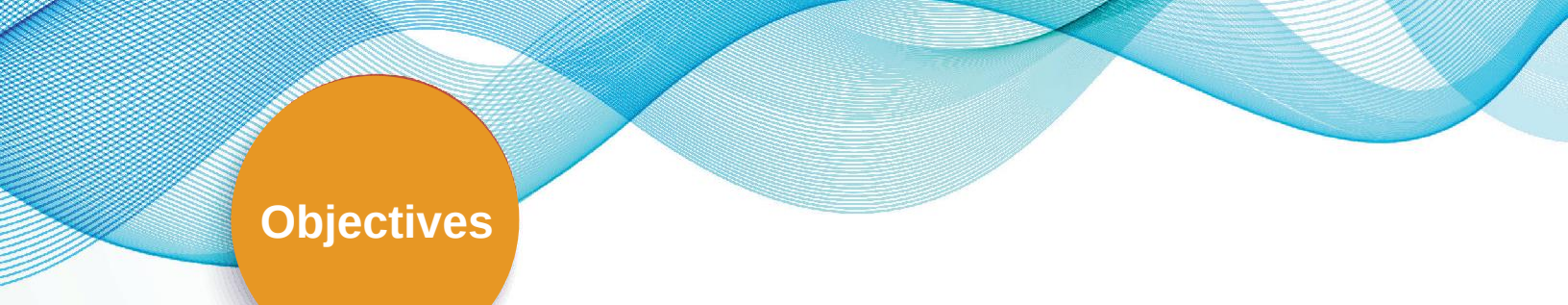

Objectives

Plenary Sessions

- Discuss the nuances in evaluating living donors: Altruism vs Autonomy, Protection vs Paternalism.
- Review living donation long term outcomes data as captured by SRTR and OPTN.
- Describe emerging best practices to manage the care of international donors.
- Discuss the findings of the KDOC study and the implications as they relate to the care of the living donor.
- Identify and discuss how countertransference impacts the evaluation of a living donor.
- Discuss strategies to overcome barriers within vulnerable populations.
- Outline resources available to living donor professionals.
- Describe the impact of EPTS and LDKDPI on living donor clinical practice.
- Discuss the ethical consequences of transplanting high risk candidates.
- Describe team dynamics and strategies to improve working relationships.

Foundational Track

- Discuss CMS and OPTN/UNOS regulatory requirements for living donor programs.
- Outline the live donor process from intake through long term follow-up.
- Describe the medical evaluation of the living donor, including assessment of short and long term risks.
- Describe the surgical evaluation and procedure for a living donor.
- Describe the goals of informed consent for living donors.
- Outline the financial considerations for living donation.
- Identify required elements of the donor psychosocial assessment.
- Identify elements of the Independent Living Donor Advocate Interview.
- Identify the basic principles related to histocompatibility that apply to living donor transplantation.

- Discuss basic concepts of kidney paired donation.
- Discuss your role in QAPI as a member of the Living donor Team.

Advanced Track

- Discuss financial barriers and current initiatives to make living donation cost neutral.
- Explain the role of APOL1 and infectious disease screening in living donor evaluation.
- Describe the current national and international status of paired kidney donation.
- Describe novel approaches to living donation such as using HIV or HCV positive donors and tolerance induction.
- Discuss management of psychosocial challenges with living donors in difficult, disappointing and hierarchical situations.

Liver Track

- Describe how surgical anatomy of the donor influences donor and recipient outcomes.
- Discuss the pros and cons of utilizing non directed liver donors; why is it different than kidney donors?
- Review the long term quality of life in liver donors.

KPD Track

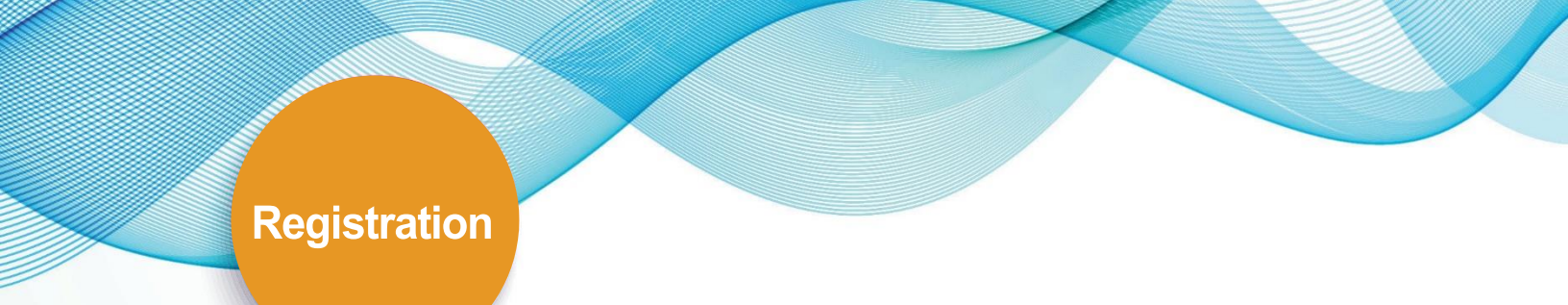
- Review current Kidney Paired Donation practices within the United States, Canada, and Europe.
