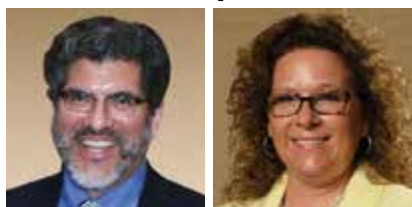

These standards parallel those for adult health services in format and substance while making more explicit what the standards require for adequate delivery of health services

for youths. Determining who is at high risk for suicide is challenging for jails and prison. Not identifying high-risk individuals can be deadly. Overidentification of low-risk individuals can result in unnecessary and overly restrictive housing, clothing, and monitoring. This highly interactive session covers 10 key issues related to suicide screening and assessment of incarcerated individuals, as well as controversies associated with each one. Focus is on standard of care and best practices to help professionals provide effective clinical services they can defend in litigation. Videos, photos, audience participation, and

lessons learned from correctional suicide lawsuits will be featured. **3.5 CE credits**

P06 Stop the Cycle: The Opioid Crisis, Recidivism, and Homelessness

MAT treatment, and meet the challenge of contraband drugs such as fentanyl entering our facilities. The speakers will discuss the impact of opioid addiction and strategies to combat this national crisis from administrative, custody, and health care perspectives. **3 CE credits.**

P07 Jail-Based MAT: Planning, Implementation, and Improvement

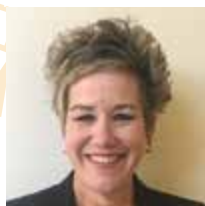

Individuals with opioid use disorder are disproportionately represented in correctional facilities relative to the general population. Medication-assisted treatment, considered the gold standard of care for OUD and repeatedly shown to increase positive health outcomes, has been increasingly offered in jails in recent years. However, challenges arise when implementing and running a jail-based MAT program. This session will include a review of current research on MAT in correctional facilities and an overview of essential

program components. After covering how to overcome common barriers and challenges, we hope to have a lively period for discussion of your questions. **3.5 CE credits.**

P08 Continuous Quality Improvement: Strategies and Techniques to Measure Change

Effective continuous quality improvement programs advance patient care, improve efficiencies in medical and mental health services delivery, help health professionals practice smarter, enable analysis of outcomes, and lead to objective analyses of areas needing improvement. A well-formulated CQI program also enables a correctional system to effectively respond to litigation. Despite these benefits, health professionals often view CQI as an accreditation requirement rather than as an essential component of

the overall program. Participants will gain appreciation for the clinical and administrative value of a comprehensive CQI program and learn how to implement a useful program. **3.5 CE credits.**
