Conference Overview for the 14th International Family Nursing Conference

The 14th International Family Nursing Conference, with our conference theme “Social Determinants of Family Health: Expanding Family Nursing Capacity”, will focus on engaging nurses and interdisciplinary colleagues in discussion of social determinants of health facing families worldwide. With an emphasis on understanding how families impact and are impacted by social determinants, the conference will focus on promoting community-engaged learning/collaboration among researchers, clinicians, educators, and community stakeholders to expand the capacity of family nurses for improving family health and well-being.

Education

1. To emphasize model approaches for strengthening nursing education in social determinants of family health.
2. To highlight service-learning in partnership with the family and community as an approach to enhancing family health around the globe.
3. To promote assessment and measurement of family nursing outcomes relevant to social determinants of health at all levels of nursing education.

Practice

1. To identify strategies for family nursing practice uniquely considering social determinants such as poverty, hunger, homelessness, stigma, and racism across the globe.
2. To highlight family nursing practice innovations and models which consider social determinants of family health.
3. To examine practice implications of considering social determinants of family health from an international perspective.

Research

1. To identify and describe disparities influencing family health or family health care.
2. To provide a forum for dialogue around the multifactorial determinants of family health disparities facing family researchers worldwide.
3. To highlight innovative design and testing of targeted family interventions, including approaches to enhance family engagement in research design and implementation, the use of community-based participatory research approaches, and the use of emerging technologies.

Policy/Leadership

1. To examine the role of formal structures and informal social systems influencing contemporary social determinants of family health.
2. To identify strategies for increasing family nurses' knowledge and advocacy for policies and programs that support family health at the local, national, and international level.
3. To highlight opportunities for encouraging family nurses to take active roles in health care policy and health care leadership in support of family health and family care worldwide.

Opening Keynote

Gala True, PhD

Investigator, South Central Mental Illness Research and Education Center (MIRECC)

Associate Professor of Community and Population Medicine

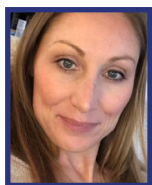
Louisiana State University School of Medicine, New Orleans, Louisiana USA

Dr. Gala True is an Investigator with the South Central Mental Illness Research and Education Center (MIRECC) at the Southeast Louisiana Veterans Health Care System (SLVHCS) and Associate Professor of Community and Population Medicine at Louisiana State University School of Medicine. With a background in folklore and anthropology, her research focuses on improving access to care and the health of individuals and communities through patient-centered and community-engaged research approaches. Her most recent research employs participatory action research methods to collaborate with Veterans, military families, and other key stakeholders on identifying barriers to post-deployment care and proposing solutions for improving community reintegration after separation from military service.



Sharon Urbina, Co-Presenter

Sharon Urbina is a caregiver to her husband, Carlos, who served in the United States Marine Corps for 16 years and sustained multiple traumatic brain injuries and post-traumatic stress from his 2 tours to Iraq. She is also a new mother, as she and Carlos recently had their first child. She is the Louisiana fellow with the Elizabeth Dole Foundation, where she works to create community coalitions focused on understanding and addressing unmet needs of military caregivers and families. Sharon uses her story and advocacy position to raise awareness in her community by telling her story to local veteran organizations, media outlets, and caregiver events. Throughout her journey, Sharon has learned to navigate health care systems and programs to advocate for her husband's healthcare needs. She and Gala True have been collaborating on research together for the past 3 years, including development of an exhibit of veteran and caregiver photo-narratives and a forthcoming paper in the Journal of Humanistic Psychology.

Dr. Hester Klopper is an international academic leader with global recognition for her work. She is the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Vice-President) for Strategy and Internationalisation at Stellenbosch University in South Africa. In addition, she is a Professor in the Department of Global Health, Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences. Global health has become a focus area of her work over the past decade, and through her visionary leadership, the Global Advisory Panel on the future of Nursing and Midwifery (GAPFON) was established (convened by Sigma). In country, she is a Fellow of the Academy of Nursing of South Africa (FANSA), a member of the South African Academy for Science and Art, and member of the Institute of Directors of South Africa (IODSA).

Dr. Sheila Tlou is the Co-Chair of the Global HIV Prevention Coalition. She has conducted research and taught courses to nursing, pre-medical and social science students on Gender issues relating to HIV/AIDS, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights, and Ageing and Older Persons. She has played a key role in the development of national nursing and medical education curricula, working to broaden the scope of Health Sciences education in her home country of Botswana. She is the founder of the Botswana chapter of the Society of Women and AIDS in Africa (SWAA) in which volunteers are trained in home-based care and educate families on HIV prevention, human rights, and caring for people living with AIDS.

Description:

The Family Care Rubric (FCR) was developed to provide nurse educators with a research-based tool to measure the family communication and assessment skills of healthcare students and staff during the debriefing stage of simulation. The rubric focuses on and measures the skills needed for optimum family nursing practice. Delegates attending the workshop will have the opportunity to observe/participate in a pediatric simulation and debrief session, utilizing the FCR to give formative feedback to participants. Participants will also explore ways to incorporate the FCR into their own simulation and educational programs.

This workshop will explore how to incorporate concepts, data, and methods from family science to complement family nursing research, theory, and practice surrounding the social determinants of health (SDOH). Brief introductions and hands-on activities will address theorizing about and operationalizing family and family-related variables in a SDOH framework, accessing publicly available nationally-representative datasets that include variables on family and health experiences, and designing multigroup analyses (within path-analysis or structural equation model frameworks) to answer between- and within- group research questions surrounding family and SDOH. The Serious Illness Conversation is an evidence based approach to engaging patients with advanced disease and their family members in communication that supports thinking ahead, planning, and aligning treatment with what matters most. The process includes determining patient understanding about their health situation, offering individually tailored information about prognosis, eliciting patient and family goals, fears, worries, and most valued functions, and planning toward treatment decisions that align with values and preferences. The intervention has potential to moderate health disparities arising from social determinants of health by educating the patient, family, and clinician and is associated with positive health outcomes.
