Conference Description

Why should you come to this boot camp?

For the past three years, I have presented a multitude of sessions on the Perioperative Surgical Home and Enhanced Recovery After Surgery models. One reoccurring question I am continually asked is “come Monday morning, how do I actually start such a model in my hospital”? There are other excellent conferences on the topics of PSH and ERAS; however, none are directly devoted to the nuts and bolts of creating and maintaining these clinical models. In response to this urgent need, we are launching a series of Boot Camps that are singularly devoted to addressing the actual establishment of these models.

There are two overall goals of the Boot Camp:

- ▶ The first goal of the Boot Camp is to teach clinicians the necessary action steps that are required to start a PSH or Enhanced Recovery After Surgery model (OPERATIONS).
- ▶ The second goal is to achieve proficiency in the recognition and management of common medical problems encountered throughout the perioperative journey (MEDICAL KNOWLEDGE).

In this Boot Camp we have also infused two additional innovative. The first is the pre-conference that is devoted to the management of the cardiac patients. This is very timely considering the mandatory cardiac bundle. The second is a noted speaker from the Studer Group will speak about patient engagement, which is highly important in value-based care and payment.

Speakers for this Boot Camp are content experts in the PSH and ERAS model and exemplify world renown academic medical centers and outstanding community hospitals. These speakers represent multiple disciplines and have either established these models in their own hospitals or are real world experts in the medical management of these patients.

Participants in this Boot Camp should expect an ‘immersion weekend’ that is led by individuals who have established these models in community and academic centers. The first day is devoted to the establishment of such a model and then the second day is covering the “essential” perioperative medicine topics that are needed to start and maintain such a model.

We are limiting enrollment to 150 participants to create an intimate learning and networking atmosphere.

- ▶ Evaluate guidelines and or best practices of early nutrition and early mobilization after surgery
- ▶ Discuss the importance of preventing readmissions and the basics of Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) care
- ▶ Identify the emerging issues in failure to rescue and optimal discharge disposition
- Understand the need to change our management of patients and have our patients more engaged in their care

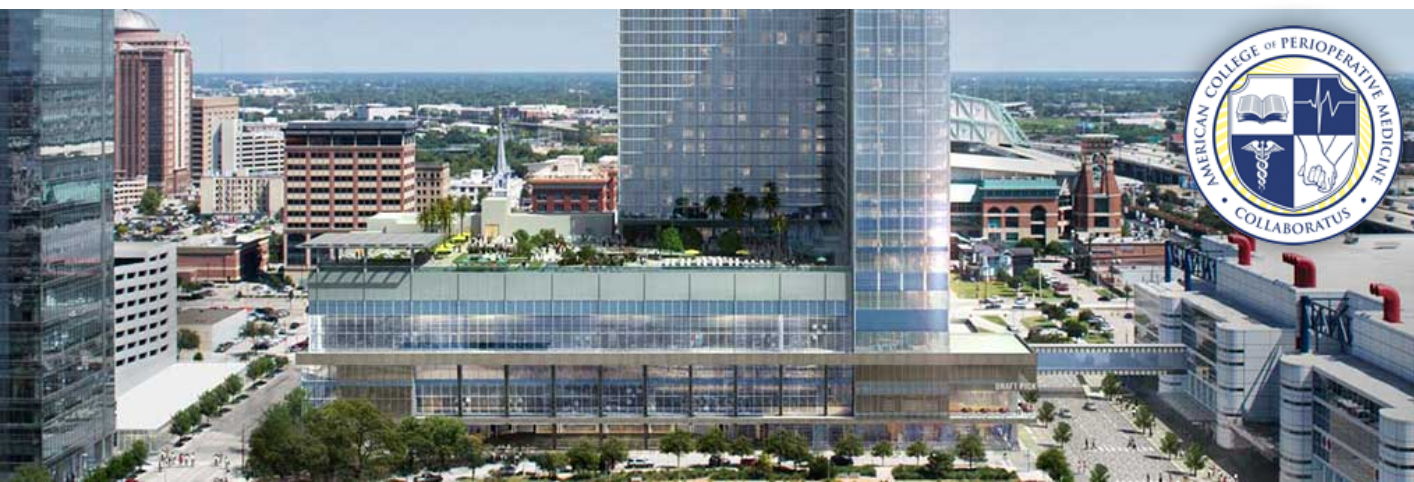
