“What Has Happened To You?” A Pediatric Human Trafficking and Trauma Informed Care Workshop

Understanding mental health and psychological trauma has never been more important than during these difficult past few years. In this

interactive workshop, you will learn about the neurobiology of psychological trauma, participate in an immersive, trauma-informed experience, better understand human trafficking and survivors' needs, and discuss how to provide trauma-informed care in your practice setting. We will be drawing from survivor perspectives and experiences with healthcare to understand the importance of a survivor-driven approach to trauma-informed care. Join us to deepen your understanding of psychological trauma, and experience how a history of trauma can impact a patient's life and hospitalization.

Helping LGBTQ+ Youth and Families THRIVE: The Role of the Pediatric Nurse in Creating a Welcoming, Inclusive Practice

Over 3 million LGBTQ+ adults are raising children under 18, and an estimated 10% of youth identify as part of the LGBTQ+ community and are coming out at younger ages. No matter where you practice, you can be sure that LGBTQ+ families and children are your patients, clients and community members. Research tells us that LGBTQ+ youth and families experience discrimination and bias when accessing healthcare and stigma based on sexual orientation and gender identity continues to put this population at risk. LGBTQ+ teens are four times as likely as their non-LGBTQ+ peers to experience significant mental health challenges--not because they are LGBTQ+, but rather as a direct result of stigma and marginalization either in their families, at school or in the broader community. This workshop will provide an overview of research findings relevant to the health and well-being of LGBTQ+ parents and LGBTQ+ youth and identify concrete policies and practices that help create equity, inclusion in healthcare settings, schools, and other key institutions of daily life. This workshop will also include a review of the language and terminology relevant to this topic, including transgender and non-binary identities.

Proactive and Supportive Strategies to Promote Emotional Safety and Medical Compliance While Enhancing the Patient Experience
