News from Florida Medical Association, April 13, 2016

The Florida Medical Association is the principal lobbying organization protecting the interests of physicians in the state of Florida. During the 60 day session ending March 11, the FMA and its staff tracked 211 of the 1638 bills and proposed amendments, and devoted over 800 hours to advocacy. Considering the rancor in the 2015 legislative session over Medicaid expansion, the reduction in Low Income Pool federal funds, as well as the various redistricting special sessions,

this year's legislative session was relatively peaceful. The FMA achieved many of its legislative priorities which will have a direct impact on the practice of urology.

Legislation requiring insurers to use a uniform two-page prior authorization form for medical procedures or prescriptions drugs was passed. A compromise on out of network balance billing was achieved. Non-contracted urologists providing ER services to patients on narrow network insurance plans are often compensated at lower than their customary rates. Though the new legislation prohibits balance billing, it provides for a dispute resolution process with the insurance carriers over their payments. It also assures that physicians, at a minimum, will be reimbursed at the usual and customary charge for similar services in their communities. The FMA was able to extend the exemption of medical malpractice premiums from the Catastrophic Fund assessable base. This could have resulted in all Florida physicians with malpractice insurance having been assessed thousands of dollars in additional insurance costs if a large hurricane were to strike Florida. The FMA was effective in neutralizing legislation that could have allowed telehealth practitioners to practice without a Florida License. The FMA is insistent that Florida licensure is the only way to give the

Florida Board of Medicine jurisdiction over any disciplinary actions committed via telemedicine.

Unfortunately, bills that would have abolished the certificate of need process, allowed ambulatory surgical centers to house patients in recovery centers for up to 72 hours, and a fail first/step therapy override bill (allowing physicians to override step therapy if it was felt to be in the patient's best interest) all went down to defeat. Although legislation was passed that allowed ARNPs and PA's to prescribe Schedule II drugs, the FMA was instrumental in implementing restrictions such as prescribing only under the supervision of a physician and a limitation of prescribing only a 7 day supply of controlled substances. The FMA fought vigorously to oppose independent prescribing authority for ARNP's which is currently allowed in 22 states and the District of Columbia where they can practice independently.

The FMA legislative team is constantly vigilant against legislation not in the best interest of Florida physicians or our patients. Legislation which would give ARNPs the ability to independently practice in Florida did not come up in this year's legislative session, though will almost certainly again rear its ugly head in the future.

Legislative priorities such as prohibiting retroactive insurance denials, first fail / step therapy overrides, and preventing urologists not licensed in the state of Florida from practicing telehealth will again be pressed in next year's session. I urge all FUS members to support my former partner, Dr. Neal Dunn, a past Chairman of the FMA's Council on Legislation and a current FMA Board member who is running for the US House of Representatives in Congressional District # 2. Neal would be a strong advocate for the FMA's legislative efforts and would help to protect the future of our profession.

Urologists Take Action on Worrisome Definitions of 'Quality'

Article originally appeared online at Health care reform requires the simultaneous pursuit of three goals, according to economists and government officials. As defined by these non-medical experts, the so-called "triple aim" seeks an improved experience of care, improved health of populations, and reducing per capita costs. To measure patients' subjective experience on all three components, public and private payers, as well as clinically focused physician groups, are scurrying to define "quality." There is some urgency to this effort because the law that repealed the Medicare sustainable growth rate (SGR) formula requires physician payments to be largely based on quality as of January 2019.

If defining quality is left only to payers, there is cause for alarm. Two recent proposals from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) stray far from the Institute of Medicine's definition of quality: "the degree to which health services for individuals and populations increase the likelihood of desired health outcomes and are consistent with current professional knowledge."

A public policy research firm working on CMS's behalf turned a blind eye to current professional knowledge by proposing that providers be penalized for recommending PSA-based screening for prostate cancer. Using the flawed U.S. Preventive Services Task Force recommendation against PSA testing as its primary source, the CMS contractor concluded that the intent of its proposal "is to discourage the use of PSA-based screening in the general population of men," and that less testing indicates better performance.

Individual physicians and organizations representing urologists, including the AACU, mobilized in strong opposition to this recommendation. The AACU State Society Network secured support from 22 state, section, and subspecialty groups on a letter

that disputes the proposal for medical and procedural reasons. The leaders of organized urology question the limited exceptions to the wide-ranging recommendation and warn, "CMS must not implement quality measures and screening recommendations derived without input from specialists in the related health condition."

In official comments submitted by AACU Health Policy Chair Jeffrey Frankel, MD, the AACU points to "the importance of an individualized decision on PSA-based testing between the patient and the physician." The letter continues: "Physicians should not be penalized for ordering a test that, while not perfect, has long been recognized as an important tool in the diagnosis of prostate cancer."

Likewise, urology caucus members and delegates to the AMA House of Delegates secured approval of a new policy for the influential national organization during its 2015 interim meeting. Resolution 225, authored by the AACU and AUA, calls on the AMA to, among other actions, "...continue to advocate for inclusion of relevant specialty societies and their members in guideline and performance measure development..."

CMS requested comments on another proposed quality measure in recent weeks that opens the door to mandated physician participation in Medicare and Medicaid. A "Request for Information" solicited feedback on a proposal to collect information on a physician's participation, or lack thereof, in Medicaid, health insurance exchange plans, and other activities. This data would be synthesized into a quality measure and factor into provider Medicare payments. In a letter to CMS, the AACU warned against such a measurement, asserting that the government's collection of such information may "...prompt physicians to stop treating Medicare patients..."

Non-clinical definitions of "quality" will play a huge role in post-SGR Medicare payment schemes. Physicians will find that they must check many more boxes to demonstrate the quality of their care. Urologists must continue to take action to ensure these quality measures do not harm patients and medical practices.

Educational Needs & Objectives

Educational Needs:

The field of urology covers a broad spectrum of both benign and malignant diseases of the genitourinary system, including the kidneys, ureters, bladder, prostate, urethra and male external genitalia. Clinical research evidence to guide the evidence-based practice of urology continues to evolve rapidly; however outside CME events, urologists have limited opportunity to familiarize themselves with evolving diagnostic and therapeutic approaches to the disease they treat on a day-to-day basis.

The objectives of this meeting is to provide Florida urologists with a convenient opportunity to educate themselves about the state-of-the art management of urological diseases and engage with expert faculty of national prominence. Particular emphasis will be provided via recommendations from evidence-based clinical practice guidelines as well as continued quality improvement in urological patient care. Specific lecture sessions surrounding the detection and treatment of prostate, bladder and kidney cancer, will update urologist on the latest technology available to enhance their clinical practice and outcomes.

In addition, focused lectures by national experts will address contemporary issues in voiding dysfunction, reconstruction, infertility, BPH and endourology. Such forums provide an opportunity to disseminate novel techniques and technologies in an evidence-based manner to advance the overall field of knowledge.

The overall goal of the meeting is to provide an evidence-based pathway to discuss the current management of patients suffering from urologic diseases.

Educational Objectives:

At the conclusion of the FUS 68th Annual Meeting, attendees should be able to:

1. Explain the impact of the previous USPSTF recommendation against prostate cancer screening on prostate cancer today.
2. Describe the role of emerging technologies in prostate cancer detection and risk stratification, including genomics, biomarkers and MRI Fusion Biopsy.
3. Identify criteria for the selection of patients for active surveillance for prostate cancer.
4. Describe the new Gleason Grading Group for prostate cancer.
5. Identify tips or techniques that can enhance the recovery of continence and potency after robot assisted radical prostatectomy.
6. Explain the role of focal therapy in prostate cancer.
7. Describe how to manage patients with advanced prostate cancer and develop an understanding of the various drugs and algorithms available for this purpose.
8. Describe a personalized approach to the management of the small renal mass.
9. Develop an understanding of the contemporary role of the urologist in early stage testis cancer.
10. Identify techniques and tips to enhance robotic partial nephrectomy.
11. Review novel techniques and strategies in the detection and management of bladder cancer.

12. Identify barriers and solutions for the development of a statewide quality improvement collaborative.
13. Employ an evidence-based algorithm for approaching the diagnostic and therapeutic management of urinary incontinence.
14. Describe evidence-based selection criteria for the choice of slings versus artificial sphincters for the management of refractory male urinary incontinence.
15. Describe the management of erectile dysfunction and the principles and complications with penile prosthetic surgery.
16. Explain the evaluation and the medical and surgical management of Peyronie's disease.
17. Explain the role and techniques associated with male sling products and the artificial urinary sphincter device.
18. Explain the medical and surgical management of BPH in males.
19. Explain the role of pre-procedural urodynamics prior to TURP.
20. Describe the medical management of nephrolithiasis.
21. Explain technologic advancements in upper tract endoscopy.
22. Describe the surgical management of nephrolithiasis.
23. Use recorded surgical video to understand technical innovations of prostatectomy and partial nephrectomy.
24. Describe the changes in Medicare reform resulting from Merit-Based Incentive Payment System (MIPS) & Alternative Payment Models (APMs).

Nurse Practitioner & Physician Assistant Hands-On Session Nuts & Bolts of Foley Catheter Insertion:

A Hands on Approach to Foley Catheter Insertion, Dilation Techniques, Cystoscopy, Stricture Management, Visual Foley Insertion, Supra-Pubic Catheter Insertion and Decreasing Catheter Related Events.

Educational Needs

With the declining urology physician work force and increasing aging patient population, it is likely that nurse practitioners and physician assistants may play a larger role in the management of difficult urethral catheterization (DUC). There is a paucity of structured hands-on training for nurse practitioners and physician assistants in DUC and this session is geared at meeting those needs and providing a foundation for further on-the job training and application.

Educational Objectives

At the conclusion of the Nurse Practitioner & Physician Assistant hands-on course, attendees should be able to:

1. Describe the normal urethral anatomy and be more comfortable with Foley catheter insertion.
2. Identify dilation techniques for urethral strictures and become proficient in dealing with this issue.
3. Demonstrate the tricks and tips for Cystoscopy technique.
4. Explain all treatment options for stricture disease.
5. Demonstrate proficiency in utilizing a new visual foley system.
6. Describe the basics and technique of suprapubic catheter insertion.
7. Identify the risks and morbidity associated with catheter related complications.

RESTAURANTS

Amelia Island serves more than 70 independent restaurants, from the finest dining (one of Florida's two five-Diamond restaurants) to charming bistros, local favorites, a blend of ethnic influences, and, of course, some of the world's best and freshest seafood are all on the menu.

No trip to Amelia Island is complete without a shrimp basket made from local, wild-caught shrimp. Don't miss Timoti's, voted one of Coastal Living Magazine's "Favorite Seafood Dives."

Locals love the tuna nachos served up by the Salty Pelican, a downtown favorite with gorgeous sunset views, while *USA Today* named T-Rays one of the "50 Best Burger Joints in America." Le Clos is one of the charming downtown restaurants offering a romantic table for two. For first class dining, try the dining room of Salt in The Ritz-Carlton Amelia Island, honored with the prestigious AAA Five Diamond Award. And no matter where you dine, it's wise to save room for dessert, prepared by local bakeries and artisan candy crafters like Fernandina's Fantastic Fudge downtown.

SHOPPING

Whether your perfect souvenir is a cozy pair of pajamas, custom-made note cards, the perfect toy, an accessory that will reel in compliments or a charming antique piece for your front porch, you can discover it here.

The Ritz-Carlton Amelia Island houses many unique shops, including the Salt Shop, where daily infusion classes take place and you can purchase varieties of salt from around the world.

The historic district is home to blocks of shops, set along Centre Street and its side streets, from the harbor front to just north of 8th Street. Amelia Island may just be Mother Nature's favorite child. With 13 miles of Appalachian quartz sand beaches, abundant native wildlife, and maritime forests stretching into tranquil marshlands, it's an island destination that surrounds you in beauty.

The Nature Center at Omni Amelia Island Plantation offers bicycle, Segway and kayak tours with master naturalists who know and share an unparalleled array of information about birds, turtles, edible plants, night creatures and crabs. Several tours are designed for children and include educational crafts.

Amelia Island's maritime forest canopy maintains the stability of our barrier island, mediates the climate in summer and winter, protects us from storm damage, and serves as habitat for wildlife. Many of the individual trees and canopy roads on the Island have fascinating stories.

GOLF

With 117 holes and seven that play along the Atlantic Ocean – think of it as a 42 million square foot water hazard – the links of Amelia Island offer irresistible play for golfers of every skill level. Fabled names like Pete Dye and Bobby Weed put their architectural design skills to work on Amelia Island's golf courses.

ON THE WATER

Amelia Island is home to a number of marinas, including the public marina in downtown Fernandina Beach. The marina offers public docking, a small supply store, and a marine welcome center, and it is adjacent to downtown's restaurants, boutiques and bookstores.

The ample beach accesses and often calm waters delight swimmers, strollers, and splashers of all ages on Amelia Island. On the Intercoastal Waterway side of Amelia Island, you can explore the waters by renting a boat (with or without a captain) and enjoy fishing, photographing, or simply enjoying the boating lifestyle.

Stand Up Paddleboarding (SUP) has become a hugely popular way to get out on the water and get an incredible workout at the same time. You can try it out on Amelia Island (in the ocean or in a calmer cove on the marsh side). Rentals and lessons are widely available.

Don't miss visiting the harborfront at the end of Centre Street in Historic Downtown Fernandina Beach, where you can go on a river cruise, charter a fishing boat, dine with a great view of the sunset, or simply enjoy the day's assortment of boats passing through from and on their way to locations around the world.

HISTORY

Amelia Island is the only place in the United States that has flown eight different national flags since 1562: France; Spain (more than once); England; the Patriots of Amelia Island (yes, they had their own flag); the Green Cross (raised by a self-proclaimed ruler); Mexico (the Mexican Rebel flag); the Confederate States of America; and the United States. A fascinating one-hour "Eight Flags Tour" is held twice a day at the Amelia Island Museum of History.

Oldest Hotel in Florida

The Florida House Inn is located in the historic district of Fernandina Beach and is known as the oldest surviving hotel in the state of Florida. Originally built in 1857 as a boarding house, the Inn housed soldiers during the Civil War and a stream of notable figures – Ulysses S. Grant, Jose Marti, Henry Ford, Laurel and Hardy, and many more.

The Palace Saloon, Florida's Oldest Bar

The last American tavern to close during Prohibition (it survived that era as an ice cream parlor.) The Palace Saloon was once a favorite haunt of the Carnegies, Rockefellers, and other socialites, and it's still open and waiting to refresh the thirsty today.

American Beach

American Beach was a glorious oceanfront haven for African Americans during the Jim Crow-era of segregation. In its heyday the restaurants and nightclubs of American Beach attracted musical superstars such as Ray Charles and James Brown. It is the first stop on Florida's Black Heritage Trail and home to the new American Beach Heritage Museum, which features photographs and a filmed tour of the beach by MaVynee Betsch – aka Beach Lady, a spirited advocate for the area and champion of environmental issues.
