Egyptian medical papyrus, *Papyrus Ebers*, lists over 100 prescriptions for eye diseases

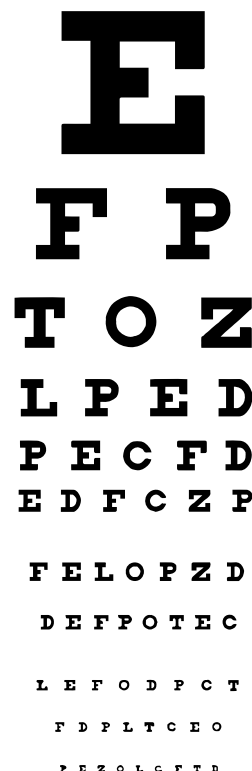

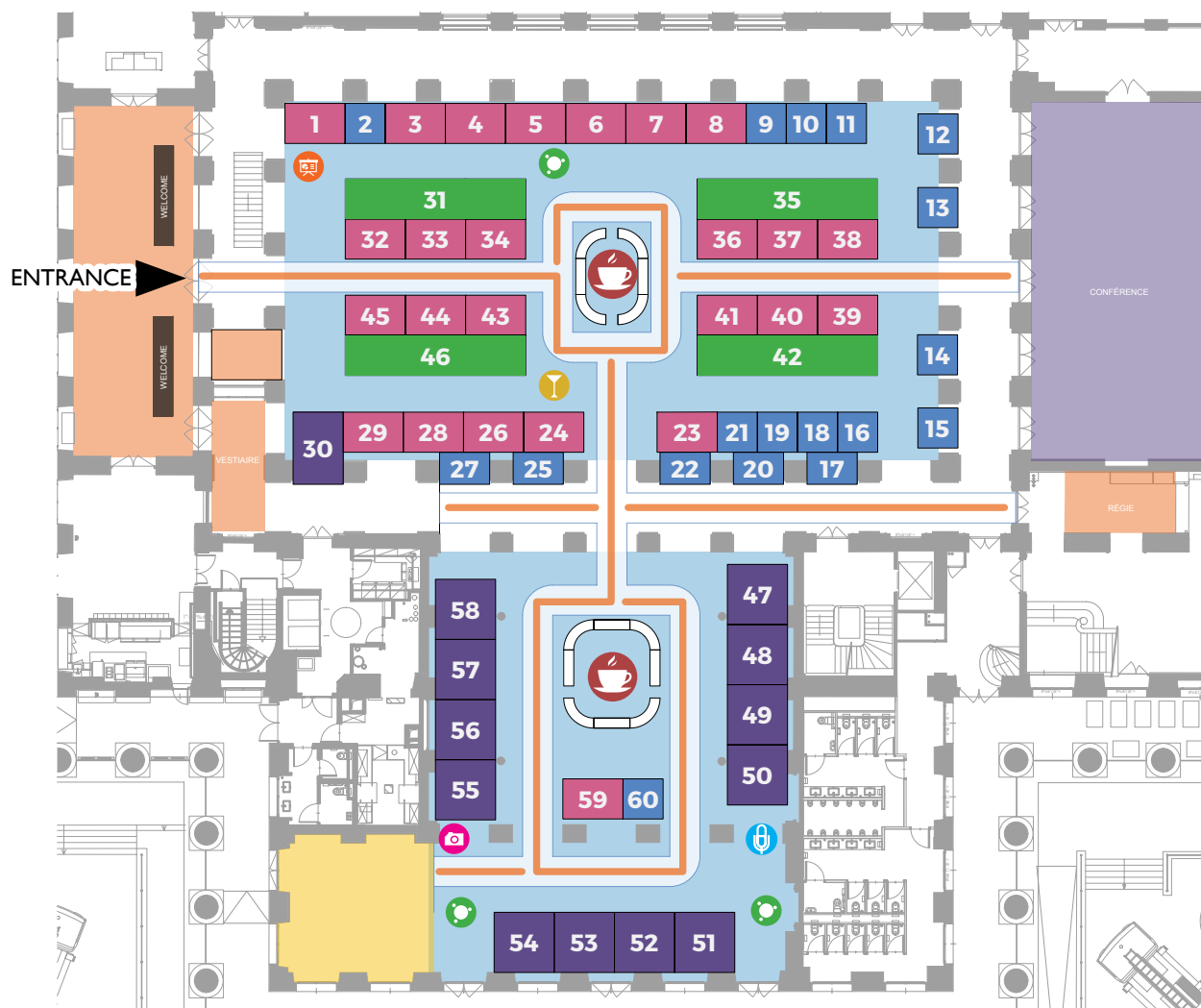
