The 11th Annual North American Young Rheumatology Investigator Forum will be held Wednesday, April 26, 2017 at the Hilton Sandestin in Destin, Florida in conjunction with the 33rd Annual Congress of Clinical Rheumatology. NYRIF's unique format fosters mentorship and emphasizes interaction between the registrants and faculty and provides an excellent platform for clinical and research oriented rheumatology fellows and junior faculty to have their clinical and basic research efforts reviewed, critiqued and evaluated by an acclaimed geographically diverse panel of rheumatologists. The top abstracts will be presented as either an oral or poster presentation to an international audience. In the afternoon, a roundtable discussion with rheumatologists established in the paths of research, clinical practice and the pharmaceutical industry will explore career opportunities, challenges, and lifestyles in the various fields of rheumatology to assist fellows with their upcoming career decisions. The next fifteen deemed to be highly meritorious will be asked to present in a poster session and will receive \$500 for travel and meeting expenses. Five remaining abstracts will be chosen to receive a travel/meeting stipend of \$250. Notification of abstract acceptance for oral or poster presentation as well as category of travel stipend award will be made by email by April 3, 2017. All judges' decisions are final.

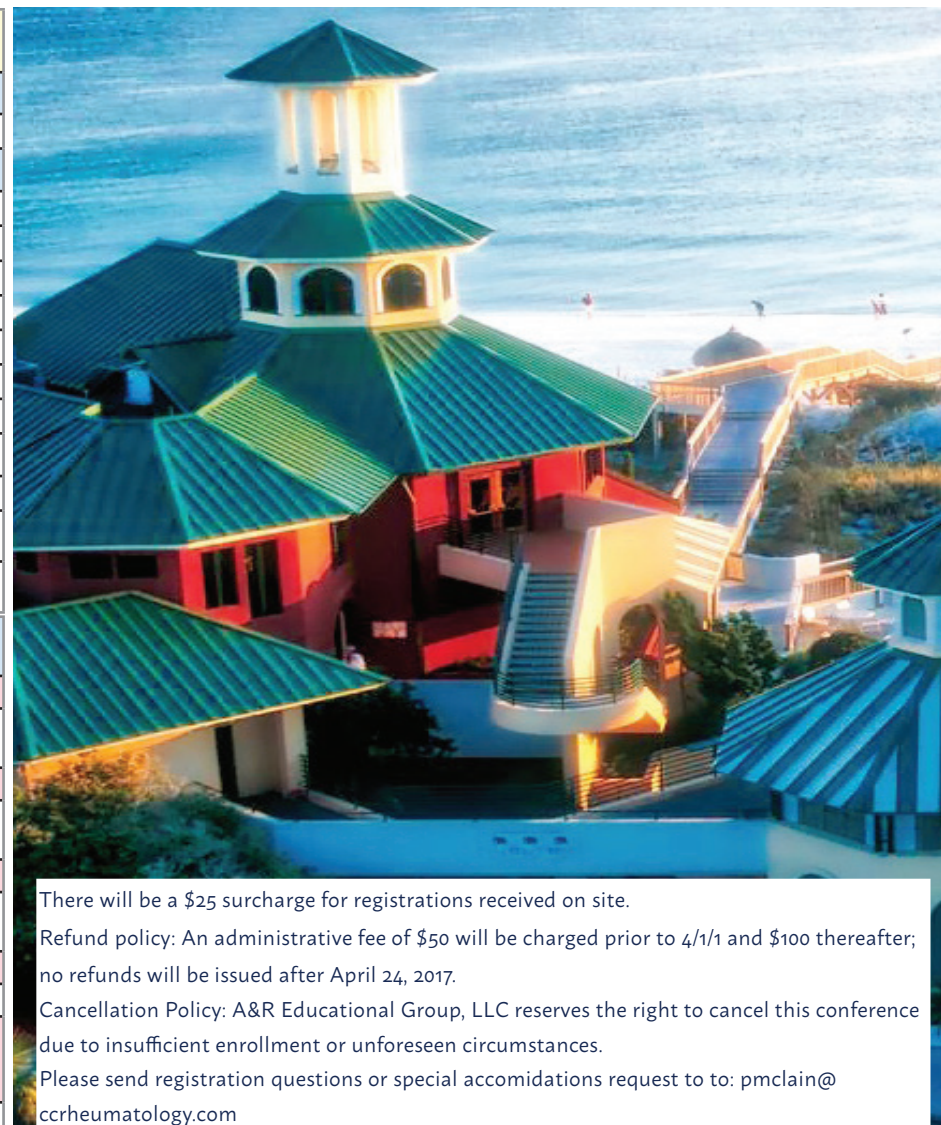
