DR. THOMAS DODSON

Dr. Thomas Dodson is Professor and Chair of the Department of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of Washington School of Dentistry and the Associate Dean for Hospital Affairs. He received his dental degree from Harvard School of Dental Medicine and Masters of Public Health from Harvard School of Public Health. He completed his OMS training at University of California, San

Francisco (UCSF). Additional post-doctoral training included a Dental Public Health residency and a NIH-funded fellowship in Clinical Epidemiology at UCSF.

Dr. Dodson believes that patients are our partners in discovery. As such, his research interests lie primarily in outcomes; research devoted to topics of interest to the specialty and developing and promoting evidence-based clinical decision-making. The primary goal of his research efforts is to improve patient outcomes by identifying factors that can be manipulated by clinicians to enhance prognosis or decrease the risk of adverse events.

From a specialty training standpoint, Dr. Dodson's goal is to train the next generation of leaders in oral and maxillofacial surgery.

Objective: To provide an overview and examples of data-driven clinical decision-making. The audience will learn: 1) the elements of the critical appraisal exercise, 2) how to assess the quality of a paper, and 3) how to apply the principles to common OMS clinical challenges to enhance patient care.

Synopsis: Twenty years ago, a mentor made me an expert on evidence-based clinical decision-making. How? The old-fashioned way ... he assigned me the topic to present at a national meeting. It changed the way I think about clinical care. It made sense. Most importantly, it was a practical way to use the clinical literature to care better for my patients.

I want to share with the WSOMS membership my enthusiasm for data-driven decision-making. It is not that hard and you don't need to be a statistician. You may need to know arithmetic. I will provide examples of the application of the clinical literature to enhance everyday clinical decision-making on topics that include implants to third molar management to obstructive sleep apnea.



DR. TONY POGREL

Tony Pogrel received his dental degree in 1967 from Liverpool University in England and his medical degree from Aberdeen University in Scotland in 1974. He then received further general surgery training and Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery training in Great Britain, Holland and Miami, Florida. In 1979, he was appointed consultant oral and maxillofacial surgeon in Peterborough and Cambridge in

England and since 1983, has been on the full-time faculty of the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of California, San Francisco. He is a former chairman of the department and is currently a professor and Associate Dean. Dr. Pogrel holds both medical and dental licenses in California and is board certified in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. He is a fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons, the American College of Surgeons, American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, the British Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, the International Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, the International and American Associations of Dental Research, and the American Society of Maxillofacial Surgeons.

Dr. Pogrel has more than 200 publications in the literature on a variety of topics and is a frequent presenter at specialty meetings nationally and internationally.

Presentation

- **Intraoral Dysplasia.** This talk will discuss the prevention, etiology and management of intraoral dysplasia paying particular attention to some of the technologies which currently are being evaluated for helping with the early diagnosis of this condition.
- **An Update on Medication-Induced Osteonecrosis of the Jaws.** This talk will include the current thoughts on etiology, diagnosis and management of MIONJ including bisphosphonates, denosumab and inhibitors of angiogenesis. Our results with different treatment modalities will be discussed including treatment with hyperbaric oxygen, pentoxifylline and tocopherol. In particular, we will discuss the controversial issue of osseointegrated dental implants in patients at risk for MIONJ.

- **Nerve Damage in Relationship to Implants and Root Canal Therapy.** In this talk we will discuss thoughts of damage to the inferior alveolar nerve resulting from dental implants placed in the posterior mandible and also issues regarding root canal sealants that come in contact with the inferior alveolar nerve. We will discuss prevention and the most appropriate management of the condition.

At the end of this course, attendees should be able to:

- Know the most effective means to prevent intraoral dysplasia.
- Be able to diagnosis intraoral dysplasia.
- Be aware of the most appropriate management protocols for intra-oral dysplasia.
- Be conversant with the drugs that may cause medication-induced osteonecrosis of the jaws.
- Be aware of techniques to minimize the risks of medication-induced osteonecrosis of the jaws.
- Be conversant with the most appropriate treatments for medication-induced osteonecrosis of the jaws.
- Realize the complications that are possible when osseo-integrated dental implants are placed in the jaws with patients at risk of medication-induced osteonecrosis of the jaws.
- Understand protocols for minimizing the risk of damage to the inferior alveolar nerve from dental implants.
- Be aware of the most appropriate treatments for inferior alveolar nerve damage caused by dental implants.
- Be conversant with appropriate protocols to minimize the risk of permanent damage to the inferior alveolar nerve from root canal sealants.
- Realize the effects of time on the chances of a successful resolution of symptoms from root canal sealants.

DR. O. ROSS BEIRNE

Dr. O. Ross Beirne received his DMD from Harvard School of Dental Medicine, his Ph.D. in Biochemistry from the University of California, San Francisco, and his certificate in Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery from Harbor-UCLA Medical Center. He was formerly at the University of California, San Francisco from 1979–1985 and Associate Professor and Director of the Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery Residency Training Program at the University of Washington from 1985–1999. He served as Chair of the Department of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of Washington from 1999–2010. He is currently Professor of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of Washington, School of Dentistry.

A Diplomate of the American Board of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery and the National Dental Board of Anesthesiology, Dr. Beirne served on the Examination Committee of the American Board of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery from 1997–2001. He is a Fellow of the American Association of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgeons and the American Dental Society of Anesthesiology. A founding member of the National Dental Board of Anesthesiology, his honors include election to Phi Beta Kappa; University of California, Berkeley; Omicron Kappa Upsilon; Harvard School of Dental Medicine and the American College of Dentists. He is the recipient of the 2008 AAOMS/ADEA Gies Award for distinguished achievements in oral surgery and the 2013 University of Washington Bruce Rothwell Lifetime Teaching Award.

Dr. Beirne is a member of the Editorial Boards of *Anesthesia Progress*, the *Journal of Evidence Based Dental Practice*, and *Oral Surgery*. He is an ad hoc reviewer for the *Journal of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery*; *Oral Surgery*, *Oral Medicine*, *Oral Pathology*, and *Oral Radiology*; and the *International Journal of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery*. He is former chair of the Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery Foundation's Committee on Research and current chair of the Osseointegration Foundation-Academy of Osseointegration's Committee on Research.

While continuing clinical practice, Dr. Beirne also devotes considerable time and effort to teaching at both the predoctoral and postdoctoral levels.

The management of anesthesia emergencies has undergone significant changes based on the use of checklists. Checklists avoid overlooking treatment options and helps direct patient care during an emergency. Checklists also inform and direct the patient care team, which can provide rapid and appropriate management of emergencies. The use of checklists will be reviewed and samples of checklists that can be modified for individual use will be available.

An update on the management of diabetes will also be presented. The new diabetic medications as well as intensive glucose regulation using rapid and long-acting insulin as well as insulin pumps will be considered. The impact of these new medications and tight control of serum glucose on the management of diabetic patients needing oral and maxillofacial surgery and recommendations for treating diabetic patients will be discussed.

A growing number of patients presenting for oral and maxillofacial surgery are taking various anticoagulants and antiplatelet medications. Some of these drugs can be reversed but several do not have reversal agents. The management of these patients will be reviewed and recommendations for treatment recommendations will be outlined.

The attendees will be able to:

1. list the advantages of checklists for the management of anesthesia emergencies.
2. use checklists to manage typical anesthesia emergencies that can occur with office based sedation and general anesthesia.
3. describe the mechanism of action of new oral antihyperglycemic medications.
4. list the antihyperglycemic drugs that are associated with hypoglycemia.
5. modify the antihyperglycemic drugs and insulin therapy for patient that must be NPO before surgery.
6. select appropriate intravenous fluids for diabetic patients receiving intravenous sedation or general anesthesia
7. list the anticoagulants that are used for patients presenting with conditions that require "blood thinner."
8. list and use reversal agents for patients taking anticoagulants who are bleeding following oral and maxillofacial surgery
9. list and use various local measures for managing patients taking anticoagulants as well as healthy patients who are bleeding after oral and maxillofacial surgery.
