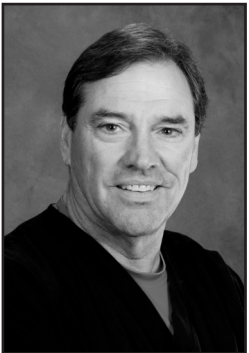
Many of you recently read the AUA census on the urology work force. Here follows a selected excerpt from it. I believe you will find some of the data interesting:

- The states with the highest number of practicing urologists include California, Florida, Illinois, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas.
- More than half of the identified 11,703 practicing urologists in the United States are over the age of 53 and nearly 23 percent are aged 65 years or older.

- Sixty-four percent of practicing urologists in the U.S. work in private practice and one-third (33.9 percent) practice in institutional settings such as hospitals or academic medical centers. Of the group in private practice, more than one-third (34.47 percent) belong to single urology specialty groups and 17.4 percent belong to a multispecialty groups.
- Practicing urologists aged 45 or older are statistically more likely to be in private practice.
- Practicing urologists below the age of 45 are more likely to be employed by other entities (e.g., hospitals or health systems).
- The median number of hours that practicing urologists work per week is 55. Nearly 30 percent of urologists report working more than 60 hours per week.
- The median number of patients that US urologists seen in a week is 80.
- Higher percentages of females are observed in the younger age groups of practicing urologists (< 45 years of age), suggesting that a growing number of females are entering the urologic workforce in the US.

We have 603 total members in the Florida Urological Society, of which 406 are active and 139 are senior members. Florida has the ability to continue to grow in its reach and influence within the SES and the AUA by growing our membership. But that can only be done with your continued support. We need to encourage our partners and associates to join and participate. We must remain organized and be strong, as an increasingly united and vocal front. I look forward to our meeting in September.

News from Florida Medical Association, May 25, 2015

The Florida Medical Association's mission is to "Help Physicians Practice Medicine." The FMA is proud of its close relationship with the FUS which has one of the highest co-membership shares of all specialties. The role of the FMA is to provide practice information, CME, numerous practice services, and perhaps most importantly, advocate for patients and physicians in front of all branches of the government and the media.

Health care has become the largest single expense of the state and federal governments and is the single largest industry in America. One in eight Americans are employed in the health care industry. Every political leader and every large employer has a laser focus on health care policy and delivery. Lost in the deluge of trillions of dollars, innumerable regulations, and vast bureaucracies are our patients and the single group that is actually able to understand what constitutes quality medical care — the physicians. As physicians and surgeons, we can no longer watch the policy process from the sidelines. Our patients' health, our health, and the future for our children's health demand our close engagement with the fashioning of health care policy.

The FMA has long been the principal voice in Florida for patients and physicians in front of the legislature and executive branches of government. We are recognized annually as one of the most effective and powerful voices in Tallahassee during the legislative session, and 2015 has been no exception. The session ended in a most surprising way this year with the Senate and the House unable to reach agreement on their single largest budget item — health care. This set us up for a Special Session beginning June 1 that is dedicated wholly to the health care budget. Every line item that contributes to that expense is on the table. The potential for a punishing mêlée is very real and the FMA will be in the thick of it. We will always be there to protect our patients, protect the quality of medical care, and to help physicians practice medicine.

There are many key issues that could save money and protect quality of care such as team-based medical care, and devising an operable, safe way to deliver and regulate telemedicine in Florida. Streamlining our interactions with payers could also save untold time and dollars. We have advocated for these in prior years, but met resistance from those who would trade away quality for cost.

As I write this, the battle is yet to be joined. As you read it, we should know more about the outcome of this battle. I look forward to seeing you at the annual meeting and celebrating success for your patients and your practices together then.

Government Relations and Advocacy Update

Senate Scuttles House Plan to Control Healthcare Costs, Reduce Regs

The Florida Senate didn't consider five House-approved health care reform bills June 15, following the House's refusal to approve the Senate's Medicaid expansion plan earlier in the three-week special session, the Florida Times-Union reports. The Senate's Medicaid expansion plan rejected by the House would have transferred \$18 billion federal dollars to hundreds of thousands of Floridians to purchase private health insurance instead of putting them in the regular Medicaid program. The package of House-approved bills rejected by the Senate sought to contain health care costs and streamline regulations. The legislation eliminated certificate of need requirements for hospital expansion, opened the door to off-site surgery and recovery centers, allowed advanced-registered nurse practitioners and physician assistants to prescribe controlled substances and created new options for state employees to choose from health-insurance plans.

Feds Oppose Governor's Request for Mediation in Hospital Funding Dispute

In court documents filed June 9, federal health officials said they talked with Florida as recently as two-days before and that the discussions are ongoing and have been productive. The Obama administration also said there is no basis for mediation because their administration has already been clear on the core issue of the lawsuit. Governor Scott is suing the administration, alleging they are withholding federal hospital funds because Florida won't expand Medicaid. The administration wants Florida to expand Medicaid, but says it will not deny the funds based on the state's Medicaid decision. The administration has temporarily agreed to extend the funds for two more years but at a much lower price.

'Right To Try' Law To Allow Experimental Drugs

Gov. Rick Scott signed into law June 10 a new law dubbed the "Right to Try Act." It will let terminally ill patients access to certain experimental drugs as of July 1. The "Right to Try Act" focuses on drugs that have been through what is known as "phase 1" of a clinical trial but have not been approved for general use by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Patients with terminal conditions could have access to the experimental drugs, and the bill would provide liability protections to doctors and drug manufacturers. Scott Vetoes Bill Allowing Direct Sale of Medical Equipment

The Governor vetoed a single measure (HB 1305) on June 10 that would have allowed certain physicians and chiropractors to sell or rent electrostimulation medical equipment directly to patients without incurring license fees. Gov. Scott --- in a letter explaining the veto to Secretary of State Ken Detzner --- said he agreed with the Legislature's attempt to "remove burdensome regulations." But he expressed concern that the bill would create "carve-outs," which he said can create "additional levels of complexity to regulatory requirements" and "present an unfair advantage to certain entities competing within the same industry." As with Scott's two other vetoes this year, the bill was approved without opposition in the House and Senate during the regular session. (The News Service of Florida, June 11, 2015)

Educational Needs

The field of urology covers a broad spectrum of both benign and malignant diseases of the genitourinary system, including the kidneys, ureters, bladder, prostate, urethra and male external genitalia. Clinical research evidence to guide the evidence-based practice of urology continues to evolve rapidly; however outside CME events, urologists have limited opportunity to familiarize themselves with evolving diagnostic and therapeutic approaches to the disease they treat on a day-to-day basis.

The objectives of this meeting is to provide Florida urologists with a convenient opportunity to educate themselves about the state-of-the art management of urological diseases and engage with expert faculty of national prominence. Particular emphasis will be provided via recommendations from evidence-based clinical practice guidelines as well as continued quality improvement in urological patient care. Specific lecture sessions surrounding the treatment of prostate, bladder and kidney cancer, for example, given by surgeons with exemplary experience and success in robotic surgery, will both increase surgeons abilities to treat urologic cancer, as well as better address diagnoses for patients presenting with urologic cancer, leading to better patient outcomes.

In addition, controversies associated with the ever-expanding arena of hypogonadism and men's health can present a daunting challenge in terms of keeping up with current knowledge to safely and effectively treat patients. Erectile dysfunction and Peyronie's disease are examples of specific pathologic entities that present significant challenges for providers to address and successfully manage. It is important to have experts and panels discuss the new techniques and technologies in an evidence-based manner to advance the overall urology field of knowledge. National experts will address these current issues and present state-of-the-art information to attendees.

The overall goal of the meeting is to provide an evidence-based pathway to discuss the current management of patients suffering from urologic diseases ranging from GU oncology and stone disease to hypogonadism, erectile dysfunction, Peyronie's disease, and male stress incontinence.

Educational Objectives

At the conclusion of the FUS 67th Annual Meeting, attendees should be able to:

1. Describe the evolution of renal surgery from radical to partial nephrectomy and open to minimally-invasive surgery with special emphasis on current guideline recommendations.
2. Identify barriers and solutions for the development of a statewide quality improvement collaborative.
3. Explain the contemporary management of the hypogonadal male.
4. Employ an evidence-based algorithm for approaching the diagnostic and therapeutic management of urinary incontinence.
5. Describe evidence-based selection criteria for the choice of slings versus artificial sphincters for the management of refractory male urinary incontinence.
6. Describe frontiers in the application of robotic-assisted surgery in urology in the arenas of prostatic surgery, bladder cancer surgery and microsurgery with special emphasis on issues of learning curve and quality assurance.
7. Describe the evidence for open versus robotic-assisted laparoscopic assisted radical cystectomy and the relative merits and risks of either approach.
8. Integrate robotic technology in the treatment of urologic oncology which will improve patient outcomes.
9. Describe the management of erectile dysfunction and the principles and complications with penile prosthetic surgery.
10. Explain the evaluation and the medical and surgical management of Peyronie's disease.
11. Describe the evaluation and the management of premature ejaculation.
12. Explain the role and techniques associated with male sling products and the artificial urinary sphincter device.
13. Describe the role of emerging technologies in urology, including genomics, biomarkers and MRI Fusion Biopsy.
14. Explain the medical and surgical management of BPH in males.
15. Use recorded surgical video to understand technical innovations of prostatectomy and partial nephrectomy.
16. Describe the updates and innovations in the field of pediatric urology.
17. Describe ICD-10 and Medicare Carrier Advisory updates.

Nurse Practitioner & Physician Assistant Hand-On Session

Nuts & Bolts of Foley Catheter insertion:

A Hands on Approach to Foley catheter insertion, dilation techniques, cystoscopy, stricture management, visual Foley insertion, supra-pubic catheter insertion and decreasing catheter related events.

Educational Needs

With the declining urology physician work force and increasing aging patient population, it is likely that nurse practitioners and physician assistants may play a larger role in the management of difficult urethral catheterization (DUC). There is a paucity of structured hands-on training for nurse practitioners and physician assistants in DUC and this session is geared at meeting those needs and providing a foundation for further on-the job training and application.

Educational Objectives

At the conclusion of the Nurse Practitioner & Physician Assistant hands-on course, attendees should be able to:

1. Describe the normal urethral anatomy and be more comfortable with Foley catheter insertion.
2. Identify dilation techniques for urethral strictures and become proficient in dealing with this issue.
3. Demonstrate the tricks and tips for Cystoscopy technique.
4. Explain all treatment options for stricture disease.
5. Demonstrate proficiency in utilizing a new visual Foley system.
6. Describe the basics and technique of suprapubic catheter insertion.
7. Identify the risks and morbidity associated with catheter related complications.
