Each speakers’ goal is to provide attendees with ideas for actionable improvements in their day-to-day care of patients.

The plenary is open to all; however, registration to purchase a lunch is required. Course Objectives

At the conclusion, participants should be able to:

- Recognize current pediatric infectious disease trends, prevalence and prevention
- Apply enhanced competencies in screening, diagnosing and managing children with food and environmental allergies, orthopedic, urologic, gastrointestinal and dermatologic conditions
- Review application of evidence-based medicine in the care of pediatric patients with endocrine, pulmonary and surgical problems
- Identify and practice the leading edge approach to current applications of precision medicine
- Acknowledge and apply current best practices in the management of children with substance abuse and pain disorders
- Analyze the effectiveness and use of different contraception methods and learn to apply that to counsel patients on benefits and risks
- Discuss and review the latest use of SSRIs and SNRIs in pediatric mood disorders
- Implement continuous quality improvement methodologies in the office setting
- Evaluate and utilize currently available safety procedures to improve medical outcomes in ambulatory settings
- Acquire strategies and skills to incorporate effective bedside teaching and EMR use in the education of learners
- Explain the basic pathophysiology of type 2 diabetes in youth, recall differences between youth-onset type 2 diabetes and adult-onset type 2 diabetes, and explain screening and treatment recommendations
