OPENING SCIENTIFIC PLENARY SESSION

The ASAM 51st Annual Conference will begin with the Opening Scientific Plenary Session. This session will be moderated by ASAM President Paul H. Earley, MD, DFASAM, to motivate and energize conference attendees.



Vice Admiral Jerome M. Adams, MD, MPH – United States Surgeon General, HHS Office of the Secretary (Invited)

Dr. Jerome Adams is the 20th Surgeon General of the United States. During his tenure as Surgeon General, Dr. Adams has created several initiatives to tackle our nation's most pressing health issues, including the opioid epidemic. Dr. Adams also released Facing Addiction in America: The Surgeon General's Spotlight on Opioids, and a digital postcard calling for a cultural shift in the way Americans think about, talk about, and respond to the opioid crisis. His Surgeon General's postcard recommends actions that can prevent and treat opioid misuse and promote recovery.



Hendree Jones, PhD – Executive Director, UNC Horizons, and Professor, Obstetrics and Gynecology, School of Medicine, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

R. Brinkley Smithers Distinguished Scientist Award Winner

Dr. Jones is an internationally recognized expert in the development and examination of behavioral and pharmacologic treatments for pregnant women and their children in risky life situations. She has received continuous NIH funding since 1994, won several awards, written more than 195 publications, authored two books, and written multiple textbook chapters on the topic of pregnancy and addiction. Dr. Jones is also the lead author of the MOTHER study. She is a professor for UNC Chapel Hill, and Executive Director of UNC Horizons, a substance use disorder treatment program for pregnant and/or parenting women and their children.



Jarrett J. Krosoczka – Author/Illustrator, *Hey, Kiddo*

Media Award Winner

New York Times best-selling author/illustrator Jarrett J. Krosoczka creates books with humor, heart, and a deep respect for his young readers—qualities that have made his titles perennial favorites on the bookshelves of homes, libraries, and bookstores. In 2018, he published his first book for adult readers, *Hey, Kiddo*, a graphic memoir of his childhood in which he described growing up in a family that grappled with addiction. In 2019, his illustration of a late pioneer in addiction treatment was featured as a “Google Doodle,” the unique illustration that the internet giant sometimes uses in place of its logo on its homepage to celebrate special dates, achievements and historical figures. First published at the age of twenty-three, Krosoczka has more than thirty published books to his credit.



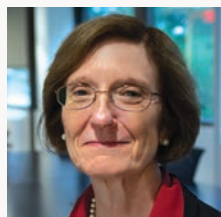

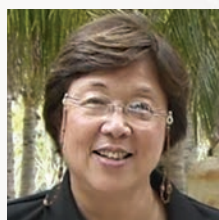

Marijuana Legalization: What Addiction Treatment Providers Need to Know

State laws and public perceptions regarding marijuana have been changing rapidly. Addiction treatment providers need to be prepared to talk to their patients in a clear and unbiased way about both the risks associated with marijuana and what is known about its therapeutic potential. This plenary session, moderated by ASAM President-Elect William F. Haning, MD, DFASAM, will explore what is known about the impacts of state marijuana policy changes on substance use related outcomes and will provide an overview of current research on the therapeutic potential of cannabinoids. Speakers will also provide guidance on how to effectively communicate what we do and do not know on these topics. These talks will be followed by a panel discussion with treatment providers on how they discuss these issues with their patients, challenges they face, and how they address them.

OVERVIEW

The ASAM Fundamentals of Addiction Medicine is a practical, case-based workshop designed for providers who are relatively new to the field of addiction medicine, such as primary care physicians, clinicians, and behavioral health specialists, who see patients at risk for or with addiction.

Participants of this workshop will learn more about addiction medicine and how to screen, diagnose, treat, and/or refer patients with addiction – many of whom have co-occurring medical and psychiatric comorbidities.

This live workshop is designed to be energetic and interactive. Attendees will work through session activities and cases presented by faculty with participants at their table. Sessions throughout the day will include approximately equal parts lecture, demonstration of skills and skill building.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this educational activity, participants should be able to:

1. Identify one's own feelings and attitudes that promote or prevent therapeutic responses to patients with substance use disorders.
2. Demonstrate a knowledge of the diseased brain processes when treating patients with substance use disorders.
3. Use validated patient screening tools to detect substance use and interpret a spectrum of results.
4. Use motivational interviewing to enhance patients' readiness to change risky behaviors.
5. Offer the interventions that are appropriate to specific substances and severity of usage pattern.
 - Respond to hazardous drinking with brief counseling strategies, appropriate to the patient's readiness to change.
 - For patients suspected of having a SUD, conduct a biopsychosocial assessment to provide a diagnosis and match the patient to an appropriate level of care.
6. Prescribe pharmacotherapy appropriately for alcohol, tobacco, and opioid use disorders.
7. Offer patients and families information and referral to behavioral interventions including support groups and mutual aid groups that assist in the recovery process.

OVERVIEW

The ASAM Motivational Interviewing Workshop is an interactive and engaging workshop designed to introduce and expand participants' knowledge on utilizing Motivational Interviewing (MI) in an addiction treatment setting. MI is a goal-oriented, collaborative counseling style that evokes a person's own motivations for and commitment to change.

Physicians, clinicians, counselors, and all those working with patients with addiction often find that one of the main barriers to effective treatment is the patients' perceived lack of motivation to make changes. Without motivation on the patient's part, making or sustaining progress with treatment goals can be difficult. MI is one technique that treatment providers can utilize to help patients make positive changes. Participants of this workshop will be introduced to the key concepts and skills of MI and explore ways to effectively integrate MI into addiction treatment to help promote positive patient outcomes.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

Clinicians working with patients with addiction who are interested in an introductory workshop that reviews the core skills of Motivational Interviewing (MI). This workshop is designed for those with little to no prior experience with MI, and for those with some prior exposure to MI. Participants of previous MI workshops who would like to continue their practice of fundamental MI skills with similar material are also welcome to attend.

OVERVIEW

Chronic Pain "Opioid Refugee": Role of The Addiction Medicine Specialist

The ASAM Pain & Addiction: Common Threads Course is one of ASAM's longest running and most popular courses. This course is designed to develop learners' clinical skills and improve treatment of patients who fall somewhere in the gray area around pain and addiction. Participants will learn clinical best practices and new research developments affecting treatment and how to integrate these techniques into their own practices. This year's course will utilize a dynamic mix of teaching methods including didactic presentations, complex patient cases, and debates between experts in the field.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

This course is intended for those in the addiction medicine field who already have some experience with pain and addiction. Other healthcare providers and members of the care team who are interested in treating this patient population are also welcome and encouraged to attend.

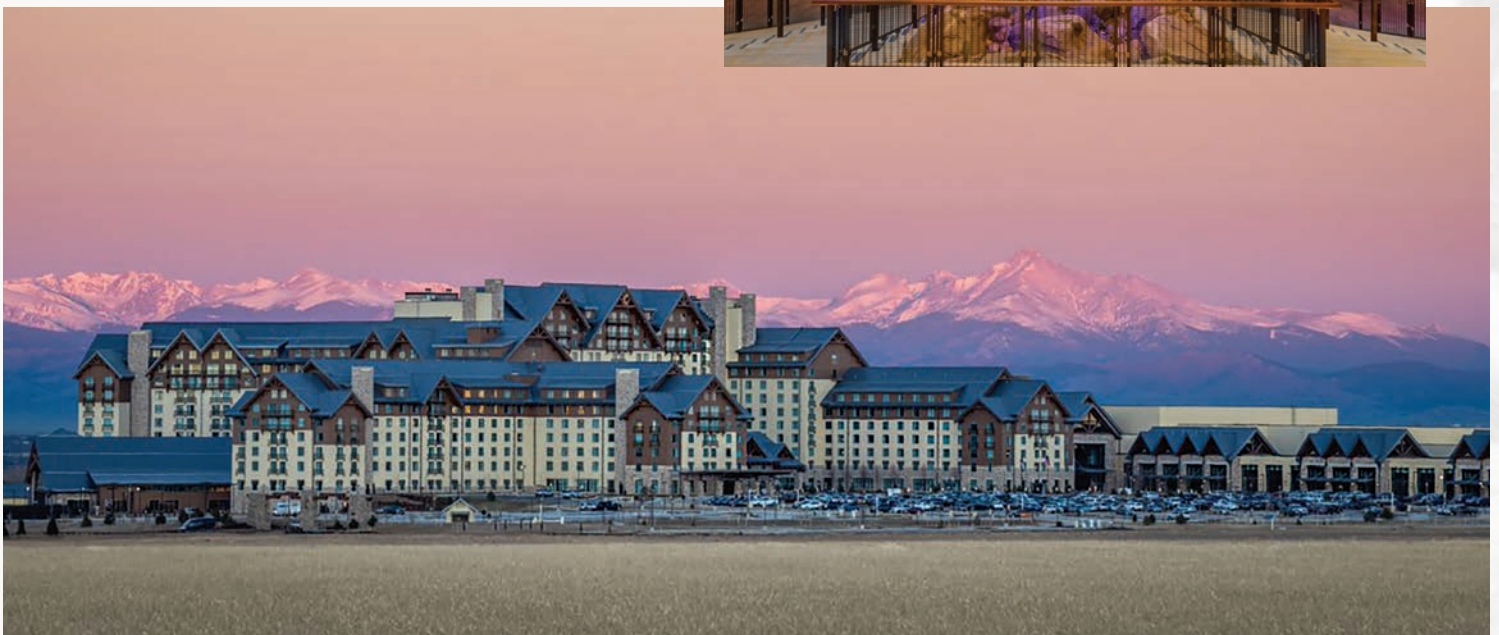
