While there, he investigated the use of engineered anthrax toxin as a chemotherapeutic, and he graduated from the NIH Academy, with extensive coursework in health disparities. Then he returned to the Duke University School of Medicine, where he earned his MD in 2017. While in medical school, his interest in infectious disease evolved into curiosity about the gut-brain axis. He investigated gut sensation and its role in behavior using 3D electron microscopy, ultimately publishing a novel characterization of tuft cell ultrastructure.

Given his growing interest in behavior, Dr. Hoover pursued psychiatry residency at the MGH McLean program. During this time, he was accepted into the R-25 funded Physician Scientist Training Program and joined the Kahn Laboratory at the Joslin Diabetes Center. He employed an iPSC model to investigate the role of insulin signaling dysfunction in Alzheimer's Disease pathogenesis. His clinical interests also began to focus on the intersection of medical and psychiatric disease. He served as a chief resident and won the Anne Alonso Award for Psychotherapy and the Residency Neuroscience Award. After residency, he was accepted into the MGH Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry Fellowship.

After graduating from fellowship in 2022, Dr. Hoover joined the Stanford University School of Medicine faculty as a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry. She also serves as a co-chair of the DFCI Supportive Oncology Education Committee. In this role, she has developed programs including an education works-in-progress seminar, a departmental book club, and an HMS continuing medical education course on Psychosocial Oncology for community mental health providers. He has developed management protocols and algorithms for the prevention and treatment of delirium; as well as novel pharmacological techniques (benzodiazepine-sparing protocol) for the prophylaxis and treatment of complicated alcohol withdrawal syndromes.

Recipient of the EXEMPLARY PSYCHIATRIST and MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONAL OF THE YEAR awards from the National Alliance on Mental Illness, Dr. Komrad is a psychiatrist on the teaching faculties of Johns Hopkins, University of Maryland and Sheppard Pratt in Baltimore where he is the Ethicist-in-Residence. He was educated at Yale University with a Bachelor's degree in Molecular Biophysics and Biochemistry. Previously host of a national radio talkshow about Psychiatry, and appearing widely in the media, for 30 years, he also treats patients and advised people on how to convince an emotionally or behaviorally troubled loved-one to accept psychiatric evaluation and treatment. He has worked in both outpatient and inpatient settings, and has had extensive experience with the process of involuntary treatment of patients in emergency rooms and hospitals. He is author of *You Need Help: A Step-by-Step Plan to Convince A Loved One to Get Counseling* (Hazelden Press)

Dr. Komrad was an attending psychiatrist on the Treatment Resistant Psychotic Disorders Unit at Sheppard Pratt Hospital for 15 years, where he continues to train residents in psychotherapy and psychopharmacology and ran the Ethics Consultation Service and Hospital Ethics Committee for the Sheppard Pratt Health System throughout Maryland for many years, where is the "Ethicist-in-Residence." He is also a member of the Ethics Committee of the American Psychiatric Association, which oversees matters of ethics and ethical guidelines for this national and international organization of psychiatrists. He writes a regular column, "Practicing Ethically," about ethics in psychiatry for The Maryland Psychiatrist for which he has won the Carol Davis Ethics Award (twice) from the American Psychiatric Association. He also writes the "Ask the Doctor" column for the Maryland chapter of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill (NAMI). He has a private practice in general psychiatry with a special interest in treating mood disorders, personality disorders and schizophrenia. His technique is to combine psychopharmacology and psychotherapy, a combination treatment that has become increasingly rare in the contemporary managed-care environment. In particular, Dr. Komrad uses these techniques to help people with serious, major mental illness rehabilitate to a higher level of functioning. He often consults to colleagues on difficult cases.

He has lectured throughout the country on a variety of topics in psychiatry. Dr. Komrad also appears widely on TV and radio to discuss topics in psychiatry and teaches psychiatry to residents and primary care physicians. He has been the host of a nationally syndicated weekly radio talkshow about psychiatry, and was the psychiatrist on a medical talkshow that broadcast to over 40 million listeners around the world. He now appears regularly on National Public Radio (NPR). In addition, Dr. Komrad has served as consultant in the development of a major Hollywood film and a dramatic TV serial, both about psychiatrists, consulted on books and screenplays and even played the part of a psychiatrist in a movie— all in an attempt to create more accurate portrayals of psychiatrists and the mentally ill on TV and in the movies.

Dr. Komrad was elected by his peers to the prestigious American College of Psychiatrists, an organization of 750 psychiatric leaders who have "demonstrated outstanding competence and achieved national recognition." He was also designated a "Distinguished Fellow" of the American Psychiatric Association-- a special distinction, "for exceptional contributions to the community and the profession of psychiatry." He was voted by professional peers and profiled as one of "Maryland's Top Mental Health Practitioners" by the Baltimore Magazine. and separately named as one of the "Top Doctors" by that publication. He was also awarded the MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONAL OF THE YEAR AWARD in 2013 by the Baltimore chapter of NAMI. In 2014 he was recognized by the National Depression and Bipolar Support Alliance (DBSA) who elected him to their Target Zero-to-Thrive Hall of Fame.

She has led and contributed to research initiatives aimed at transforming the palliative care workforce and advancing care quality and access for structurally marginalized populations.

The Hidden Epidemic: Addressing Loneliness in Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry Settings

Dr. Jo Ellen Wilson is a Consultation Liaison Psychiatrist, Epidemiologist at Vanderbilt and a Physician Scientist at the Veterans Affairs (VA) Geriatric Research, Education and Clinical Center (GRECC) with a research focus on acute and chronic forms of brain dysfunction that occurs as a part of critical illness and aging. Dr. Wilson completed medical school, general adult psychiatry residency and a consultation liaison psychiatry fellowship at Vanderbilt. After joining the Vanderbilt faculty in 2014, Dr. Wilson completed a master's in public health (MPH; 2016), PhD in Epidemiology (2023), and post-doctoral research fellowship at the VA GRECC.

Dr. Wilson's recent research has focused on acute brain dysfunction (catatonia, delirium and coma) in the setting of critical illness in her prospective cohort study ("Delirium and Catatonia Prospective Cohort Study"), now serving as the co-Principal Investigator on a trial ready cohort for Down Syndrome and clinical trials using novel therapeutics to reduce the risk of Alzheimer's Disease in middle aged adults with Down Syndrome.
